





"Farming has for a number of years (but more clearly since the McKinley bill came into operation) been on the downgrade and in a very depressed state. ously. Nearly all the young people are leaving the old folks on their farms and going to the States; the land consequently is badly farmed and getting run down. Houses and buildings in many instances are falling out of repair. Any number of farms can be purchased at very low figures, often for less than the houses and
