EUROPEAN INTELLIGENCE.

FRANCE. The Council of State again assembled on Saturday, the Emperor presiding, for the examination of the budget of expenditures. Prince Napoleon and all the Ministers were present. The twenty-two members of the Chamber of Deputies were also present.

The Legislative Assembly met on Monday, M. Billault presiding, and adopted, without discussion, eight bills of purely local interest. M. Boucher de l'Elvaine having thought it his duty to vote without having taken the oath, M. Billault ordered his vote to be cancelled.

An official article in the Monitor, ascribed to the pen of the Minister of Finance, attracted the attention of forty millions of taxation have been remitted which pressed most heavily upon agriculture and the laboring classes, at a time when all the resources of the nation ought to have been applied to prevent her ruin; and that 60,000 men have been liberated from the army, and restored to their fields and workshops.

The Minister, of Wednesday, publishes an Imperial decree, annulling a credit of 16,000,000 of francs effected in 1852, and which has remained unemployed, and restoring to the budget of 1853 a credit of seven millions, of which two are to be devoted to the railway Paris to Cherbourg, and five to that from Bordeaux to Orléans.

The Assembly Nationale has received a "first warning," for having published an article in which it asserts the principle of a national right upon which rests the Imperial Government. The Prises and the Medes have also been "warned."

M. Buechek, the European agent for the New York exhibition, had been admitted to an audience by the Emperor, who assured him, that the Imperial manufactures should be worthy represented.

In the Legislative Assembly, on Tuesday, another scene occurred on the contrary. M. Boucher de l'Elvaine took the oath to the Emperor. The Assembly voted, by a unanimous bulletin of 221, that it was incumbent on M. DEADLY GALE AT LIVERPOOL. The vessel was visited on Saturday last with one of the most furious gales of wind that ever blew. Many vessels broke from their moorings and drifted up the river, while the collisions, which were almost inevitable, were in some cases of a very serious description.

The outer gate of the London Dock were broken, about noon, by the violence of the waves. The Royal Breeze. During the last fortnight, the whole kingdom has been visited, at various intervals, with very heavy snowstorms, and also with severe gales of wind and dreadful hurricanes.

Snow-Storm in Aberdeen: and Loss of Life.—The snow-storm continues with unabated severity, and is by far the greatest experienced for many years. All the postal arrangements are much deranged, except of the mails being fifteen hours behind their time.

The Town of London.—On Saturday last Viscount Combermere, the Constable of the Tower, visited the old fortress, and selected the Ordnance-office, situated at the east side of the White Tower, and opposite the Horse Armoury, as the most proper for the reception of the funeral car of the late Duke of Wellington.

THE AUSTRALIAN GOLD FIELDS. The latest advice received from the Australian colonies are by the Spanish Henry, to the 1st of December inclusive, which put into the Cape on the 16th of January.

Fresh deposits of gold have been discovered on the Korrang river, which seem likely to eclipse previous discoveries. The metal is chiefly found in the form of nuggets. From Schuman, it seems, the accounts are still most favorable, pounds weight of gold being spoken of as freely as ounces formerly.

BEAUTIFUL EXPERIMENT.—It has long been known to Physiologists, that certain coloring matters, if administered to animals along with their usual food, pass on the property of coloring largely into the system and tinging the bones. In this way the bones of swine have been tinged purple by madder, and instances are on record of other animals being similarly affected.

The royal mail steam-ship Africa, which should have sailed for New York about noon, got under way, as usual, shortly before that time, and stood off on, waiting the arrival of the mails, but was compelled to come to an anchor again, it being utterly impossible to embark the mails on board the tender at the Pierhead, much less to convey them to the Africa. She was, in consequence, detained until Sunday.

HUMAN BODIES FOUND IN GUANO.—From the ship Brandenborg, unloading Peruvian guano at Leith, there were examined the remains of three persons, evidently Peruvians, buried in the guano, and which had apparently not been disturbed in the process of loading the ship.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY. TUESDAY, MARCH 26. POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT. Hon. Mr. WARBURTON, from the Committee to whom were referred the several matters and Petitions presented to the Post Office Department, to examine the same, and report thereon,—submitted the following:

Your Committee, appointed to report on several matters and Petitions connected with the Post Office Department in the Colony, submit—That, from the Returns of Postage received at the different Offices, it appears that the amount of Postage between St. Eleanor's and the North Cape is about equal to the present expense of the Couriers in that direction; and as the business through the Post Offices will increase proportionally with the annually increasing Trade and Population, the Committee of the Colony, your Committee recommend that the Mail from Charlottetown to Tignish be conveyed semi-weekly between 1st May and 31st Dec. yearly.

BRIDGE OVER SOURIS RIVER. The Hon. Mr. CAMPION, from the Committee appointed to prepare and report the Draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on the subject of a survey of the site of the intended Bridge across Souris River, reported the Draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee, which was agreed to by the House.—The Address resolved to direct a survey of the site of the intended Bridge, and that a Plan, Specification and Estimate of the expense of the Bridge be prepared and laid before His Excellency in Council, in order that the work may be proceeded with as early as possible.
