Philadelphia, March 30. - The anthracite coal strike commission's award, which resulted in six years of industrial peace in the hard coal fields, employing 167,000 men and boys, will expire tomorrow at midnight. The operators, at the joint conference held in this city several weeks ago, offered to renew the agreement for another three years, but the miners, in

convention at Scranton last week, voted to allow the award to lapse. The collieries in the Schuylkill district will resume work Friday morning after the Thursday holiday suspension in celebration of the eight-hour work-day in the soft coal fields, and will work until the close of the week, information to this effect being given out from Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company headquarters, and from individual collieries' superintendents this after-noon. This means that there will be no lockout, and if there is any suspension it will be by reason of the miners not reporting at their collieries.

As the sentiment in this region i strongly against a strike, it is possible to come to an agreement which will not be humiliating to the organization, It is certain that there will be a full quota of men at work as long as the collieries are kept open for them.

No intimation is given of the conditions which the operators will offer to the men after the expiration of the present agreement, but judging from the policy of keeping the mines in operation without any ceremony of any kind, it is inferred that the wages and other conditions will remain un-



#### TO ACT AS BANKER FOR G. T. PACIFIC

#### Mr. Fielding Explains To House Conditions of the Proposed \$10,000,000 Loan.

Ottawa, Ont., March 30. — The Grand Trunk Pacific loan of \$10,000,000, in security of bonds, introduced by Mr. Fielding in the House this after-noon, brought a review of that ques-

tion from several sides.
W. F. MacLean closed the debate, noving a resolution that with a view to safeguarding its financial commitments, the Government be authorized to purchase a controlling share of the Grand Trunk Campany's common

This resolution was declared out of order by the speaker, and the mover allowed it to stand.

Mr. Fielding said his resolution did not contemplate any changes in the contract between the Government and the Grand Trunk Pacific. It was simply proposed that the Government becomes the bankers of the company.

He explained that the railway would be 3,560 miles long from east to west, divided into two divisions, an eastern 1,804 miles long, and a western about 1,755 miles long. The eastern division was being constructed for the Gov-ernment by the G. T. R., and would be leased by the company, while the western division was being constructed with the assistance of the Government




