The Highland Brigade, Col. A. H. Borden and the recruiting officials of the Province have made elaborate preparations for raising the necessary men to complete the Highland Brigade.

Recruiting day in the churches on Sunday started the campaign with vigor and inquiries may be expected to continue to pour in for further particulars as to just what will be done with all the men who will signify an intention of joining the Brigade.

The chief recruiting officer has been able to announce that arrangements have been made as to recruiting areas and placings for location of preliminary training as follows:

The 219th Overseas Battalion C. E. F., commanding officer to be recruited in the Counties of Halifax, Lunenburg, Shelburne, Yarmouth, Digby, Annapolis and Kings and the men will be billeted in various localities in these Counties as far as possible in the neighborhood where they are recruited.

The 185th Overseas Battalion, C. E. F., commanded by Lieut. Col. Frank P. Day, will be recruited and located in the Island of Cape Breton.

The 193rd Overseas Battalion, Col. John Stanfield, will be recruited in the counties of Hants, Colchester, Cumberland, Antigonish and Guysboro, and the men will be billeted in various localities in these counties as far as possible in the neighborhood where they are recruited.

These will make up the Nova Scotia Highland Battalions and will in a peculiar sense represent Nova Scotia at the front.

All Nova Scotians, both at

home and abroad, are urged to make every possible effort to recruit these Nova Scotia Highlanders in the quickest possible time, so that they may be trained ready to go overseas as soon as possible. It must be remembered that thorough training cannot be commenced until the battalions are fully recruited.

Who says we're sleeping, not much, everybody seems alive these days; the men sledding and the ladies attending Red Cross meetings and knitting for the soldier boys.

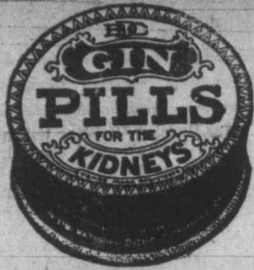

COLORED MEN FOR THE HIGHLAND BATTALIONS

Ever since the war began many applications have been made by colored men to join the overseas forces, but only a very limited number of colored men have been accepted, but the Minister of Militia has made very clear his wishes that there should be no color line in the overseas forces, and it is stated that Lieut.-Col. Borden, of the Nova Scotia Highlanders, would consider very favorably the formation of a colored company if sufficient recruits of a satisfactory character could be found to fill a company. At all events all recruiting officers have been directed to keep a list of all colored men in their district who are willing to enlist and to furnish an estimate of the number available as speedily as possible.

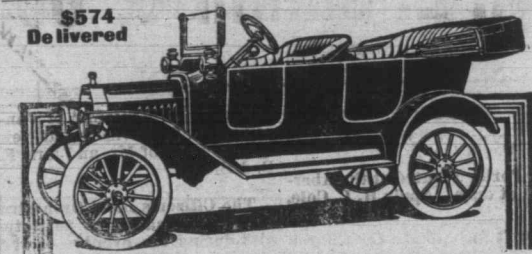

A SKIM MILK VARIETY.

Most of our dairy farmers are well accustomed to hear of milk "testing" so much, either high or low, understanding thereby that it contains a certain percentage. What is not quite so clear to the majority, is the fact that milk varies considerably in its test, or contents of fat, from day to day, even from one milking to another on the same day, and from month to month. This applies to mixed herd milk and more particularly to milk from single cows.

Thus, if milk is valued according to its fat contents, it is evidently of extreme importance to every dairy farmer to know what the milk does test; further he needs to know, whether selling cream or pooling milk, if Spot's milk tests 2.5 or 4.8, if Blossom's milk tests 3.1 or 5.2 per cent of fat. In one herd where six samples of milk from each cow were tested each month, it was found that three cows averaged only 1.8, 2.8 and 2.7 per cent of fat for the whole year. Do your cows give real milk or only a skim milk variety? You need quality as well as quantity, are you getting both? Cow testing is necessary for your peace of mind.

SOME BRITISH RED CROSS STATISTICS

There are seven Red Cross Hospitals at Alexandria and 3 at Cairo with a total of 1622 beds.

38 British Red Cross workers are serving in the Anglo-Russian Red Cross hospital at Petrograd. They include physicians, surgeons, bacteriologists, nurses and orderlies. The Empress of Russia has given the hospital 30,000 rubles.

The British Red Cross has 50 hospital ships in the Mediterranean, 5 hospital trains in Egypt, and 625 motor ambulances are in commission. It has 967 auxiliary home hospitals and its Voluntary Aid Detachments have a personnel of 67,000.

On Monday Archdeacon Martell, Chaplain of the 112th Battalion, went to Middleton where he addressed the 142 men of the 112th Batt. recruited at that place under the command of Captain Spurr, Lt. Longley second. The men were all much impressed with the earnest forceful words of their respected Chaplain. One of the officers afterward said it was the finest address to men he ever heard and that he would not have missed it for a good deal. After visiting his son, the Rev. W. Martell at New Germany and other places in Lunenburg Co., Captain Martell returned home Wednesday.

Max Rosenburge, alias Edward J. Nass, was arrested at Moncton on Saturday morning as an enemy spy suspect. It appears that he went to Moncton about nine weeks ago and secured work at the local shell factory. He came from the United States. Further investigation elicited the facts that he is an Austrian deserter from the United States army. He is being held pending further instructions from headquarters at Ottawa.

Thomas Collins of Nicholville has enlisted at Halifax and expects to leave for the battle front before long.

The Nicholville correspondent to the Register says: Our pastor, Rev. T. L. Brindley, has heard his Country's Call and enlisted in the 112th Battalion, leaving here on Monday for Windsor. This is the sixth of the young men who have been on the Nicholville Circuit to respond to the call. They are all followed by the good wishes of the people in this place. Evangelist Isaac Brindley will, so far as he can make arrangements, fill the appointments of his son during the remainder of the Conference year.

Mr. S. Baker, widow of the late Henry Lambert Baker, Esq., of North Kingston fell on the ice on Tuesday, 15th, receiving injuries which caused her death on Thursday. She was in her eightieth year.

Miss Evelyn Starr in Montreal

The Montreal Star says: The New York Symphony orchestra was to have played in that city, but because there are Germans in the ranks, the engagement was cancelled and there was arranged instead a concert with the Barrere Ensemble orchestra Miss Katherine Goodson, pianist and Miss Evelyn Starr, violinist. The Barrere orchestra, consisting of two flutes, one clarinet, two oboes, one bassoon, two horns and one big fiddle, is led by George Barrere, first flautist of the New York Symphony and a musician of wide reputation. Mr. Barrere's flute tone is the most lucious in the world. Miss Starr, a young Nova Scotian, the Star goes on to say, apparently destined to reflect honor upon her country, thinks for herself. Her numbers had all been variously played by many violinists before her; in none of them did she copy anything, yet never did she obtrude her own ideas to the detriment of the music. Technically, she is well furnished; and her tone, if not large, is firm and of considerable richness in color. With everything before her, the future should see her going far. Her numbers were Corelli's "Folia," Cui's "Orientale," the Schubert-Auer Moment Musical, Wieniawski's "Souvenir de Moscow" and the Beethoven Minuet.

There is evidence of dissatisfaction in Germany with the inactivity of the Kaiser's fleet. The Appam incident has served to revive enthusiasm. The newspapers are reporting Grand Admiral von Tirpitz not to hesitate long to go into battle with the British navy, and to prove German superiority on sea as well as on land.

Leander S. Morse, School Inspector for Digby and Annapolis, died at the Waverley Hotel, Digby, on the 20th, aged 72 years. He was a graduate of Acadia and a man highly esteemed among educationists.

HOME AND ABROAD

There is a feeling among militia men in the eastern provinces that Sussex and Aldershot will be the scene of large encampments during the coming summer in Nova Scotia three new Highland battalions are now being promoted with Colonel Borden, O. C. the 85th, to command that unit and the other three as brigadier. The expectation is that these, with the 112th, now about up to strength N. S., and that the battalions now organized or in process of organization in New Brunswick the 104th, 115th, 132nd, 145th and 165th, with possibly two other units soon to be authorized will be under canvas at Sussex in May or June and complete their training at Valcartier.

Stationary hospitals accommodating 150 returned soldiers are also likely to be established at the maritime training stations.

THE RESTFUL MURRAY GOVERNMENT.

Over two weeks have elapsed since the opening of the Legislature, and no government business has been brought down, and none appears yet in sight. It seems as if the members of the Murray-Daniels Government had come to the conclusion that the toils and perplexities of their political life are over and that they had resolved to make their passing as serene and untroubled as possible.

One thing is certain. Since the very opening of the session it has been Opposition members who have initiated every item of public business that has been considered. Prohibition, the status of the legislative council, votes for soldiers, inspection of the mining operations of the province, and the financial tangle of the Halifax and South Western Railway involving the crooked Hervey deal, have been introduced and pressed upon the government and the House by the Liberal-Conservative Opposition. One would think that the Government had completely abdicated its public functions to the Conservatives. Had it not been for the public business introduced by Mr. Tanner and his supporters, the House need not have sat over fifteen minutes on a single day since the beginning of the session.

The Government admits it has no policy on prohibition and no legislation to submit to give votes to the soldiers at the front as urged by Mr. Tanner. Up to the present there is no indication that there will be any government measures of any kind this session. The Opposition have clearly succeeded in blocking the Government's attempt to fasten direct taxation on the people. The Conservative criticisms of the measure were so incisive and effective last session, that Premier Murray was obliged to limit the operation of the bill to a single year. If the Government reintroduces it this session, it will be vigorously opposed through every stage by Mr. Tanner and his followers. Mr. Murray realizes this, and it is now an open secret that he intends to drop his taxation project, though the deficit last year was over \$120,000.

Mr. Tanner has fully recovered from his illness, and has again taken his place as the most masterful and influential personage in the Assembly. He has thrown himself into the work of the session with his accustomed energy and intentness of purpose; which have already produced substantial results. It was in response to the strong case presented by the Opposition leader that the Government agreed to consider the question of extending the franchise to Nova Scotians serving at the front.

Mr. Tanner appears to follow the details of the business of the various Government departments more closely than the ministers themselves. For instance the Victoria General Hospital comes under the Department of Works and Mines, presided over by Hon. E. H. Armstrong. The Opposition leader almost took Mr. Armstrong's breath away this week by directing his attention to the fact that the Commission at present administering the management of the Hospital has no legal authority to do so. They were appointed in 1910 for five years. Their term of office expired six or eight months ago, and they have not been reappointed, nor have successors been named in their stead. Every act they have performed on the last six months has been without legal warrant. This single instance is a fair example of the spirit of apathy and tendency to drift that mark the Murray Government. There will have to be retroactive legislation to cover up Mr. Armstrong's incompetency as an Administrator. A law will now have to be passed to do the things he and his clerks should have done last summer.

Ottawa, Feb. 25—What is apparently a scheme for generating electricity from the tides of the Bay of Fundy is intimated in the incorporation this week of the Bay of Fundy Tide Power Company, Limited, of Wolfville, N. S. The incorporators are: President, Geo. B. Cutten of Acadia University; Ralph P. Clarkson, professor of engineering; W. L. Archibald, principal of Acadia College, and Dr. John T. Roach. The company is empowered to generate, transmit and sell electricity and to use any secret or other information as to any invention which may seem capable of being used for any of the purposes of the company.

AMERICAN RED CROSS RESUMES OPERATIONS

President Wilson Appeals For Funds

An appeal for funds for the Red Cross, signed by Woodrow Wilson, President, and ex-President Taft, Chairman of the Executive Committee, has been largely circulated in the United States. So far \$1,600,000 has been received by the Red Cross. Four hundred Red Cross workers were sent to the war zone in addition to 4,000,000 pounds of hospital and medical supplies and equipment of an estimated value of \$1,245,174.

These goods were forwarded in 150 shipments aggregating 25,259 cases. It is interesting to compare Canada's Red Cross shipments of 50,000 cases of supplies valued at \$3,000,000, and cash contributions of approximately \$4,000,000 including gifts to the British Red Cross.

The funds of the American Red Cross are practically exhausted and large sums will be required if the United States is to resume its Red Cross activities.

Nearly four thousand men are required in Nova Scotia to complete the Highland Battalions under their noble commander, Lieut. Col. Allison H. Borden and its officers, Lieut. Col. N. H. Parsons, Lieut. Col. John Stanfield and Lieut. Col. Frank P. Day. The campaign opened in the churches of the Province on Sunday and an appeal was made to the young manhood of our Province which is a call to service in a regrettable but a glorious cause. The response throughout Nova Scotia will be worthy of its noble manhood.
