

Sir Sam thinks that the public will see through the mockery, and prefers to fight openly. It is understood that he has found quite a number of the members of yesterday's "harmonious" caucus of his own way of thinking.

Union Name Unsavory.

On afterthought there is a substantial number of the followers of "Union" who believe that the complete abandonment of the name under which they came together in 1917 is a frank and open admission that "union" failed generally, and that the name is an unsavory one in the nostrils of the electorate. The platform adopted is an echo of what Unionists have in the past two years been advocating, and there is no new thing in it with which to fire the imagination. It is a program of generalities which may mean anything or nothing. It is a series of high-sounding phrases which may be interpreted in any old way. So that this morning there was a doubt as to the actual success of the caucus, and this evening men are departing for their homes with some suspicion in their minds that they have had it put over on them.

Sir Robert Borden's resignation was accepted without much demur at the time; in fact it is stated that Sir Robert himself was somewhat taken aback by the cordialty with which it was re-ceived. In any case he decided that, even if he were not fitted to carry on the task of premier any longer he could

the task of premier any longer, he could at least continue to represent the county of Kings in parliament. There is no precedent in Canadian history in which a premier, having resigned, has still

precedent in Canadian history in which a premier, having resigned, has still continued as a private member. It may be that Sir Robert simply desires to retain the seat for the "new" government, knowing full well that if he resigned, and there were a by-election, the Government would be the weaker by one more vote in the House.

Further Resignations.

In the meantime there are all sorts of rumors of further resignations. Hon. Dr. Reid, minister of railways, would like to retire to a safe place in the senate. Hon. Martin Burrell, minister of customs, has long had his eye on a British Columbia vacancy in that chamber. Hon. A. L. Sifton, secretary of state, has not been well for some time past, and there is an Alberta vacancy in the senate with which he might be satisfied. Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, it is said, does not care to remain long after Sir Robert. Hon. A. K. Maclean, former minister without portfolio, has been out for some time, and will join the Liberals. And Hon, N. W. Rowell, president of the privy council, has threatened to resign, and has only been dissuaded from so doing by certain of the Liberal-Unionists. has only been dissuaded from so doing by certain of the Liberal-Unionists, to whom he has promised that he will consult his friends in Ontario before

consult his friends in Ontario before making up his mind.

Annoying By Elections.

The trouble about all these threats at resignation is that they bring up the vexed question of by-elections.

There have been several reconstructions of the cabinet in the past few years, but they have been made from within; they have, in fact, been nothing by "shuffles." And they have not in the main necessitated by-elections, which are unpopular with the Government. If there is to be any reconstruction worthy of the name there will have to be by-elections, and the Government has no stomach for them.

A general election is not wanted, but it would not be at all surprising if a general election will in the near future have to be faced by the "National Liberal and Conservative Party," with a chance of a win for the straight Liberals.

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





Numerous methods of immunization against ivy poisoning are known. Some people venture to eat occasionally some of the poison ivy leaves in the spring, and believe they thereby gain immunity which lasts through that season. This may be all right. I do not recommend it. It is better, perhaps to take internally, early in the season, minute and gradually increasseason, minute and gradually increasing doses of a tincture of ivy leaf in order to acquire immunity which will endure at least through the summer.

A VARNISHED DRAIN BOARD.

The ideal sink has two drain boards, one on each side. "Then the dishes to be washed and the vegetables and fruits to be prepared start from the left, pass through the sink and are placed ready on the right. There is no confusion, or doubling back of the work. The drain boards ought to be made of good wood, oak or maple, to slope toward the sink enough to give

good drainage, to be grooved, and, above all, to be of one piece without cracks to collect dirt.

A drain board of good hard wood is till difficult to keep looking well, for still difficult to keep looking well, for the constant wetting darkens the wood, and fruit stains are very difficult to remove. If, however, it is given two or three good coats of spar varnish and thoroughly dried, it has a hard, smooth finish, which will withstand any kind of usage. It will not blister with heat; very hot water may be poured on it without in any way affecting the polish. Grease, fruit stains and soil generally brease, fruit stains and soil generally an be removed by washing with a hot

A good quality of spar varnish has all these virtues, but ordinary poor varnish which does not withstand heat is not worth the time it takes to put it on; it makes just more trouble.

If space is limited in the kitchen, rather than do without your drainboards, have them hinged, so that they can be fastened up against the wall when not in use. 





Reconstruction Problem.

For fully two years we have been facing the problems of reconstruction. The strain imposed upon ministers since August, 1917, is not to be measured by years. It has left its effect on every member of the Administration and notably myself. May I add that, although the path of duty was not always to be discerned clearly, I never consciously departed from it, and I hope you will consider me entitled to an honorable discharge. I have the permission of his excellency the governor-general to inform you of my retirement in the immediate future."

The prime minister then expressed his gratitude to his colleagues and to his supporters in Parliament. The situation, he declared, was full of cheer: the position of the Government was steadily strengthened until today the party was more united, vigorous and determined than ever before. There was plenty of material within the party for the formation of a new administration. The party had suffered from lack of necessary work and reasonable activity outside the walls of Parliament. "You must not depend solely upon ministers for this work." Sir Robert warned his followers. "The legislative and administrative work imposed upon them is almost overwhelming.

Fine Working Majority.

"We have a fine working majority in Parliament." he continued; "we have a good cause and a good policy: we have magnificent ability, energy and debating powers in our ranks. There should be no difficulty in carrying on the Government. All that is essential is to stand together in the future as in the past."

As to the Government's policy, he said, it had been accepted. Its application would doubtless raise questions which could not be anticipated, but they could agree that none among them desired the adoption or fulfillment of a policy which would destroy the industries of this country or which would reduce its leboring population to the conditions which prevailed in some other countries. Living conditions of a just and decent character must be maintained.

Need of Unity.

Sir Robert then referred briefly to the policy of the Government as laid down in the statement of policy subscently issued by him, and to the need of unity in carrying out this policy as laid down.

Dealing with the National Railway system. Sir Robert urged that it never be made a political foothall. Its management should be unhampered by direct interference from either Government or Parliament.

"Above all." he said. "there must never be any attempt to make our railway system a political machine or to use it as an agency in political contests."

TORONTO, July 2.—The epidemic of measles is increasing in Ontario, according to reports from the provincial health department. There were 3.613 cases of measles reported in June, this being the second largest number in any one month for the past twenty years, with the exception of March, 1916, when there were 5,000 cases, with 47 deaths. The deaths last month totalled 22. In May, 1920, there were 46 deaths from measles out of 2.264 cases. Small pox is also on the increase, though no deaths were reported for June. There were 349 smallpox cases reported for June, an increase of 59 over the previous month.


