

SOLIGNUM

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance trated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clean; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Mouths and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.





LONDON, May 24. Morley moved the second reading of the Veto Bill in the Lords to-day, Although emphasizing the fact that the Bill must pass the Lords as it stood, the Viscount's speech was conciliatory. He dwelt on the substantial and important powers still left in the hands of the peers. Morley. said when the Bill passed it would he open to the Government not only to consider the reconstruction of the Second Chamber, but whether some less dilatory procedure than that provided in the Veto Bill might not be desirable. He favoured the settle ment of the question of reform by greement between the political parties, but the Government would not consent to the Second Chamber's construction on the principle of resistance to their legislation. Morley concluded his address with the hop that the Peers would avoid any course which may lead the country into a great difficulty, or perhaps into grave

BUDAPEST, May 24. The first meeting of the Interna tional Committee of the Olympian Cames was held to-day. Archduke Joseph. representing the Emperor nade the speech of welcome, and in he evening gave a reception to the delegates. The chief work of the Committee is to arrange a programme for the fifth Olympian games, to be neld in Stockholm, 1912, and select a place for four years later.

Five Bankers Drowned on Quero and Point Verde.

Recent advices received in the city from banking vessels which arrived up the S. W. Coast, say that for a month or so very stormy weather has prevailed on the Banks, and that much gear has been lost, and sad to relate five human lives have been sacrificed. Last week the banker Marian Captain Dibbin, arrived at Sydney from Quero Bank, reporting that two of her crew, Messrs. Emberly Smith had been drowned by heir dory being struck by a sea as they returned to the vessel with it deeply laden with fish and upset. The captain and cook, the only men on boald, saw the accident from the Marian's deck, but as all the rest of the crew were fishing they had nothing to launch to go to the rescue. Both men were drowned before their eyes. The Gertrude, Capt. Walter Kennedy, which arrived at Sydney, also reported two of her crew missing. It is thought that they also overturned their dory with fish, and swamped, though there is the possibility that some vessel might have picked them up.

When the weather became excel tionally stormy yesterday morning a boat from Lamanche, trawl fishing off Point Verde, had her skipper lost. His name was James Flynn, of Lahim he went overboard. The accident was seen by two men in a dory who about a 1/2 mile off and they rowed to his rescue, but he disappear ed long before they reached the spot where he went overboard. Much sympathy is is expressed at Lamanche for the wife and family of deceased.


