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NEGRO JACK JOHNSON WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

Tommy Burns, Noted Canadian Pugilist, Met Defeat in Fourteenth Round in Sydney, Australia, Yesterday and Lost Heavy Weight Championship to Johnson.

Sydney, Australia, Dec. 26.—Today Jack Johnson, the colored heavy weight, gained the title to the world's championship by beating Tommy Burns in fourteen rounds. The champion was outclassed from the start.

The challenger carried such a spirited hostility to his opponent's body and head that he soon had Burns in a sorry plight. The Canadian stood up under the most vicious kind of punishment for thirteen rounds. He came out for the fourteenth round as if he were a man, mercifully ordered the referee to stop the contest.

Both men appeared in the pink condition. Johnson had many rounds the advantage in weight. Each appeared almost perfect specimens of physical strength. Burns seemed trifling pale in comparison to his swarthy skinned rival, but he was self-assured. Each gave out before putting on the gloves that they were fit.

Johnson won the battle from the opening gun. In the very first round he almost put Burns away. Burns seemed to carry the fight to the end of the drop of the hat, and when he was at his wits' end, a mad man as the song changed. But he had calculated wrong. Johnson was on the alert for just such a rush and calmly side-stepped the onslaught and shot a wicked right upper cut which landed on the jaw of the champion, toppling backward, full length on the canvas.

Johnson was still far from the finish. He came up slowly after the count of eight, apparently not much the worse for what he had done. Again he rushed again with the crushing right which landed on his head. The champion wobbled and staggered backward, but before Johnson could press the advantage Burns had again collected his wits and landed the giant blow for the first time. It was a hard right to the chin that shook Johnson to the ground. They boxed a while and the champion showed some very clever blocking, though Johnson shot in a left at the bell. Everybody who had backed Burns, excepting those who bet after the first round had ended.

The case with which Johnson had outboxed Burns, was the champion which the big negro connected with the vital spots on the anatomy of his antagonist. Burns, the King and Queen of the Canadian, Burns, of course, had been forced to carry a bold attack to his abony rival, in the hope of evening the first fatal advantage, but the end of six rounds found Burns baffled at every angle.

Then the black came out of his shell. Apparently satisfied that he had robbed Tommy of his sting, Johnson began to enter the battle to his enemy's territory. In the seventh round Johnson dropped Burns for the third time with a crushing right to the body. He hit Burns almost at will, and had both his eyes almost shut. The champion's lips were swollen, and against these sore spots Johnson directed a fusillade of blows. In courage only was Burns a match for the new champion.

After this round in which he had the advantage, Johnson once more assumed an indifferent attitude. He seemed to be wreaking double vengeance on the man whom he had followed across the world to meet. The humiliation which Johnson had submitted to in the matter of the division of the purse was forgotten in the light of sure victory. Johnson stopped fighting to torment his man. Every blow of Burns he met with a leer. The black roared the white to stand up, and refused to return his leads. He deliberately took some of Burns' best meant blows just to show the public that Tommy had shot his bolt. And Burns, perhaps for the first time, realized that he was in for a defeat.

LEFT GAS TURNED ON

Regina Man Nearly Asphyxiated in Toronto.

Toronto, Dec. 25.—The fact that Regina, a young woman from Regina, who came to Toronto on Thursday to spend the Christmas season with her sister, neglected to turn off the gas jet, was completely off when he retired Christmas eve, spoiled the well-planned festivities in one family. At ten o'clock yesterday when the young man failed to make his appearance the door was broken in. He was found unconscious. He may recover. The accident to Regina, has added interest from the fact that a year ago a brother lost his life by asphyxiation while making an attempt to rescue a companion. He was working in a well near Regina, when it caved in. Regan went to aid and sacrificed his life in a vain attempt to save his friend.

When the hospital was reached the man was dead. Alfred Anderson, found unconscious in a gas filled room at the Oxford hotel, was the unfortunate victim.

SMALL BLAZE AT VEGREVILLE.

Vegreville, Alta., Dec. 25.—A fire started last night in a warehouse belonging to and adjoining Mrs. Geraghy's confectionery and fruit store, greatly endangering three other buildings. The fire was discovered by a clerk in the store, and the fire brigade summoned and extinguished in about thirty minutes. The loss was about \$100,000, origin of fire unknown.

TWO MEN FOUND DEAD.

Toronto, Dec. 25.—Two sudden deaths occurred on Christmas day. Henry Fort, 70 years of age, was found dead in his chair in rooms at 104, Mackay street. William McNola, 51 years of age, was discovered dead in bed this morning at 214, King street east. An inquest will be held.

WANTS MARRIAGE MADE EXPERIMENTAL

Russian Woman Wants Perpetuity Eliminated From the Civil Contract—Others Don't.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 26.—During yesterday's session of the congress of Russian women, Miss Anu Boshina proposed that the congress should exert itself in favor of the establishment of experimental marriages. Perpetual marriages, she declared, were often immoral, and sometimes the cause of the gravest injustice, deceit and sin. Several women delegates supported the proposal, but opponents were not lacking.

PITTSBURG POLITICS

Seething of Accusations of Revelations of Aldermanic Craft.

Pittsburg, Pa., Dec. 25.—There is every indication tonight of a decided political upheaval here owing to the exposure in the council grant case. The voters' league which for a long time has been hunting this testimony, held an important meeting last night and it was decided to put up a ticket for the next election, a ticket which will include the mayor and councilman candidate in every ward where there is now a councilman accused of grafting. Every one of the seven councilmen under arrest is a candidate to succeed himself and the term of Mayor Guthrie is now drawing to a close. The dense ignorance of some of the Pittsburg councilmen is shown in a statement made openly by them that the last week's upheaval was simply a move on the part of Mayor Guthrie to succeed himself in office. The mayor of Pittsburg cannot succeed himself.

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CITIES FIGHTING FOR TERMINALS.

Toronto, Dec. 23.—A hot battle for Thunder Bay terminal of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway has begun between Fort William and Port Arthur. The latter has secured the services of a prominent Toronto law firm, and a representative of the firm has placed the claims of Port Arthur before two members of the Ontario cabinet. He urged them to hold up the hand of the Grand Trunk Pacific branch unless Port Arthur secured what the city regards as its rights. The records show that the subsidy was granted to the Lake Superior branch for 270 miles from the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific to Port Arthur, and the railway has applied for the subsidy, amounting to \$2,000 a mile, and 3,000 access land.

POLICE STOPPED REIFER.

Toronto, Dec. 24.—The police swooped down on G. Lette's house, 540 King street west, last night, where a big raffish for Christmas party was in progress. Eighteen men were summoned to court.

RAILROADS FOR THE ARGENTINE.

Buenos Ayres, Dec. 25.—It is arranged that the loan of \$2,000,000 assigned with Baring Bros. is to be used for railroads and public works. It is denied that an English syndicate is about to propose to the government to finance Buenos Ayres harbor facilities and build a canal.

DEVIL IN CHILL.

Ottawa, Dec. 24.—Hon. Charles R. Devlin was taken suddenly ill while leaving the church at Avonlea, Quebec, this morning, and has had to cancel all his engagements in connection with the Quebec by-election. He is suffering from collapse.

GEOLOGICAL DIRECTOR.

Ottawa, Dec. 25.—The Gazette contains the appointment of Reginald W. Brook, M. A. of Ottawa as director of the Geological survey. This is confirmation to the post actually held for some time. He will be under Deputy Minister A. H. Low, of the mines department.

1,000 YOUNGSTERS FED.

Toronto, Dec. 25.—1,000 new-born and homeless youngsters were given a Christmas dinner at Massey Hall. The funds were supplied by general subscription.

MAY HAVE CASTRO ARRESTED.

German Companies Are After Him for Alleged Plunder.

London, Dec. 24.—According to the financial news, a movement has been initiated by German stockholders in the companies plundered by Castro to try to get him arrested in Germany on a charge corresponding with the English crime of larceny. It is argued that Castro being now only an ordinary citizen is amenable to the ordinary law, and his victims think an appeal to the German courts should succeed.

G.T.P. COLONIZATION WORK.

A Winnipeg despatch says: The Grand Trunk Pacific has just completed its plans for the most vigorous and energetic immigration campaign that has been undertaken by any road since the great transcontinental lines first concentrated their resources upon pushing the population to the thin virgin west. The scheme has been taken up with equal completeness on both sides of the Atlantic. Mr. W. H. Hinton, assistant general passenger agent, who is directing the colonization movement, returned today from a trip to the west, where he has been organizing at the distributing points. He says that people will not go there blindly. They are wiser and more appointed over inadequate facilities. He will find such beginnings of settlement as will amply the way from prairie life under more favorable conditions than has been possible in the past.

The railway all the way from Winnipeg to Edmonton will be in a position, so far as the track and equipment are concerned, to rush through tens of thousands of people, who will make their homes on lands that for fertility have never been equalled. Farmers with little capital and abundant energy are the type of settlers most desired just now, and many have already come from Great Britain and the United States.

OPIMUM CONFERENCE POSTPONED.

Washington, Dec. 23.—Word has reached the state department from Dr. H. H. Wright, that he was leaving Manila for Shanghai to attend the meeting of the International Opium commission on the 27th of January. Bishop Brooka also a member of the commission will follow later. The meeting of this body was originally set for January 1, but the matter is narrowing down to a cash settlement. This may be announced in the near future.

LAWYER GOT THE MONEY.

London, Dec. 23.—A communication from the attorney-general states proceedings in the case of W. H. Bartram, a lawyer who for months has been fighting a charge of embezzlement of \$15,000 from Marlon Bowles, a client, who left money in his trust several years ago. Bowles will receive about \$3,000.

VANDALS IN MONTREAL.

Montreal, Dec. 24.—In broad daylight today three toughs smashed the door of the dwelling of G. A. Lavoy with an axe, broke a gas motor open and cleared out a lot of furniture. A lone woman in the house at the time was so frightened she was unable to give an alarm.

AUSTRIA LIKELY TO ACCEPT TERMS

Chances of Early Settlement Are Good—Austrian Foreign Minister Will Likely Lose Position.

Vienna, Dec. 23.—The latest developments in Balkan affairs are believed to have given a fatal blow to the position of Baron Van Achenarthal, the Austro-Hungary minister of foreign affairs. The Russian answer to the Austro-Hungary ultimatum is almost to a threatening of negotiations, while those with Turkey are proceeding with astonishing slowness. The Hearst News correspondent learns from a trustworthy source that both the Czar and King Edward have plainly intimated that they have no confidence in the present foreign minister and therefore Baron Achenarthal's tenure of office is precarious. His most probable successor is the Hungarian statesman, Count Jules Andrássy, also mentioned. A conference of Austrian representatives abroad will be held after Christmas and to those representatives Turkey has fixed the compensation to be demanded of Austria for the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina at \$20,000,000. Although Austria continues, through its ambassador at Constantinople to assert that this sum is preposterous, it is tolerably certain that a settlement will be made at a figure approaching that named. The negotiations are progressing slowly but the matter is narrowing down to a cash settlement. This may be announced in the near future.

Amoy, China, Dec. 23.—The Manila immigration authorities have instructed the Amoy officials to be especially strict in the exclusion of those who may have left their homes, but desire to return there.
