The scene on the piazza of St. Peter's was magnificent. There were assembled many hundreds of Italian troops in various modern unforms, making a striking contrast with the mediaeval costumes of the Swiss Papal Guard on duty at the bronze doors of the cathedral.

Thousands of dollars' worth of nets were also lost.

Yesterday afternoon a great expanse of ice between Bailey's harbor and Chamber's Island suddenly cracked and became separated from the rest by a strong southwest wind.

The men on the mainland noticed there were several sail sleighs in sight on the ice. It is known that there were at least 20 to 25 men fishing



CHAMPION MILCH COW

There is no doubt that there is reasonable ground for such a conclusion. Four-fifths of the wheat supply of Great Britain is imported, and the chief source of that supply is from the United States. It would not need a war with this latter country to raise the price of wheat in England. A war with any European country would render England's commerce on the sea precarious. That does not mean that she would suffer any great disaster at sea; that her naval supremacy would be lost, or that she would be in danger of being starved into surrender. But merchant vessels would be liable to capture; when cargoes would be lost. The price of wheat would go up, for those engaged in that trade on both sides of the Atlantic would expect to get war prices in order to make up for war risks. If the coal barons and speculators in the United States have not hesitated to get all the money they could out of a coal famine in their own country, when their own expected that the dealers in grain would run the prices up to the limit when their own people would be the ones to benefit while those who would suffer would be on the other side of the ocean.

The declaration of the corn merchants does not suggest any remedy for this possible evil. But it is safe to say that there is only one remedy—though only a partial remedy. It lies in the cultivation of the wheat lands of the British colonies. It is quite possible for England to draw all the wheat needed from countries under the British flag. Canada alone can supply all that is required, if our great Northwestern fields were fully occupied. And the other colonies can assist materially. 





Washington, March 2.-A slender young American woman had the recent distinction of shooting the largest tiger ever killed in India, and is entitled to the bounty offered by the British Government. 

Corn was a decidedly firm market early in the session, the May price up from 46% to 47% c. 

of "before breakfast" exercising in a nutshell. The article says: In another article several morning exercises for the boy athlete—"rising and sinking" and "suppling" exercises -were described. This subject is now continued

This exercise is wholly for the legs. Stand upright, arms folded, heels close | wears off. together, draw in slowly a long breath. Rise on the toes, then lower the heels until they almost touch the ground. Rise on the toes again. Do this ten times the first morning, increasing by two until you reach 50.



"Raising" Exercise.

At every five "rises" expel the breath as slowly as you inhaled it and draw another long, slow breath. This exercise strengthens all the leg muscles, deep breathing keeps heart, lungs and chest in good condition.

I shall have more to say in another lesson about breathing. It is one of the most important details in an athlete's course of training.

Next, stand still, on tiptoes, every muscle of the body rigid, and draw in a long breath, slowly filling the lungs letting it out again just as slowly. (Keep the mouth shut in all athletic work, reathing entirely through the nose. Repeat this breathing exercise slowly ten times. Increase it by one each day till you reach 20.



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
