

U. S. WANTS NAVY FOR GREAT LAKES

Strong Feeling in Washington for Revision of the Rush-Bagot Treaty.

New York, Nov. 16,-A Washington dispatch to the Herald says: Freshwater sailors, recruited from the vast middle west, and trained on the great lakes, promise to become a highly iniportant factor in the United States navy of the future.

To aid in their development there is a strong feeling in Washington that the Rush-Bagot treaty of 1817, which limits to almost nothing the naval force of Great Britain and the United States on the great lakes, should be so revised or its interpretation so agreed upon that warships suitable for training purposes may be permitted to cruise the great inland seas. Senator Fairbanks is anxious that the sittings of the joint high commission which failed several years ago to satisfactority adjust existing differences metween the United States and Canada shall be resumed.

If he is able to bring this about th Rush-Bagot treaty will be brought be-fore the commission with an idea to ts revision or interpretation anew, so that the United States and Great Britain, should it so desire, may place training ships like the cruiser Yankee or Frairie of the United States navy on the great lakes to carry the recraits from the training station on cruisers which will nt them for duty on battleships and other vessels of the navy at home and in foreign waters.




