Death of a Famous Old-Time Circus Queen.

New York, Nov. 16.—The Herald today says: In her 101st year, Mrs. Marie Fergusson Harrison, who was in her childhood years petted by George III, King of England, and was one of the old queens of the circus, is dead in Brooklyn. Mrs. Harrison was the daughter of a bootmaker to George III, and had been the pet in her young days of dukes and duchesses. She was born in Hampton Court, Surrey, England. Her husband, John W. B. Harrison, attained fame as the original impromptu singer. Both Mrs. Harrison and her husband were long associated with P. T. Barnum. Together they were the first to introduce Tom Thumb, Minnie and Lavinia Warren and several other midgets. Fifty years ago there was perhaps no better known woman in the circus business than Mrs. Harrison.

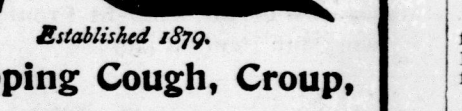

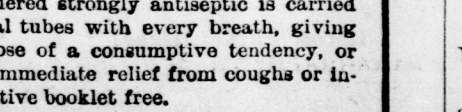

CITY COUNCIL CAN RESCIND THE KING STREET BYLAW
