Deceased was twice married, his first partner in life being Eleanor Miller, sister of the late Thomas Miller, of Truro. The oldest daughter, Rachel, married Robert Dill, of Londonderry, and has been dead many years.

Deceased was an humble Christian, and when the summons came, it found him waiting and watching.

The funeral obsequies were conducted by Rev. F. H. ### War

### More Mounted Men Wanted.

DeWet Led in Person—Got Through Our Lines—Lost Heavily in Guns and Stores.

Seven hundred Boers have crossed from Orange River Colony into Cape Colony, near Aliwal North, and have reached Kaapdaal.

Cape Town, Dec. 17.—Mr. Von Loo, editor of the Het Mosten, a Dutch paper, has been arrested, and remanded in bail, to the amount of £1,000, for seditious libel in declaring that the British troops were shooting women.

On the 15th inst. 81 Boer women arrived at Heidelberg from Viakfontein and Greylingstad, the general having turned them off their farms, as they were in constant communication with the enemy.

A number of British soldiers have been court-martialled for sleeping at their post as sentinels at Bloemfontein. The sentences vary from one to five years' penal servitude.

Hundreds of mounted men are yet required in South Africa, to close the war. The guerilla style of war adopted by the wily Botha and DeWet can only be overcome by the very best of mounted men.

Maseru, Dec. 17.—It appears that DeWet's force was twice repulsed before it broke through the British lines in the neighborhood of Thaba N'Chu. In the third attack DeWet led in person, with a few determined men. He charged and broke the British lines, the rest of the commando following.

He was forced, however, to leave in the hands of the British, a fifteen pounder and 15 waggons with ammunition and stores. Commandant Haasbroek, with a commando and two guns, tried to get through Springkranz Nek, but was driven back with a loss of 40 men.

Colchester—Firman McClure vs. S. E. Gourley.

All ten seats in P. E. Island have been protested.

In New Brunswick 10 seats have been protested. The most of the protests in that Province were in a fair way for a "saw-off," but Rev. Dr. McLeod, who ran as a Prohibitionist and a Conservative in York, and says no illegal acts were committed by his supporters, will on no account hear of a "saw-off." He protests on principle.

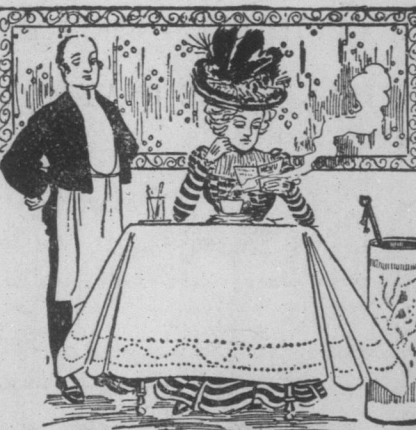

## OUR WEDDING TRIP.

(Continued.)

Quite a time has elapsed since I wrote the last letter under the above heading, and doubtless you will think we have settled in the Ashuelot Valley, where you last heard from us. Let us assure you such is not the case, though we spent some very pleasant days there. The time was principally taken up by being driven by our friends to see the different things of interest in Hinsdale and vicinity. Among them one might mention the North-

field schools of the late D. L. Moody. What a wonderfully useful life he led, and though he has gone to his reward, the work still continues! For one of our outings we crossed the old Connecticut in a boat, that for its motive power uses the passing water of the river. This is the way it is arranged; they have a large wire cable overhead, stretched from bank to bank, to which they attach two pulleys from either end of the boat; then by dropping down a sideboard on the side of the boat, against the water strikes, and shortening the forward pulley, away you go in good shape.

While at Hinsdale we visited some large farms, whose chief product was corn and tobacco; the latter was in the drying state. It was hung up in large buildings that were boarded perpendicularly, every other board being hung on hinges, and on fine days turned back on the board to which it was attached, to admit the air.

Whenever I had leisure, I would take a gun and go off on the hills around the walnut and chestnut groves, among which are to be found the silver grey squirrel, which is, when full grown, about the size of a half grown cat. The way to hunt them, or rather to "wait" for them, is to select a location from which you can see for a distance around you; if there are any about, you will soon hear them hustling around among the leaves for the nuts, and should you make the slightest noise in your position, they will spring like the old time Indian behind the first tree. However, I succeeded in getting a number of their pretty furs to bring home.

Leaving Hinsdale, we returned to Amesbury, and spent two or three more days with our friends there, who drove us to all the interesting objects to be seen in that locality. Among them I might mention an old church in Amesbury that is still in

use, that is nearly 200 years old; also drove by where the "Captain's Well," spoken of by Whittier, is; also visited Cherry Hill, the specialty being ornamental trees and shrubs, and could not but admire the beautiful evergreen hedges. But to me, the most pleasant event of the whole trip was a sail down the Merrimack River, and away outside of Plum Island, after wild fowl, duck and gull. I will not say what success we had, as "Uncle Sam" rather objects to have them exterminated for the ladies' benefit; but I will say, that shortly after that trip, there were no less than 3 ladies who had their hats trimmed in the most approved fashion. With regret we left this very pleasant place and went back to Boston, took the steamer for Yarmouth, came up to Berwick, where we spent two or three very pleasant days. Leaving there, we returned home.

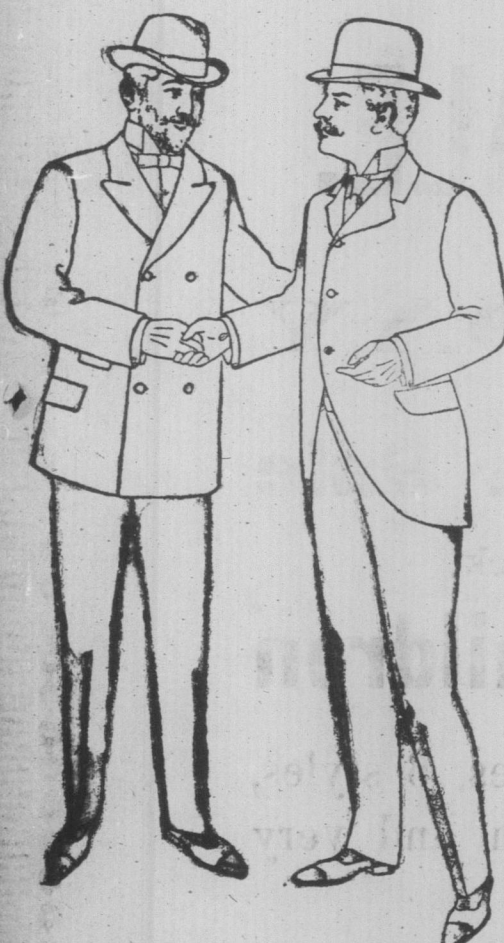

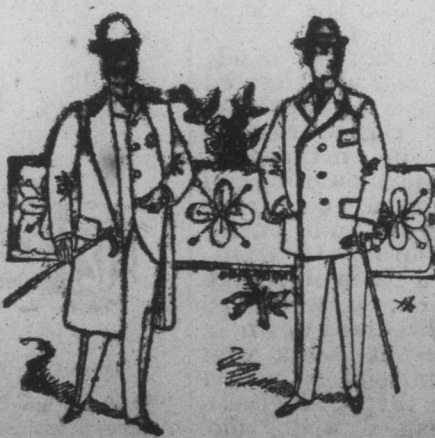

Last year was the greatest year New Brunswick has ever known in the production of butter and cheese. The butter production was increased from 98,620 pounds in 1888 to 301,900 pounds in 1899. The cheese production in 1898 was 1,540,480 pounds and in 1899 1,657,353 pounds. This year the production of butter has increased 50 per cent as compared with last year, while cheese has been increased by 25 per cent. The value of the cheese production in New Brunswick this year will reach \$208,000 while the butter is worth \$100,000. As the cheese and butter are sold off the farm it means that this money goes directly into the pocket of the farmer. Estimating the wheat produced in New Brunswick to be worth \$700,000 to the farmer this year and the butter and cheese \$300,000 it will be seen that the position of the farmer is greatly improved as compared with ten years ago when there was neither a butter or cheese factory in the province nor a modern wheat mill.
