The Massachusetts Weavers' Fine Act Ruled Unconstitutional. The machinists' unions of New York are considering the propriety of agitating for a nine-hour day for the trade throughout the

country.

A convention of labor organizations in Brooklyn will be called by the Brooklyn Central Labor Union to demand the opening of public schools and court houses for meetings of labor unions.

Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, thinks that his visit last week to President Harrison to plead for the pardon of two sailors, prisoners for life in a Maine prison on account of the Jefferson Borden mutiny, will result in success.

The International Convention of Jour-The International Convention of Mich., neymen Barbers at Grand Rapids, Mich., among other things decided to adopt a button for members to wear. It consists of the Stars and Stripes, with the initials of the union upon the face. A similar design was also adopted for a banner.

The full bench of the Massachusetts Supreme Court, except Judge Holmes, who dissents, has declared the Weavers' Fine Act, passed by the last Legislature, to be unconstitutional. The bill prohibits employeer from withhelding are accountable. ployers from withholding wages as penalty or bad work. Under the decision em-

ployers may resume the fining system. There is much indignation among the members of Pittsburg labor unions over the injunction granted by Judge Porter against the striking job printers. This is the third time withing a brief period that the plan of enjoining unions has been resorted to in that eity for the purpose of breaking down a strike, and it has come to be recognized as the short cut to victory for the employers. The language of Judge Porter's opinions is considered by the trades unions to go further than anything that has yet been proclaimed from the bench, and to practically cut off all possibility of strikers in any manner whatever communicating with such men as attempt to take their places. The talk now is that the Typographical Union will take the matter to the Supreme Court.

The Michigan Federation of Labor, in session at Bay City, has adopted the following: "Whereas, our election laws are greatly improved over the old system, still there is room for improvement. Since the manufacturers cannot control their employes by fixing their tickets and driving them, they will now run their factories and prevent their employes from voting; therefore be it resolved, that the Michigan Federation of Labor, through its committee, exert its influence on the next Legislature to enact such laws as will compel owners of mills, factories and mines to shut down for a full day, that their employes may have a chance to vote, and make it a

may have a chance to vote, and make it misdemeanor for the violation of such law." The Grand Rapids Workmen was made the official paper of the federation. A resolution was adopted that the federa-tion use its influence to have a law enacted to submit a constitutional amendment to submit a constitution and a submit a confer the right of suffrage to women; also that Michigan delegates in Congress be requested to prepare and present a bill to Congress, at the earliest opportunity, prohibiting military and naval bands of

music, paid by the Government, from com-peting with or interfering with the business of civilian bonds and musicians.

Over 440,000 People Rendered Homeless and Destitute. VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 5.—Advices from Japan, brought by the steamer Empress of China, give later news regarding the great earthquake of Oct. 28. Careful estimates now place the number of dead at 7,500, and of injured at 10,120, with 89,630 buildings wholly and 28,625 parely destroyed. Over 440,000 people have been rendered homeless and destitute.

Many curious freaks of the earthquake have been noticed. In one place a fissure swallowed up four persons, who have re-

have been noticed. In one place a fissure swallowed up four persons, who have remained visible, but whose rescue proved to be impossible. Fortunately the weather remains mild. Rain or cold weather would cause frible distress. Decent burial has been given to most of the bodies recovered from the ruins in larger towns, but horrible scenes are presented in the country, where the people are unable to inter their dead. Foreigners have come forward generously with gifts of money, clothing, medicine, etc. Twenty thousand dollars have been contributed by foreign residents, exclusive etc. Twenty thousand dollars have been contributed by foreign residents, exclusive of the Chinese fund, which is large. Shanghei has sent \$5,000, and \$110,000 has been raised in various ways in Tokio. In addition to these sums, the Japanese Government has made a grant of \$2,225,000 to the two prefectures that suffered most,

LONDON AND TRADE WITH THE WEST INDIES.

The Pensacola, Fla., authorities do not despair of striking up a trade with the West Indies for this part of Canada by way of their port, and overland to this city. The following letter has been received by Mayor Taylor, and handed to the secretary of the Board of Trade:

Board of Trade:

"Attention has been called to the advisability of establishing a route through this port to your city for the importation and exportation of various articles from and to the West Indies and countries to the south of us. Of course the main question will be the ability to get through rates cheaper than now exist. This port is nearer to the West Indies than any port available to you in the Gulf of Mexico. We are situated within seven miles of the gulf and have ample water on the bar for the deeper draught vessels. There are cleared from Pensacols an average of over 500 ocean going vessels each year. It is an extremely healthy place, and malaria is almost unknown. Could you kindly give me the following information? What is the population of the country tributary to London supplied by your wholesale merchants? What is the number of your wholesale dealers? What amount of imported sugar, and of what grade, do they handle each year? What is the character of your manufactures for export, and the amount of exportation, that is such as would probably pass over this route. What are the number of oranges (boxes) and lemons, bananas, pine apples, ecocanuts, other tropical fruits and pecans consumed by wholesale dealers ers per arnum? What is the amount of early cabbages, sweet and white potatoes, early green peas, snap beans and vegetables used, and the average price? Would your authorities assist in obtaining favorable through rates by way of Louisville and Nashville and connecting lines? An early reply will oblige, yours very truly, W.M. H. ### IN HIS annual report Postmaster-General Wannamaker, of the United States, makes a number of valuable suggestions. He approves of the proposition of the United States delegates to the Vienna Postal Union to provide for a limited indemnity for the loss of registered matter and to establish a uniform charge for registered letters. Mr. Wannamaker urges at length the union of the telegraph and telephone with the postal system, and declares that "1-cent letter postage, 3-cent telephone messages and 10-cent telegraph messages are all near possibilities." The gross revenue for the year ending June 30 was \$65,931,785, and the total expenditures and liabilities amounted to \$72,069,114, leaving a deficiency of more than \$6,000, 000. The revenue showed an increase of more than 8 per cent. over that of the preceding year, and the estimated deficiency for the present fiscal year is less than \$4,000,000. The total number of offices is 64,329, an increase of 1,928, and nearly 8,000 miles of additional railway service have been established.

Still Another Awful Coal Mine Disaster,

Caused by an Explosion of the Deadly Firedamp.

Seventy-Three Miners Meet Their Death in the Pit-Heartronding Scenes.

rans, Dec. 1.—Reports of a control mining disaster come from St. Etienne, in the Department of Loire, and in the center of one of the richest coal fields in France. An explosion of fire damp occurred at noon.

An explosion of fire damp occurred at noon yesterday in one of the numerous coal pits of that region, and many of the workers were unable to escape from the mine.

The explosion occurred in the La Puits de la Manufactare, belonging to the St. Etienne Colliery Company. Fortunately yesterday was being observed as a fete day and a comparatively small number of men were at work in the mine. If the accident had happened on an ordinary working day the loss of life would have been still more appalling.

FOUL FUMES.

When the first attempt was made to rescue the imprisoned men the rescuers were driven back by the foul tumes that poured from the shaft, and for nearly an heur nothing could be done to aid the unfortunate miners in the pit. In order to disperse the smoke that filled the shaft, the cage was lowered and drawn up again rapidly a numer of times, and at length the shaft was sufficiently cleared to enable rescuers to descend in the cage and begin

rapidly a numer of times, and at length the shaft was sufficiently cleared to enable rescuers to descend in the cage and begin the work of exploration.

OBSTACLES IN THE WAY OF RESCUE.

At the very outset the rescuers encountered a serious obstacle, as the main gallery was found to have collapsed, thus preventing access to the imprisoned men. After working several hours in relays, a party of rescuers had cleared away a portion of the debris, and a few minutes later they came across the bodies of four miners. These men, although unconscious, were still alive, and were quickly sent to the surface, where they soon revived.

EIGHT MEN SAVED.

The speedy revival of the men rescued gave hope that the others in the pit might be saved, and four more victims who were rescued were quickly restored to consciousness. The second party of rescuers, however, found that it was utterly impossible to reach the other imprisoned men.

SEVENTY-THREE PERISHED.

It has now been ascertained that 73 miners have perished. The wives, children and relatives of the entombed miners still surround the mouth of the pit, and the most heatrending scenes are witnessed as the bodies of the victims are brought to the surface.

MELBOURNE, Dec. 5.—A raid was started on the Standard Bank of Australia Thursday owing to the uneasy feeling growing out of the suspension of a number of smaller banks and building associations, and the result was that the Standard Bank had to suspend. The bank had a capital of £1,000,000, of which £250,000 was paid up. A better feeling provails to-day and it is believed the crisis has been passed. The leading assurance society of Melbourne has effered to render assistance wherever financial aid is required.



PARIS, Dec. 5.—Dom Pedro II., ex-Emperor of Brazil, who died yesterday, was born in 1825 at Rio Janeiro. On the abdication of Dom Pedro I., his father, in 1831, born in 1825 at Rio Janeiro. On the abdication of Dom Pedro I., his father, in 1831, he succeeded to the throne of Brazil, but, being a minor, the country was ruled by a Council of Regency until 1840. He was a man of a very high order of intelligence, and well known in Europe and the United States. He did a great deal to develop the material resources of the country, which prospered under his rule. In 1871 he issued an Imperial decree for the gradual abolition of slavery. The total emancipation of slavery. The total emancipation of the slaves in his dominion was effected in 1888. On Nov. 16, 1889, a revolution broke on which was supported by the army. The Ministry resigned, and a provisional Government was formed under the presidency of General da Fonseca. The provisional Gevernment was formed under the previsional Gevernment on the same day declared the monarchy abolished, and on the 17th the ex-Emperor and his family were compelled to leave for Earope. The ex-Emperor has since resided in Portugal, and rapidly failed in health. His wife, Princess Therees Christina Marle, sister of Francis I., King of Naples, whem he married in 1843, died chortly after the revolution.
