Government Still Playing Possum.

THREE WEEKS OF SESSION GONE AND NOTHING TO SHOW FOR IT. ONE SITTING OF THE HOUSE DEVOTED TO SPRING PORTS.—NO HOPE FOR GOOD ROADS FROM THE PRESENT ADMINISTRATION.

(Special Correspondence.)

Press Gallery, House of Assembly, Halifax, March 16th.—Another week has gone by the boards and still the Murray mis government have nothing of importance to present to the house. Three good, full weeks it is since the members were called together, yet aside from the stray legislation that seems to filter in, in the shape of private bills and the reports of some heads of departments, nothing of a substantial nature has been before the House. The speech from the throne was not entirely devoid of suggestions of legislation. There was the redia-tributions bill, for instance. The speech gave the members to understand that what a bill would be brought down. Where is it? Surely the government had it prepared. Then why is it kept in the back room? There is no press of business to compel it to wait. For that matter there is no business to compel anything to wait. On Friday last the House was in session only one hour. There was nothing for the House to do and the members were sent home. Mr. Murray has already been told

by one of the strongest liberal papers in the province that he has lost his grip. There are many in Halifax to day who believe that he has lost his nerve also. His hesitation to bring down the general and necessary legislation would seem to back up this suggestion. There seems to be hardly any room to doubt the general impression that he is afraid of the opposition. Of the seventeen years he has been premier of the province, the last session on and the present one have been the only ones in which he has had to face a good fighting opposition. Last session he had the first fight of his life and there is no doubt he dreads another one.

Twenty five private bills were introduced on Thursday. It was the first day for the reception of such. If you want a bill introduced during the remainder of the session you will have to pay extra fees. Mr. Parsons introduced a bill to enable the town of Hantsport to borrow money for

electric light purposes, and Mr. Zwick introduced one to enable Mahone Bay to borrow money for school purposes. Mr. Tanner introduced a bill to enable Westville to borrow money to purchase lands as a site for armories, also a bill to amend the charter of Pictou town; also a bill to enable Stellarton to borrow money.

Hon. Mr. Armstrong laid on the table of the House a pamphlet entitled "Better Roads and Cheaper Living." This pamphlet is to be distributed. If you requisition the government for better roads they will send you a pamphlet—and you should be glad to get it. You will not get the good roads—from the Murray Government.

Mr. Butts ventured the suggestion that the issuing of this pamphlet fore shadowed an early election. For the education of the House and as there was little or nothing doing, he read a couple of verses which appeared on the title page, one of which read as follows:

When the smiles of spring appear, Drag the roads; When the summer time is here, Drag the roads. When the corn is in the ear, Every season of the year, Drag the roads.

It is up to date poetry, sure enough, and the House enjoyed hearing Mr. Butts read it. But when he added

Dr. Bisset, who has eaten the Murray lotus, did not take kindly to Mr Butts' departure into the poetic realm. He declared that Nova Scotia had the best roads of any province in the Dominion. It would seem

from the Doctor's statement that the government really thinks that the roads of this province are in good condition. It is well for the public to know what to expect from the Murray government in the matter of good roads.

Mr. Morrison added his quota to the debate. He reminded the government that there was a public meeting called, to be held in King's county, to form a good roads association. This does not look as though the people were of the same opinion as Dr. Bisset, but it does look as though the people of the province have lost all faith in the Murray government and its road policy.

The session on Friday was short and sweet. A number of bills were dealt with and the opposition tabled a number of questions and orders one of which was Mr. McLeod concerning the legislative council. This question, or order, seems to have caused consternation in the government camp, judging from the attitude of the Chronicle. That paper wants to know what Mr. McLeod means by asking for the issuance of such an order. It may find out later.

The following were elected officers for the year: pres., Mrs. W. Mitchell, Wolfville; vice pres., Mrs. J. Turner, Kentville; rec. sec'y., Mrs. J. B. March, Berwick; cor. sec'y., Mrs. Langille, Wolfville; treasurer, Mrs. N. Morton, Berwick.

After the devotional exercises of the evening meeting Mrs. Morton, president of Berwick Union, gave a

valuable address of welcome to the delegates, which was fittingly responded to by Mrs. Stackhouse, of Wolfville. Rev. J. D. Spidell, of Kentville, gave a very inspiring address on "Temperance work in Kings County, emphasizing the superiority of the Nova Scotia Temperance Act over the 'Scott Act'."

A paper, "What are we doing for the stranger within our gates," by Rev. Mr. Bryant, of Wolfville, who was not able to be present, was read by Mrs. W. Hibbert. Excellent music was furnished by the choir, special features being a solo by Mr. Arthur Marsters and a duet by Mrs. W. O. Taylor and Mrs. Chas. Thomas, which were excellently rendered and enjoyed by those present.

After expressions of thanks to the people of Berwick for their kind hospitality, the meeting closed with prayer by Dr. Chipman. The closing meeting of the convention was held on Saturday morning when matters of business were taken up and the following resolutions passed:

"We, the Kings County Women's Christian Temperance Union, in an annual session, do appeal to you, our Municipal Council, in regard to prisoners in our county jail, that humane and economic reasons they be given employment to be paid for and the money sent to their families, who would otherwise be destitute or a charge upon the community, while the wage earner is living in idleness, at the county expense. To this end we appeal for a Municipal Farm, on which prisoners can be given wholesome work and drink, and as many of them as possible retained."

We also ask for a Municipal Rock Quarry and other suitable work, which will not only furnish employment for prisoners but for men all over the county when out of employment."

The following lettergram was also sent to Ottawa to the Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden and to Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "Whereas, in view of the enormous consumption of, and expenditure for liquor and tobacco with all their attendant evils, we, the Kings County Women's Christian Temperance Union, in annual convention, do appeal to you for our manhood and homes, especially for our youth, as well as for economic reasons, to urge advanced temperance and anti-tobacco legislation.
