COUNTY NEWS.

INTERESTING LETTERS FROM OUR STAFF OF CORRESPONDENTS.
A Budget of News and Gossip—Personal Intelligence—A List of Every-thing, and Mixed up.

MALLORETTOWN.
While on a short business trip to the front a few days ago, we had occasion to spend part of a day in Malloretown, and believing that a short account of some of the principal business places and other items might prove interesting, we made a few notes from which we glean the following—Malloretown is situated about 13 miles west of Brockville and 3 from the River St. Lawrence. The G. T. R. runs through the village, and although a large amount of traffic is done here, the station buildings are, like many more to be found along the same line of railway, a standing disgrace to the old and wealthy company as the Grand Trunk Railway.

The waiting room consists of only one small room, seated with rickety benches, cold and cheerless looking, in which high and low, ladies and tramps, are all crowded together. We believe the filled and tobacco flavored, are all ready to be blown along the line of this railway as the worst in Canada, or the United States, as far as we know. Before the advent of the railway, the Village of Malloretown proper was nearly all locally owned and the main travelled road leading from Montreal to Kingston, but in the last decade the center of gravity has been at the station, about one fourth of a mile from the center of the old village.

The post office is here, the stores, tin shop, cabinet and undertaking, blacksmith shops, hotels, and business places, excepting a couple of grocery stores, are all clustered near the station. The fine brick residence of Dr. Lane is located near the center of the village and would be a credit to any town in Canada. The fine residences of A. W. and Mrs. Malloret are situated on the east side of the village. The cheese factory of A. W. Malloret, and the Union factory are both situated on the street between Mr. Malloret's residence and the station. Mr. W. Tonnant & Son carry on a general store and look after Her Majesty's mails. The post office is a model of neatness and convenience. Kelly Bros. also carry on a general store. Two large wooden boats with the names of F. Latour and Jos. Fox, indicate that foot-wear is made and sold here. The Malloret carries on a general blacksmithing business, while J. Scott sells stoves and tinware. Isaac Cole & Son carry on an extensive cabinet and undertaking establishment here and at Lansdowne, and the stock kept at Malloret seems large and varied enough to supply a large section of country. Wilbert J. Malloret has a general store, which is kept here at his calling. The township hall is situated in the old village, and is a large stone structure, surrounded by ample shed room for farmers when looking after their interests or attending to their business. The hall is in the same building. McCoy lodge of A. F. and A. M. have a fine lodge room on the second floor of the town hall, while the I. O. O. F. have a small lodge room over Cole & Sons' undertaking establishment. The public are looked after by W. J. Ferguson, who has a neat little hotel here directly opposite the station. James Avery, well and favorably known to the people of the county, has a fine brick church capable of comfortably seating all its members and adherents.

The country around Malloretown is probably the best adapted for mixed farming or dairying of any part of the county of Leeds. The soil is of the best quality, and every farm is supplied with running water from springs. The only drawback to the prosperity of the country surrounding Malloretown is the lack of water power for manufacturing purposes. With no facilities for establishing manufactures, it can never hope to become a great centre of trade, but as the farm and dairy are sure, even if slow, means of securing a competency, we are certain that thrift and careful management, so long a characteristic of the residents of Yonge front, will prevent any from throwing up a certainty even though tempted by the alluring temptations of speculative wealth in those far off countries of which so much is being said and written.

THE OVER CALIFORNIA LETTER.
The Moral, Social, and Intellectual characteristics of the Golden State.
DEAR FRIEND,—As I happen to be in a mood for writing this morning I will dedicate a few remarks to you for I feel that you are deserving of some attention and many thanks for having done me the honor to acknowledge the receipt of my feeble effort in letter writing in so laudatory a manner.

To-day, I will write only of California and attempt to briefly portray its advantages and defects, as I understand them. I am well aware that the subject is one very frequently discussed in the East and about which much has been written, but that fact does not deter me from giving my own opinion. Having visited this state for the third time and beheld it in all its seasons, I think I should be in a position to know whereof I speak and shall write as an honest authority. Before we come to any settled conclusion respecting any country or state, I think one should consider it from a moral, social, and intellectual point of view, as well as its natural advantages. As the prosperity of the people depends largely upon the latter, of that I will write first, for all must know that natural productions are the backbone of every country.

I think I am safe in saying that California produces the greatest variety of any country in the world, for in no other do we find the fruits and luxuries of the tropics in such close proximity to the productions of northern climates; but this is not to be wondered at when you consider that in but a day's drive we may go from tropics to snow. In the morning we may indulge in a sun bath and wear few clothes, may drink in the beauties of perpetual summer, and in the afternoon sit on either side of us, we may be in the midst of perpetual snow. At breakfast we may indulge in all we could wish for and have the satisfaction of knowing that it is home production, but unless you go well provided your supper in the mountains will not consist of much of a variety. Gradually as you ascend the mountains you find a different atmosphere with all the peculiarities and changes of different countries, and feel when the day is ended as though you had been almost 'round the world. Such facts and changes cannot fail to interest a tourist.

So far as the different branches of agriculture are concerned, there is nothing which may not be engaged in with profit and success, but I find a lack of industry and economy such as Eastern people are obliged to practice. Perhaps the blindest in the mountains, the gold fever has not entirely vanished, and a speculative feeling pervades everything. Their eggs are all in one basket. Mixed farming is unknown. There is too much of a monopoly in land. Most of it is held or owned by those who lack education and enterprise sufficient to bring about the best results. The average farmer will grow nothing but wheat and barley and depends on the Chinaman or Italian to supply him with vegetables. Their homes are simply places to stay in, and their ideas of happiness vary little higher than the saloons. They are rather indifferent about the education of their children, and may be said to merely exist. They don't 'live.'

The moral standard of California is not very high. No one seems to be surprised at anything heard or seen, and Sunday is sacred to the memory of nothing. Social interests do not extend very far, nor reach any very elevating height; but this will not surprise those who have learned how cosmopolitan is this state. Every nation under the sun is here represented in numbers too large for the good of the country. Your next neighbor may be an Italian, a Chinaman, or something worse; so what are we to expect. Of the latter, there are 60,000 in San Francisco alone, and the whole state is filled with them.

Speaking of Chinamen makes me recall a conversation held with Dr. Charles Cornell, who was on his way to Malloretown the morning I started West. We were discussing the merits of California and Chinamen when a stranger took it up, advocated the industries of the latter and turned the forces of my arguments against me. The Doctor was much amused, but did not meet the end, and I would feel much obliged if you would tell him for me that my friend afterward admitted that the Chinaman contributed nothing to the support of this government and little to the good of the country, finally returned his back on it with scorn and returned to China as soon as he had acquired sufficient to keep him from want. This stranger thought my statements overdrawn, and so many others, but I don't want any one to think I am in love with what the people do here. It is what might be done which interests me.

With the endless variety of productions and seasons which might be found, this might be made a paradise, but, as it is, it is no better than it ought to be.

I thought when I wrote before that the rainy season was about over, but it has since been impressed on my mind very forcibly that I was mistaken. This is the first fine day we have had for weeks. It has rained almost continually for the past two weeks and such snow storms in the mountains were never before known. Last night the first train for nearly fifteen days, arrived from Ogden, and during all that time we have had no eastern mail.

I hope La Grippe has spared a few of you. It has reached here in light doses. No fatalities.

I believe that spring has begun in earnest now for it does not seem that any more rain could fall. Last winter only eight inches fell, and this we've already had twenty five and down south nearly thirty; but through it all the frogs have continued to sing, flowers to bloom, and oranges to ripen and be eaten, and 'Tis just as 'happy as a clam.' But still wish I might share my pleasures with you in the East.

My friend and companion who came with me for his health is rapidly improving. I refer to Mr. Geo. Boyce, of Genesee, who was afflicted with lung trouble and pronounced incurable. All who knew him said he would not survive the journey through, but he did so without inconvenience to himself, and has gained six pounds, which is encouraging. He now threatens to 'sit on me' if I do not cease writing, so please excuse me while I take him for a walk.

CORRESPONDENCE.

A Question for Athens.

Editor THE REPORTER:

There will be a big fire in this village some day, so the people say. Is there any protection? Answer—No, no. Then use common sense and make ready to protect your homes and property before the evil day comes.

I will give you a few thoughts on a cheap plan, as I view it at present, to give an efficient protection. Put down a well near the old school, that being the height of land in our village; then put up two tanks like the one at the station, or larger, on a treble 25 feet high; when filled the water at top of tank would be at least 35 feet from ground; then add 15 feet of a fall to Main street, and you have a water pressure from a fall of 60 feet. That pressure, I think, would throw a stream to the top of any building on Main street. A wind-mill could be utilized to pump the water into the tanks. Then put down a 4 inch pipe to main street (320 ft.) and let that stream to the top of any building on Main street. This with a few hydrants, this with a few hundred feet of good hose, would reach and protect say from Taplin's corner to S. B. Williams' sh-p, also down a stream to the top of any building on Main street. This is where the most danger is, as the buildings are close to or joined to each other, and if one burnt others would go.

This system, I think, would work well for our little village, and there would be no delay. The water would be on hand as soon as the hose could be attached to the hydrants and the work of extinguishing the fire could be commenced at once.

Some way of protecting our village in case of fire is much needed, and I will give ten dollars to protect my neighbors—the business men of our village. I hope that someone will carry the village and see what can be done. I believe everyone would do something, and those men who are most benefited should be liberal.
