

It stimulates a colony to build some drone comb.

If swarming be permitted, neither the swarm nor the parent hive will regain its normal strength during the season.

All colonies are not ready for the surplus boxes at the beginning of the honey flow, and additional space is a detriment. Surplus boxes should not be added to any colony at any time unless the bees can be induced to occupy the boxes immediately after puting them on.

When the brood chamber is full of bees, brood and honey, it is time to give additional space at any time prior to the honey season.

Conditions for swarming are a honey flow, a hiveful of combs and the circumstructured with bees. If there is no room given, the hive will swarm.

To take comb honey to the best advantage we must have good, populous colonies of bees, and when they are in this condition swarming is quite likely to occur any time.—St. Louis Republic.

WORST OF CANNIBALS.

Australian Mothers Who Eat Their Own Children.

Eels and Lizards-Warriors Devour the Eyes of Their Enemies Killed

Professor Carl Lumboltz quite recently spent several years in the wilds of Australia, partly for the purpose of studying the natives. He says that all of them are canniblas and that they are excessively treacherous. He himself would certainly have been killed and eaten had it not been that the savages dreaded his revolver, imagined that he never slept and credited him with supernatural power. A correspondent of the Detroit Newstribune says that the Australians sometimes construct primitive huts by tying a few boughs together, but they have no settled habitations, their lives being spent in wandering about in search of Professor Carl Lumboltz quite recentl spent in wandering about in search to food and water. On the march the me walk in front, carrying their weapon and the women and children follow wit and the women and children follow with the baggage. Every woman carries a flat stone for crushing edible roots; also stones for spear heads, knives and axes, sinews. 54r thread, needles of 'kangaroo bone, tinder to make fire and such roots and fruit as are gathered on the road. The women do all the work, on which account they are valuable property, and a man is rich in properties to the root.

Black men's flesh is always preferred, the natives declaring that the meat of white people is salt and nauseating.

When a boy arrives at manhood, he is permitted to eat eels and lixards. Also, he may then be ornamented with a series of attractive scars across his breast and stomach. The cuts are made with a sharp stone or with the edge of a shell, and these are prevented from healing properly by putting ashes in them or by allowing ants to walk around in them. Consequently, they heal at length in heautiful sidess. The hook is further adopted.

SOUND OF THUNDER

Distance at Which it May be Heard Rarely Exceeds Ten Miles

he Thunder from very Distant Storm Therefore Seldom Reaches the tar Hence to Record the Storms a Station Would be Needed Every 25 Miles

Every 25 Miles

In connection with the proposal to establish a number of Government stations for reporting the phenomena of thunderstorms it is stated that while lightning may be seen and its illumination of clouds and mist may be recognized when it is even 200 miles distant, thunder is rarely audible ten miles. The thunder from very distant storms, therefore, seldom reaches the ear. Hence, if every thunderstorm has to be recorded a large number of stations will be needed; probably one for ever 25 square miles would not be too many. A few stations would author, at least for the ni. httime, for the reporting of the direction and

for the reporting of the direction and movement of, every case of distant lightning.

The reason of the great uncertainty in the audibility of thunder is not hard to understand. It depends non merely on the initial intensity of the crash, but quite as much on the suroundings of the observer, even as in the quite country one will observe feeble sounds that escape the ear in a noisy city. Perhaps the most curious and important conditions of audibility is that the thunder wave of sound shall not be refracted or redected by the layers of warm or cold air between the observer and the lightning or by the layers of wind, swift above and slow below, so as to entirely pass over or around the observer.

Sound in its wavelike progress obliquely shrough layers of air of different densities is subject to refraction, and this refraction may occur at any fine and place. Thus observers at the topmast of a ship frequently hear fog whisties that are insudible at sea level; those on hilltops hear thunder that cannot be heard in the valley; those in front of an obstacle hear sounds insudible to those behind it.

The rolling of thunder, like that of

obstacle hear sounds inaudible to show behind it.

The rolling of thunder, like that of a distant cannonade, may be largely due to special reflections and refractions of sound. Again, the greater velocity of the air at considerable altitudes above the ground distorts the sound ware and shortens the limit of audibility te the leeward while increasing it to the windward.—Pittaburg Dispatch.
