Chastly African Meal.

London, Sept. 11.—Much indignation is expressed in France over the fact that Samudoo, the so-called West African mahdi, who recently made a treaty of friendship with the English, followed up the treaty by purchasing from the British a a large quantity of guns and cartridges, and thereupon proceeded to attack the French. Notwithstanding his guns, he got the worst of the fight. Samudoo is said to be as peculiar an individual as the original Mahdi. He was born in the Kingdom of Bornu; his mother was the Nubian slave of an Arab trader. His father took good care of him, and as he grew up he became imbued with the idea that it was his mission to restore the supremacy of the prophet in Western Africa. The King of Bornu, noticing that the young man was ambitious, ordered him to be decapitated, as a lesson to other ambitious youths. Samudoo was warned by a friend and fled to Senegal. There he remained until disturbances in Bornu tempted him to return. The dissatisfied element accepted him as a leader and he made himself master of the country. his first dinner in the royal palace with the
monarch's head on a plate before him. He
is now the master of a considerable portion
of West Africa.

Canon Liddon.

London, Sept. 11.—Canon Liddon's death
was a surprise to the public, the fact of his
serious illness not having been very gener-

ally known. By his intimate friends, however, the fatal termination of his malady had for some time past been anticipated. Death has relieved the eloquent preacher from the most excruciating torture, his sufferings for months past having been incessant. He was a victim of neuralgia in its mortal form, and the end came when the disease reached the heart. The newspapers contain long obituary notices in terms of the highest eulogy, and are unanimous in declaring Canon Liddon to have been the brightest ornament of the Church of England during this century. The deceased prelate, who was probably the foremost preacher of the English Church, was bern in 1829. He became a student of Christ Church, Oxford, where he graduated B. A. in 1850. In 1853 he secured the degree of M. A., and taking orders filled successively numerous important positions. In 1870 he was installed a canon residentiary of St. Paul's Cathedral, and in the same year he was appointed Ireland Professor of the Exegesis of the Holy Scripture in the Was created D. D. and an honorary D. C. L. He resigned the Ireland professorship in October, 1882, and is understood to have devoted the greater part of his time to a life of the late Dr. Pussy. Canon Liddon was the author of "The Divinity of Jesus Christ" and numerous other well-known works.

Dr. Carman, in closing his quadriennial address yesterday, spoke of the superannuation fund, condensing his views as follows: (1) We must have such a fund; (2) it must be safely and economically managed; (3) it must be adequate or nearly so; (4) ministers must contribute; (5) our people must contribute; (6) it must be levied on a just basis; (8) it must not not be regarded as a "pauper fund;" (9) it should not unduly press upon the poorer field of men; (10) it should not lose its hold upon the laity; (11) annual conferences must guard the door as to the claimants; (12) as to the ministers, the levy might be a percentage of salary; (13) as to the laity the present basis seems just; (14) ministers should be responsible; (15) it issot likely that the present payment should be reduced yet; (16) have no oppressed ministers and yet hold circuits; (17) fund should be connexional; (18) each year must clear itself, no debt or credit accounts; (19) claimant should not be salaried and superannuated too.

Rev. Dr. Ryckman presented the report of the committee appointed to meet with the joint Union Committee in Toronto last year. It recited the proceedings of the joint committee, and continued:

That the adequacy or inadequacy of the creeds mentioned as a doctrinal basis may be a proper basis of a discussion in any future negotiations that may be held, and especially that historic Episcopacy must be defined in harmony with the teaching of the New Testament regarding the constitutions of the Christian churches and the identity of the New Testament bishop and presbyter.

Rev. T. G. Williams was afraid that the statement that the Anglican delegation was more in favor of union than the Methodist delegation would be misunderstood. He had no doubt that the Anglicans were in favor of union as they would understand

TRAIN DISPATCHERS DISSATISFIED.

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—The train dispatchers, it is reported, are strengthening their organization preparatory to asking for higher pay. Another thing which should receive their attention, says one of their members, is to take steps to prevent inferior and incompetent men taking the position of train dispatcher. It is claimed that 50 per cent. of the collisions in this country are the result of employing incompetent men in train dispatchers' offices, and at way stations inferior telegraph operators.

September U. S. Crop Report.

New York, Sept. 11.—The September crop report, giving average condition of grains in the United States, was published yesterday after the close of the markets. Spring wheat is reduced from S3.2 per cent. in August to 79.8 per cent, meaning that the estimated yield of this grain is reduced from 158,000,000 bushels to 151,000,000 bushels during the month of August. The average condition of both kinds of wheat is 75.5 per cent. Corn average is reduced from 7.33 to 70.1 per cent. The long debate on the new tariff bill introduced into the United States Congress, the incidental discussion of the reciprocity question, and the remarkable progress of the sentiment in favor of greater freedom the Queen in St. George's chapel, to trade with friends and neighbors, have made the session of the United States Congress now drawing to a close a notable

That the increased taxes on imports will, for a time, be imposed no one doubts. McKinley's Bill will finally pass, receive the signature of the President, and become law on the 1st of next month. The measure is not one that either Canadians or their progressive neighbors can view with complacency, though its projectors profess to believe that it will benefit the agriculturists of the United States by preventing the importation of agricultural produce from Canada and other countries. But among the betterinformed class of the people it is not believed that it will help the agriculturist, or which has been piled upon him.

We cannot, however, disguise the fact that the heavy taxes on Canadian eggs, that the heavy taxes on Canadian eggs, poultry, sheep, horses, cattle, barley, peas, say and other articles hitherto exported in large quantities to the United States will be injurious to the people of Canada. CANON LIDDON.

Rev. Canon, Liddon, D.D., D.C.L., of St. Paul's Cathedral, London, whose death has already been chronicled by cable, was a powerful preacher and a master of the English language. Whatever he wrote was worth reading, if for nothing but its style. Wonder has been expressed why so able a man received so little preferment at the hands of the civil power. Many a less able man has been made a bishop in recent years, while Canon Liddon remained simply one of the preachers in the Cathedral. It is known that within a short time past he had refused an offer of a bishopric because he was devoted to he work of writing the life of his friend the late Dr. Pusey, which he expected to complete early in 1891. Why an offer of advancement did not come

arlier to so gifted a man is a question which has puzzled many. One exp is that he was pretty democratic in his views, and made no secret of the fact. Once, being commanded to preach before Windsor, it is alleged that he addressed her Majesty as "madame," which gave her much offense, and he was never asked to preach before royalty again. He never did, though he continued in the front ranks of the Anglican cle men in the metropolis. Latterly, Majesty relented, and a bishopric was offered Liddon, but the preferment came too late. Canon Liddon belonged to what is known as the moderate wing of the High Church party. He is best known to the world as the author of a famous volume of lectures on "The Divinity of Christ," which as passed through many editions, and has language is known.

From Canada to Great Britain, more especially from Ontario, there has this seaon been a heavy export beef trade. Before the end of August about 60,000 cattle had gone forward from Montreal, being an increase of over 20,000 compared with 1889. An occasional complaint was heard that shippers were losing money because of a great rush of American cattle conjesting the British market, but then how often does any one hear a shipper telling about his profits. Mr. Plimsoll's proposition to exclude from Great Britain all Canadian and United States live cattle has not been taken very seriously. Dressed beef shipped does not sell as high there as that dressed on the spot. The British beef eater wants his steaks and roasts prime, and he will have them to his liking despite Mr. Plimsoll. Furthermore, English and Scotch feeders are anxious for a supply of Canadian stockers, though it is a much better general policy for Canadian farmers to put the finishing touches of fat on these animals


