WONDERFUL MARS.

What Milan's Noted Astrono mer Says of It.

No One Sure That the Planet is Sustaining Life.

Its Habitability Undoubted—The "Double Canal" Theory-Natural Forces May Have Hollowed Them Out,

MILAN, Aug. 5.—In talking about Mars yesterday, Prof. Schiaparelli said the great lines dividing the continents of Mare had always appeared to him very clear. "I saw a parallel duplication with almost 40 lines," said he, "in 1882, and their number increased with each successive observation without the duplication and were being always visible. Thus, naturalists and philosophers would say it is much easier to show that snimal life exists on Mars that it does not. The burden of proof rests upon those who deny its existence."
