the Millbrook Reporter Printing Office Destroyed—The Loss at Alliston Nearly Half a Million.

MILIBROOK, Ont., May 13.—Monday sight the Millbrook Reporter printing office was observed to be on fire. The flames spread so rapidly that all efforts to save the building were useless. The printing plant, owned by T. B. Collins & Co., was a total loss. Plant insured for \$1,500, building for \$200.

Alliston, Ont., May 13.—Later information increases the extent of the loss in this town by reason of Friday's disastrous fire. Phere is not a grocery or drygoods store left in the place; whole squares were burnt to the ground. The loss is estimated at from \$400,000 to \$500,000. About 90 families are homeless, nearly all of whom escaped with but the clothes on their backs, and many of whom are in actual want and great distress. That in 1884 Thomas McGreevy agreed to secure for Larkin, Connolly & Co. a contract for the completion of the graving dock of Levis, one of the conditions of the agreement being that, he (Thomas McGreevy) should receive any excess over the sum of \$50,000 in the contract price. That to the detriment of the public interest, the bargain was carried out, and McGreevy was paid the price stipulated in the corrupt arrangement, viz., \$22,000.

That in 1883 and 1884 McGreevy entered into a similar corrupt arrangement with regard to the paving dock at Esquimalt, B.C., for which tenders were asked by the Dominion Government.

That McGreevy obtained from the De-

partment of Public Works information, and from the Minister in charge figures, and calculations, which he communicated to Larkin, Connolly & Co., while they took his brother, Robert H., into partnership.

That while this work was in progress. Thos. McGreevy was a paid agent of the firm, and that he obtained for them important alterations and more favorable conditions and enabled them to realize, to the detriment of the public interest, very large profits. For this work large sums were paid to Thos. McGreevy by the contractors.

That he himself approached members of Parliament to assist him in helping the contractors, and that on his suggestion members of Parliament were approached by members of the firm of Larkin, Connolly & Co.

That certain members of that firm have
