

STRONG LANGUAGE IN IRELAND'S DECLARATION OF

Calls On All Free Nations To Uphold Her Claims Against "the Arrogant Pretentions of England.

Dublin, Jan. 22.—According to the provisional constitution of the Irish republic, now before the Dail Eireann, legislative powers are to be vested in deputies elected from existing parliamentary constituencies. The ministry shall consist of a president and four executive officers, secretaries of finance, home affairs, foreign affairs and national defence. All revenues will be raised on vote of the Dail Eireann. The constitution may be altered upon seven days' notice.

"The declaration of independence," after referring to Ireland's geographical position, said: "Ireland's independence is demanded. By the freedom of the seas her great harbors will be opened to all nations, instead of being a monopoly dependence."

A pound of milk contains about 1,100 heat units. A pound of butter, which contains fat in concentrated form, represents about 13,000 heat units. The difference in heat units between milk and butter illustrates well the difference between artificial and natural gas.

In the first place, some of the present-day bread becomes stale more quickly than bre-war bread because of the omission of some of the fats. It is dryer, to begin with, hence it dries up more quickly. Bread a day old cannot be served in slices that are tender enough.

Of course, no bread need be actually wasted. Even the hardest of stale bread can be rolled into crumbs and be used for making sauces, crumbing foods that are to be fried, for stuffings, etc. But we can avoid accumulating so smuch stale bread even for this purpose by using up sliced bread that has become stale, or any other hard bread, by serving direct to the table.

With the question of a sewerage system for West London, under consideration, that of a disposal plant at the coves looms up larger than ever. Plans are being considered in the department of the city engineer, and data is being gathered in preparation for the time when the council authorizes the work to proceed. It is conceded by all that something should be done towards eliminating the nuisance of raw sewage emptying into the river. The sewer beds which at present are being used as filters are inadequate for the work. City Engineer H. A. Brazier says that a disposal plant would probably cost between \$300,000 and \$400,000. The question will probably be discussed by No. 2 committee at its next meeting.
