## Wrong in His Head 66

Sensational News Regarding Russia's Ruler.

A German Specialist Sent for to Operate on His Majesty's Cranium.

London, Jan. 18 .- In official circles here and on the continent the greatest importance is attached to the dispatch from St. Petersburg yesterday announcing that Dr. Bergmann, the eminent German specialist, had been summoned to perform an operation on the Czar to prevent the possible extension of a slight osseous excres-cence which has appeared on his cranium at the place where his Majesty was struck by a Japanese fanatic in 1891, while his Majesty, then the Czarwitch, was making a tour of the world with Prince George of Greece, who, by knocking his assailant down, saved his companion from further

and possibly more serious injury. The latter, combined with overwork, has caused the Czar to suffer from vertigo for some time past. The mere fact that such news was issued from St. Petersburg, and was allowed to be transmitted abroad shows the gravity of the situation, and the London afternoon newspapers all comment

#### QUEEN VS. ST. LOUIS.

Outcome of the Curran Bridge Fraud-Verdict for Defendant.

Special to The Advertiser. Ottawa, Jan. 18.-Justice Burbidge today gave judgment against the Crown in the case of the Queen vs. St. Louis. The Government sued for over-payment to St. Louis for the Curran bridge contract, but as the Supreme Court had already given St. Louis \$61,000 more than had been paid him, Justice Burbidge today said that he was bound by that decision, and dismissed the case. The Government maintained that an amount of \$143. 000 had been over-paid St. Louis. The case will be taken to the Supreme Court, and likely to England.



A 90-day quarantine shall be enforced by both countries upon cattle imported from Europe or from any country in which be enforced on all ruminants and Earl of Kingston. for slaughter, they may be admitted without inspection. Subject to inspection at shipping port they may be admitted into either country for transit in any shipping port in Canada for export by sea or to the Unit ed States for export from Portland, Boston and New York. Swine may be admitted without inspection for slaughter in bonded cars to bonded slaughter houses, or when forming part of settlers' effects and accompanied by certificate that swine plague or hog cholera has not existed within

six months in the district whence they came. Lacking such certificate they must be inspected at port of entry, and if diseased will be slaughtered without compensation. Horses may be admitted in bond from one port to another in either country without inspection at the shipping port to another in either country without inspection at the shipping port. Horses may be admitted on inspection at port of entry. Horses may be admitted for temporary stay, teaming or pleasure driving at points along the frontier for a period not exceeding one week on port of entry upon permit of custom officer. Should he observe any evidence of disease he will detain the animals, and report to the district inspector, who will decide whether the animals may be admitted, and horses used for drawing toba, Northwest Territories of Brit-ish Columbia on business connected with stock raising or mining, and horses belonging to the Indian tribes may be admitted without inspection, but must report to custom officer both going and coming. ## Cuban Victory.

Spanish Gunboat Blown Up by a Torpedo.

Crew Killed.

Havana, Jan. 19 .- It is learned that the insurgents made an attack upon the fort at Guayamo on Saturday, when the gunboats, Relampago and Centila, were sent up the Conto River to protect it. When opposite Mango. Relampago struck a torpedo. Instantly there was a terrific explosion, and masses of water were hurled to a ower a boat, and almost instantly the vessel went down. Those on board who were not injured jumped into the water and made their way to the Centila, aboard of which the greatest ex-citment prevailed. The Centila's boats at once went to the assistance of the Relampago's men. The rebels appeared in strong forces along the bank and when they saw the Spaniards in the water they directed a heavy fire

The Centila opened fire on the rebels but as they could not be seen it is not believe that any serious lossses were inflicted upon them. Nearly every survivor of the Relampago's crev was wounded, and there were only a few of the men belonging to the Cen-tila who had not been hit. The com mander of the Centila was so seriously wounded that doubts are entertained of his recovery. The Centila returned to Manzanillo, where the news of the disaster caused intense excitement.

The official report of the affair states that the commander, second engineer and three sailors of the Relampago were killed, and her boatswain. quartermaster, chief engineer and four sailors injured. The boatswain of the Centila was killed, and her pilot, second engineer, gunner and six sailors injured.


