

A .- Miss Bertha Smith, supervising nurse of the Child Welfare Association, to whom this question was referred in order to get the latest and best practice, replies as follows:
A baby of 9 months, weighing 19 pounds, height 30 inches, is rather above the average. The average weight (Dr. Emmett Holt's table) is 17 pounds, 7 ounces, height 27.3 inches. It is better to begin to wean at 9 months, taking at least three weeks to the process-and especially necessary to have baby taking a good line of diet and completely reaned before hot weather sets in breast fed and regularly, at 4-hour intervals (6, 10, 2, 6 and 10), substitute for the 10 a.m. feeding a wellcooked cereal (cooked not less than hours), preferably cream of wheat to start with, a teaspoon or two at first, gradually increasing until 4 ounces is taken. Prepare 4 ounces of milk (pasteurized or boiled), diluted with 4 ounces boiled water. Put part of this on the cereal and teach baby to drink the remainder from a cup. Give nothing more for four hours. At the end of a week substitute 8 ounces milk and water (getting gradually up to the proportion of 3 parts of milk to I part of water), for the 6 p.m. breast feeding, giving a crust with it. After another week substitute another milk and water meal at 2 p.m. and make the 6 p.m.

THIS AGE TOO HURRIED

Career of Lord Bacon Is Interestingly Recalled by W. J. Hodder.

Wisdom, wit and reason neatly and effectively blended, marked the thirtyseventh annual Baconian banquet a the Tecumseh House on Friday evening. A well-filled banquet table, several pleasing numbers by able vocalists and oratory of the highest merit furnished an evening of keen enjoyment for mem-bers of an organization whose reputation for good fellowship and whole-hearted interestedness in humanity at large well-known, not only locally but in distant places.

In the opening address, E. T. White president, congratulated the club upon reaching its thirty-seventh year with increasing prosperity and usefulness. emphasizing the point that the ve., age of the association testifies to the unswerving devotion of its members and the excellency of the association throughout the year.

An Age of Hurry. "One may reasonably ask, what do we stand for," declared Mr. White, "I may say that the Baconian Club provides a forum for interchange of ideas in a thorough and leisurely manner. This is a much-needed element. We live in a hurried age, too hurried in fact, and the club should be commended for its preservation of its traditional forcefulness and fearlessness in debat ing and discussing the leading issues of the hour in no hurried fashion.

From now on all applicants for temporary positions in any of the civil service departments will be handled exclusively through the Ontario Government Employment Bureau. J. C. that effect this morning. In future all persons successful in passing the required examination will be registered with Mr. Spencer, and upon advice that vacancles have occurred in London he will be enabled to get in touch with any or all of them within a comparatively short time. Under the present system Ottawa has at hand thousands of names, and as some time must elapse between the completion of the test un-til an actual appointment, the Government frequently is unable to get in touch with many on the list by reason of change of address, death and other

causes.

It can be readily seen that under the new scheme, which becomes effective at once, considerable time can be saved In the past it has often developed that after interchange of notices and communications for three and even five and six months, the persought has been located happily settled in some distant place.





### **RUSSIA'S RICHEST** GREEK CHURCH ON WHITE SEA COAST

Visit To Wonderful 500-Year-Old Monastery of Solovvetsk.

**'BRITISH ARMY OF THREE"**

norning, the 26th of July, 1918, Col. Burton asked me to try to find a pilot little village of Knyajaya Guba, on the northwestern shores of the White Sea, where we, a section of the British expeditionary force to North Russia, had been stational for several months. The colonel was a Canadian, considerably more than six feet "in his socks." He was what one would call "a rough diamond," but was liked better than any other British O. C. by his men, a fact which he had every reason to be

In vain did I search the village from one end to another; none of the natives were willing to undertake this job, even though I offered them the most temptes. Saturday morning a new disappoint-ment was in store for us. The engineer and firemen refused to undertake the journey. Five young Finns volunteered, and after they had "studied" the engines couple of hours, they were prepared to take us to the other end of the world, if need be. was about 11 o'clock on Sunday night when we caught sight of the numerous cupolas, turrets and towers of the monastery. They stood out shimmering white against the black sky. The picture reminded us more of a mediaeval town of sunny Italy than of a group of Russian buildings just a few miles below the Polar Circle. Through my field glasses I could see hundreds of excited monks gathering on the quay in the picturesque little harbor. ### SCIENTIST HOLDS MAN POLYGENETIC. **NOT MONOGENETIC**

Professor Hill-Tout of Vancouver Disputes Long-Cherished Theory.

Man Not Product of One Line of Descent-Adam and Eve Are Only Myths.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 13.2-Ein-Professor Charles Hill-Tout of Van-couver with a positive assertion that man is of polygenetic and not of mono-

To the layman, Dr. Hill-Tout's statement will be merely an item of news which must be explained before it is understood, but to anthropologists it understood, but to anthropologists neans a revolutionary re-arrangement of all pre-conceived ideas. Incidentally, means for keeping down it seems to dispose once and for all of be profitably considered. the religious belief that Adam and Eve were the original parents of the human Dr. Hill-Tout's recent discovery, must

In plain language, Professor Hill-Tout has found evidence that man is not the product of one line of descent. There must have been a number of "first families" in the dim dawn of history, al-though evolutionists have always held a contrary belief.

Clue Found in Skulls.
Working upon a clue which he found last winter in a survey of the skulls of apes and anthropolds in the Anthropological Museum of San Diego, California. Professor Hill-Tout has discovthe Royal Society of Canada at its annual meeting this month. In substantiation of his claim he has prepared a large number of photographs of skulls, including those of baby and adult gor, illas, showing that a baby gorilla's head very nearly approximates the human in conformation, though changes are rapid

with growth.

Professor Hill-Tout is recognized as one of the world's foremost anthropologists. He is a member of the execupologists. He is a member of the executive committee of the American Institute of Research, member of the Archaeological Institute of America, fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and of the Royal Anthropological Institu tute of Great Britain. In addition, he is said to be the greatest living authoron Indian languages and folklore. The Vancouver savant explains his discovery in these words:

"The theoretical conception of a nomosimous precursor the ancestor common to man and apes, is shown to be founded in fact by the discovery of the most interesting of all our fossil remains, Eoanthropus, or the 'Dawn Man

This ancient man roamed all over the southern downs of England when the British Isles were a part of mainland of Europe at the close of the Pilocene period. It probably antedates some thousands of years Pithecaninropus Erectus. Unlike the latter, Ecanthropus is relatively higher develcred in its cranial characters.

"its cranial capacity is greater than that of many of the men of the backward races of today. Most of its cranial characters are remarkably modern in type, having much the same contour as that of the young anthropoids. That it is a primitive type we learn, for while it possesses a well-developed head, it so has the chinless jaw and the canine teeth of the anthropoids

Pithecold's Lost Chance. "Indeed, it differs from the athropoids only in its larger anthropoids, that the lowman. In other words, he followed anthropold development rather than the human, and so lost his chance with the

eranial characters, living thousands of years earlier than Neanderthal man, and the discovery of the 'Dawn Man' Ecanhropus in England, force us to give up the monogenetic origin of man and accept the polygenetic origin.

'If we now want to discover man's oldest ancestor, we must go to Ecan-thropus and not to Pithecanthropus, for the former has all the characters which premen should possess, characters which were common to the first man and to the first anthropoid apes, as exemplified in the cranial characters of the young of both species today.

"For, according to that great bigen etic principle, more commonly known as Baer's Law, we see why the skulls of the young of the Neanderthal race and the young of the anthropoids or human-like apes are so different from those of their parents. The principle exof their parents. Fowls eat this ravenously, and care must be used at the start to see that they are not fed too much of it, as it will cause diarrhoea. The Winnipeg Livestock Exchange gives the following reasons in urging farmers to dehorn cattle: It improves their appearance: they will become quieter, will feed better, will show arger gains in weight at less cost; more dehorned cattle can be loaded in cars, and they ship more satisfactorily; buyers-the feeder, the killer, the shipper, the exporter-demand dehorned cattle; buyers discount horned cattle in prices as compared to dehorned cattle; practically all American native cattle are dehorned.

When to Dehorn.
The Saskatchewan department agriculture gives Western farmers the following advice when and how to dehorn their commercial cattle: "All calves should be dehorned at

from one day to two weeks old with caustic potash. This operation is sim-ple. When the calf is three to four days old, clip the hair where the rudimentary horns or buttons later appear, and with a stick of caustic acid, wrapped at one end to protect fingers, rub over the button until the skin becomes a little inflamed. A scab will appear in a few days, and further growth of the horn will cease. It is advisable to rub oil around the button to prevent the caustic acid spreading over too large an

"On 2-year-olds and over use a de-"On 2-year-olds and over use a de-horning clippers or saw. Be sure and dehorn close to the skull to prevent further growth of the horn, as the stubs make cattle look staggy. "Dehorning should be done in the spring or fall, or any time providing weather is moderately cool.
