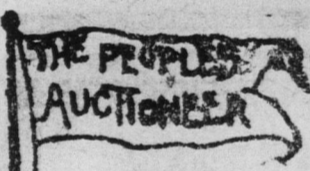

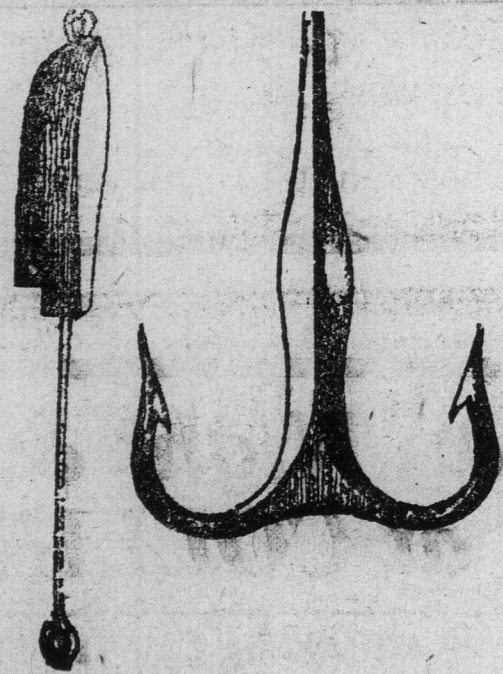

"And look here," he went on, pointing out a little paragraph at the bottom of the page about a man who was suing the city for damages. "I used to know him, too. He was my Sunday School teacher, once."

"It's really peculiar," he concluded, as he folded the paper up and tossed it on the table, "how often I see things about people I know in the newspapers."

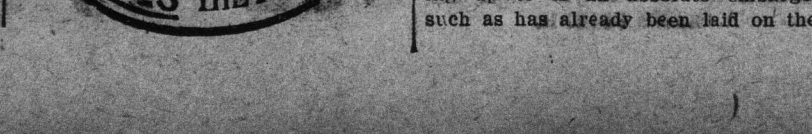
Household Notes.

The top of a child's stocking is usually the first place to show signs of wear. If the new stockings are lined down as far as the knee, the garter fastening will not tear it so quickly. Do not fasten the lining at the lower edge, as this would make an ugly seam.

To keep suet, remove the skin, put it in a saucepan and place on a warm fire. Let the suet melt gradually. When melted, pour into a pan of cold water. When hard, wipe it dry, wrap it in a piece of white paper, then in a piece of line. Store in a cool place and when wanted it may be rubbed on a grater.

Every gardener will appreciate a kneeling board. It can be used when planting, weeding or cultivating the flowers. It is made from a piece of wood, 12 x 24 inches, under one long-edged nail, with a support three or four inches high to keep the board at a comfortable angle. The upper surface of the board should be padded.

Potato omelet is delicious. Take a large, freshly baked potato and scoop out the inside. Beat this until smooth and mix with it half a teaspoonful of paprika or white pepper, one-half teaspoonful of salt, a dessert spoonful of lemon juice and the yolks of four eggs. A minute or two before the omelet is fried fold in the whites of the eggs beaten to a froth. Fry in a well-greased, very hot pan and serve in a hot dish.

Chinese, on the immigration of all Japanese of the coolie and artisan class. Her immediate and material interests by no means favour such a policy. California wants labour above everything else, and enough white labour is not to be had. The foundations of the State's development, her railways, irrigation, and reclamation works, were made possible by the influx of Chinese labourers.

"They have now filled the gap left vacant by the Chinese. As farm hands, fruit pickers, domestic servants, and railway workers, their services are not only sought after; they are indispensable. They form a law-abiding, intelligent, industrious colony. They have most of the economic virtues of the Chinese, and few or none of their moral failings; and nothing in the nature of a Japanese 'China-town' has ever existed in San Francisco. They are rarely drunken or disorderly. They go to America merely to work. They never become a charge on the treasury, or beg in the streets, or meddle with politics, or concern themselves in any way with governmental or religious institutions and strife, but lead a separate, harmless life, leaving the country when they have hoarded enough to provide for the remainder of their days."

As scientific farmers and market-gardeners they put Americans to shame; and if California were to repatriate to-morrow every Asiatic within her boundaries, her material progress would hardly recover from the blow in twenty years. There is hardly a housewife on the Pacific Coast, or an employer of labor, or an agriculturist who would not suffer by their exclusion.

CRYSTAL GAZING FAMILY GOES MAD.

Paris, May 10.—The danger of consulting a crystal gazer has just met with a terrible tragic illustration in the little village of Saint Remy in the department of Deux Seveves.

The trouble began with the death of a pig that died without apparent cause on M. Gauthier's farm. The owner consulted a sleepwalker who had the reputation of being a clairvoyant, and who, after gazing into her crystal, declared that evil spirits had entered the Gauthier house and unless they were driven forth all the farm stock would perish and the family become mad.

The village priest was at once asked to come and exorcise the demons. He refused, saying that the church would not stoop to co-operate with a crystal gazer.

The other morning the whole family went suddenly mad, one of the daughter's being first afflicted with hallucinations. The sons went to the priest's house, and brought him by force to the farm, where he was shut up and ordered to pray. Meanwhile the Gauthier family armed with torches and cudgels pursued the evil spirits through the rooms.

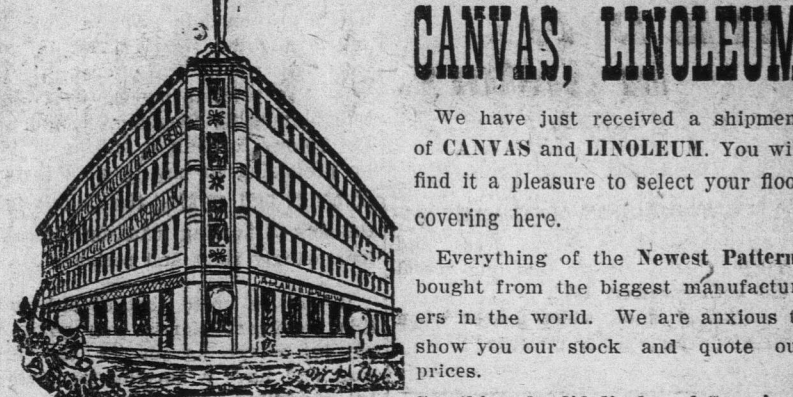

Notes and Comments.

Morris has added Seven Million Dollars to the Public Debt of Newfoundland, and involved the country in liabilities which will add millions more to that burden under which the people are already struggling.

He has shown himself a financial blunderer of the most exaggerated type and one of the most extravagant and wasteful leaders of a Government with which Newfoundland has ever been unfortunate enough to be afflicted.

Would any reputable financier get off such a jumble of misrepresentations and nonsense as appeared in the official report of his speech at Burin in October of 1911. Read again the words of this blustering politician and ask whether he is fit to run a bullseye shop:

"By a successful loan of four million dollars at three and a half per cent, which I raised last year in London, at 9 1/2, the highest rate ever obtained by the Colony before, we have been able to build all these railway branches (meaning all those contracted for in 1910 and which are not all built yet), and pay the interest on them out of our regular revenue, and after all this we still have a surplus left, which we have given back to the people in the shape of all the public utilities, which I have named."

Could a callow political apprentice make a worse jumble of a financial statement than this? In the first place Sir Edward muddles up the issue price with the price he realized. The loan was issued at 9 1/2 but he only realized about 93, so that in fact the loan was raised at 93. The country got \$93 and will have to pay back \$100. This loss of seven dollars on every hundred of the loan of Four Million Dollars is due to Morris's colossal blunder in undertaking to pay the contractor in gold instead of bonds, as the Whiteway Government did in undertakings of a similar nature. Morris's undertaking to pay the Reid Bond Company in gold instead of bonds will mean by the time these obligations are met, that the Colony will eventually have to pay

half a million dollars more for the railway at the Morris price in gold than they would have cost at the Whiteway price in bonds. Just fancy this blundering financier letting in the Colony for half a million dollars by promising to pay in gold instead of bonds and making the Colony take the risk of floating loans on a market increasingly tight and stringent.

It will be noted that according to this statement Morris was going to pay for everything out of the first loan and have a surplus for giving out, muddling up surplus-on revenue with the railway loan. He has already raised a second loan and has blundered the matter so badly in this wonderfully constructed contract, that a third loan will be needed. If dire disaster is to be avoided, dare such a financial blunderer be left in charge of the country's affairs after next election?

The Dominion Athletic Association.

Enthusiastic Annual Meeting.
The annual meeting of the Dominion Athletic Association for 1913 took place at East Wabana last week, and the largest number ever in attendance at a meeting of this progressive Association was present.

Dr. H. P. Gouthro, medical practitioner with the D. I. & S. Co., occupied the chair, and the financial report of last season was received and adopted, showing the Association to be in good standing. The entire business of last season being disposed of, Mr. Fraser Hynes was appointed chairman for conducting the election of officers and Messrs. R. T. Pine and E. Blackmore as scrutineers. The election resulted as follows:—

President—Dr. H. P. Gouthro.
Vice-President—Mr. J. M. Greene.
Treasurer—Mr. J. J. Miller.
Secretary—Mr. L. C. Murphy.

In connection with the return of the above executive it may be stated that Dr. Gouthro was re-elected President for the third year; Mr. J. J. Miller, Treasurer for the fourth term; while Mr. J. M. Greene who occupied the Secretaryship during the first two years of the existence of the Association was this year elected as Vice-President.

Much discussion took place over the season's programme, and it was decided to take an active part in the athletic contests on the Iron Isle during the season, and the boys of the "Red and Grey" hope to render a good account of themselves the coming summer. The Dominion Athletic Association held the Kent-Shes-Dwyer trophy for the years 1910-11, but last season in the final game lost to the Nova Scotia A. A. In the annual Bell Island Field Sports last year, all of the nine cups offered for competition were won by the representatives of the D. A. A. who captured nine out of eleven possible events. With the former spirit in evidence, as displayed at their annual meeting, the D. A. A. will no doubt be heard of in the sporting arena.

Franklin, nephew of Postmaster General Samuels, who was due to report himself to the prison authorities on May 12, under the terms of his license but he failed to keep his appointment. He was sentenced on March 8th to nine months imprisonment for setting fire to railway carriages, but was released on the plea of ill-health, resulting from a hunger strike. The license given him was afterwards torn to bits at a suffragette meeting, where it was announced Franklin had been forcibly fed fourteen times.

In a fight against the Government for a free press, parties after mature consideration decided to adopt a plan which is new in England but has been found effective by German Socialists in combatting stringent press laws. Should the Government prosecute Jas. Ramsay McDonald for printing "The Suffragette," he will be followed by other labor leaders until the Government is forced to capitulate. These two labor members of Parliament announced yesterday their readiness to undertake the responsibility of printing "The Suffragette," contending it is illegal to suppress newspapers in advance and declaring that they were ready to stand by the consequences.

PARKER & MONROE'S NEW SHOE FACTORY PARTLY GUTTED—THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS WORTH OF DAMAGE DONE BY FIRE AND WATER.

About 6.10 p.m. yesterday, the dangling of the fire bells told of the outbreak of a blaze, and a thick pall of smoke in the extreme West End of the city indicated the location of the conflagration which was the big three-storey Boot and Shoe Factory of Messrs. Parker & Monroe, on Alexander Street. One of the first to notice the blaze was Mr. Walter Clouston, who sent in one of the alarms and Mr. Fred Knight, insurance man, who was near, says that the flames burst suddenly through one of the western windows in the middle flat

and shot fully twenty feet in the air. As a fine pressure of water was on from the street and the fact that the weather was calm ensured the safety of the building from utter destruction and possibly the woolen factory near. The seat of the fire was on the second flat near the McKay machine and when the fire fighters arrived ladders were quickly run up and the enemy attacked in its stronghold. The firemen literally flooded the blaze out, but not before the middle flat where the operators mostly all work had been gutted, whilst the upper flat was also damaged by fire which ate up through there. All the operators quit the factory promptly at 6 p.m., and Mr. Thomas Walsh, the foreman, about 6.15, Mr. Walsh's duty is each evening to be the last to leave the place. Before he does so (and this he did yesterday) he goes right through the building to see that everything is secure. Yesterday he turned off all the gas in the place, put down the windows, and everything as far as he knew was perfectly secure. The fire it is thought started at the McKay machine where the wax is heated by gas jets. The thread for sewing the boots passes through this wax, and it is thought the over-heating of the receptacle which held the wax caused the fire. The machinery, stock, belting, etc., is practically all damaged by water and smoke, and middle flat is gutted by fire. The fire was under control in about 20 minutes. In the second flat about 6,000 pairs of boots and a large number of nearly finished boots and shoes ready to come down to the store, were badly damaged. The insurance approximately as far as Mr. Parker could remember last evening

was \$12,000 on the building, \$20,000 on the stock and \$10,000 on the machinery. The following companies are involved: Yorkshire, Hartford, Rismouski, Liverpool London & Globe, Queen, Guardian, Commercial Union, Royal Law Union and Rock, Phoenix, Fidelity, British Dominion, Caledonia, Union, North British Mercantile, Phoenix of London, Nova Scotia, National of Ireland and the Sun.

Boy Run Down.

While returning from the fire in the West End last evening the Central fire horses were followed by a crowd of boys. One of the number was knocked down by a motor cycle which was turning New Gower Street when it struck the lad and threw him into a drain. The victim was cut about the head and otherwise badly shaken up. He was taken to Dr. Pritchard's surgery for treatment and later conveyed home.

Shot the Brute.

The vicious dog which bit several children in the neighbourhood of Garrison Hill and Harvey Road, attacked another child yesterday and severely wounded it. Police Fireman Neary, of the Central Station, went after it with a gun and shot it. The brute had so much vitality that it took four bullets to kill him.

Started Repairs.

To-day the energetic firm of Parker & Monroe started to get their damaged machinery in the factory in order, and the work of repairing the damaged factory began. The fire will not affect their spring trade as they have a large stock of boots and shoes in their Water Street stores.

Mr. Hanrahan
Honored

By St. Francis Xavier's University.

At the commencement exercises of
St. F. X. University, Antigonish, N. S.,
which took place on yesterday, the 13th
Inst., the degree of Master of Arts was
conferred on the popular Superintend-
ent of Education for the Diocese of
Harbour Grace. The writer in extend-
ing congratulations to Mr. Hanrahan,
and wishing him many years to enjoy
this well merited honor, takes occasion
to offer this brief resume of his
educational career.

Mr. Hanrahan was born January
4th, 1863, at King's Cove, B.B. He
entered the local school taught by his
father, the late Thomas Hanrahan,
Esq. King's Cove School was one of
the five or six commercial schools
(something like our present High
Schools) in the country. There he re-
ceived a thorough training in English,
Arithmetic, Theoretical and Practical
Navigation, Mensuration, etc. At an
early age he entered St. Bon's College
and under Professor O'Neil made good
progress in English, Latin, Greek,
French and Spanish, won the prizes
for navigation, mensuration, French,
Spanish, vocal music and elocution,
and at leaving College in 1878 came
second for the gold medal for general
excellence. Rev. Dr. M. Ryan, of
Rochester, N. Y., and Mr. James Mc
Grath, barrister at St. John's, having
been first—ex aequo—for same.

Mr. Hanrahan would have continued
his studies abroad but the greatest
inconvenience that can befall anybody—
the death of his good mother—followed
not long after by that of his kind
father forced him to relinquish his
cherished desire. So in the same year
we find him in charge of the King's
Cove School with pupils in attendance
from all parts of the bay, and thus
through them conferring beneficial re-
sults over a very wide area indeed.

On the appointment of the late
Archbishop Macdonald to Harbour
Grace Diocese, and at the recommen-
dation of Father W. Veitch, now the
beloved Monsignor of Conception, and
life long friend of Mr. Hanrahan, he
was appointed to the Academy of Har-
bour Grace. Here he spent over 17
years of good, hard work, always win-
ning the affections of his pupils and
enjoying the esteem of the community.
In 1899 he was made Superintendent
of Schools for Harbour Grace Diocese
and has occupied this position up to
the present. He is, therefore, directly
connected with education for the long
period of thirty-five years. During
that time there has been very great
improvement educationally not only
in the whole country but in Harbour
Grace Diocese especially, *ejus pars
magna fuit* Thomas Hanrahan.

During his incumbency as Superin-
tendent the schools of Harbour Grace
Diocese have increased from ninety-
two in 1899 to one hundred and forty-
nine in 1913, and the teachers from 94
to 145 in the same period. The Edu-
cation Grants to the Diocese have in-
creased almost 100 p.c. from \$19,000
to \$37,000; eight Superior Schools
have been established, and Catholic
education has received such an
impetus under Mr. Hanrahan's direc-
tion that it has made rapid progress
and advance all along the line.

Many people who do very little
thinking fancy that the position of a
Superintendent of Education is a sine-
cure, and that he leads a kind of but-
tery existence. Those who know
Mr. Hanrahan well need not be told
that he is a buoyant, energetic, en-
thusiastic worker. His work em-
braces, besides the yearly visitation
and inspection of schools, suggestions
to the Government as to grants, their
increase and allocation, and in con-
junction with the Superintendents of
other denominations the dealing with
and solving of educational problems
involving the general educational con-
ditions of the Colony. Personally,
he upholds strongly the idea of de-
nomination education; in this, as well
as in other respects, he enjoys the con-
fidence and friendship of His Lordship
the Bishop of Harbour Grace, the
clergy and teachers. Mr. Hanrahan is
a member of the Knights of Columbus,
and has filled the offices of Lecturer
and Chancellor of Dalton Council, of
Harbour Grace. He is also President
of the Town Club of the Second City.
He is a good citizen, a Christian gen-
tleman, a credit to the place of his
birth, to the town of his adoption, to
his native country. Long may he live
to enjoy this new and well deserved
honor. Ad multos annos Supt. Han-
rahan, M.A.

The Discovery of the Pacific.

"Then felt I like some watcher of the skies
When a new planet swims into his ken.
Or like stout Cortez, when, with eagle eye,
He stared at the Pacific—and all his men
Looked at each other with a wild surmise—
Silent upon a peak in Darien.

The closing lines of Keats's famous sonnet are inevitably recalled by the celebration of the four-hundredth anniversary of the discovery of the Pacific Ocean, which took place at the Royal Geographical Society's rooms on Tuesday, where a paper on the subject by Sir Clements Markham was read.

Sir Clements emphasized to a representative of the Pall Mall Gazette his sense of the importance of such commemorations.

"The discovery of the Pacific Ocean I regard as one of the greatest and most important in the history of geographical research. The actual anniversary will be next September, but as the Geographical Society's session will then be over, it is being kept to-night instead."

The Real Hero.

"But was Cortez really the discoverer of the Pacific, as Keats puts it?" was the query.
"No; Vasco Nunez de Balboa was the man. There is no reason why Keats should not have used the name Nunez instead of Cortez if he had known. It would have fitted his verse equally well. Nunez was one of the best Spanish conquerors, one who overcame by far the greatest difficulties by the most praiseworthy methods, and whose life was as romantic as his death was deplorable and sad."

Farmer Who Went to Sea.

"Vasco Nunez de Balboa was a bankrupt Spanish farmer, who began

his voyage of exploration as a stow-away in a water cask, and finished as the conqueror of Panama and the discoverer of the Pacific Ocean, which he reached on September 25 or 26, 1513," says the Star.

"Landing at one of the colonies which the Spaniards had formed along the coast, Vasco Nunez persuaded the colonists to elect him their leader, and sent his predecessor in office back to Spain as a prisoner.

"At this colony of Santa Maria Del Darien he built the first church ever erected on the American continent, and began his wars against the natives, one of whom endeavored to distract his attention from the plunder of their villages by promising to lead him to rich countries 'by the side of a great sea'."

"So on September 1, 1513, Vasco Nunez started with 190 men to find the Pacific, taking with him a pack of bloodhounds, who inspired such terror that he drove all the opposing Indians before him, until he reached the foot of a mountain whose summit commanded a view of the new sea.

"Of his 190 men only 67 had enough strength left to commence the ascent, and all of these abandoned it before the top was reached.

"Then Nunez started alone to climb the last few hundred feet, and when he reached the top and saw the sea his first act was to commence singing the 'Te Deum.'"

The opening of the Panama Canal will complete the conquest of the Isthmus.

"Magellan became convinced that if he sailed far enough down the east coast of South America he must either find a strait or the termination of the land. He discovered the strait which bears his name, and was the first that crossed the Pacific. It was seven years after its discovery by Nunez."—Public Opinion, May 2.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
ATHENS, May 13.
The Greek Government has consented to give its support to a project to hold a series of international Olympic games here in the spring of 1914.

OTTAWA, May 13.
A private message from the Duke of Connaught, to Lieut. Col. Lowther, his Private Secretary, at Rideau Hall, reads: "During the last three days the Duchess has shown a steady improvement."

HALIFAX, May 13.
The journeymen carpenters, of whom 200 have been on strike for the past month, returned to work this morning, accepting the three cents an hour increase offered by the contractors.

LONDON, May 13.
Mrs. Drummond has been removed to a nursing home on a doctor's certificate, and could not appear at Bow Street Police Court to-day, when the hearing of the conspiracy case was resumed.

HALIFAX, May 13.
The Nova Scotian Parliament was prorogued this afternoon after one of its longest sessions. It has been not only long, but arduous, owing to the great mass of business which came before it, and the number of important and contentious bills.

MUNICH, Bavaria, May 13.
Major General Von Lewinski, a Prussian military attache to Bavaria, was killed here to-day by a supposed lunatic, who fired three revolver shots at him. A sergeant of police was also killed. The General was attacked in a crowded street.

HALIFAX, May 13.
A cable from Bermuda, announces that H. M. training ship Cumberland, with Prince Albert on board, sailed from there yesterday and is due on Thursday. She will remain in port 15 days, and reach St. John's June 28th, sailing thence for Devonport, England.

NEW YORK, May 13.
Dr. M. A. Strim, former aide of Dr. Friedmann, who recently entered suit against the latter to recover part of the profits of the sale of the serum rights, claims to have been the discoverer of the turtle vaccine secret. He says he will make the secret known for the benefit of the people.

TORONTO, May 13.
Benjamin van Hoesen, 309 High Park Avenue, will be married in Holland, to-night, by proxy, while he sleeps in Toronto. This will probably mark the first time that a Canadian resident has been married to a girl, thousands of miles across the sea, in his absence. The bride is Diana Sarilous, of Amsterdam. Capt. Leefman, a life-long friend of the groom, will be his proxy at the altar.

NORTH GALE, Arizona, May 13.
More than 500 dead are lying on the field above Guzman, as a result of three days desperate fighting, last week. Colonel Juan Cabala, who arrived to-day at Thermozello, from the front, reported that he had estimated the killed to exceed 600. A train load of oil and firewood was rushed south, with which to cremate the bodies. An official report from General Obregon, the insurgent commander, stated that the federals killed number 600, with 800 Huerta soldiers taken prisoners. Both sides have been executing all non-combatant officers who have been captured.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, May 13.
The British cruiser Aeolus sailed from here Saturday evening, ostensibly for Belize in British Honduras. Her real objective is said to be Puerto Barrios, Guatemala, to enforce a settlement of the long standing claims of British subjects against Guatemala. Recently Britain placed a time-limit on this settlement, which expires on May 15th. In the latter part of April Guatemala made an appeal to the Government at Washington against reprisals; its ministers directing attention to the situation, pointed out that plans were under way for a large loan, with the proceeds of which it proposed to pay its debts to British bondholders and reform the currency system.

STAFFORD, Ont., May 13.
At their post of duty, during a fire, which completely gutted the handsome Knox Presbyterian Church in this city, this morning, Chief of Police McCarthy, Constable Hamilton and Fire Chief Durkin, were instantly killed, when the huge burning bell-ringer crashed from a height of 140 feet, catching the unfortunate men before they could reach a piece of safety. Fireman Venstone was also struck by flying timber and badly cut about the face and head, but will recover. An electrical sharp flash struck the high steeple about half way up. It immediately took fire. The brigade

was at the scene within a minute, but owing to there being no water in the tower the men were helpless, as the streams did not approach the burning spot. The fire cut its way through the steeple, and the burning embers set the roof ablaze. Chief Durkin, who was standing by his ladder, placed against the building to enable the men to reach the roof, noticed the top of the ladder burning. He called for assistance to remove the ladder. Hamilton jumped to his aid, just as the heavy timbers and thousands of brick-topped and fell with a tremendous thud. McCarthy and Hamilton were instantly killed. Durkin died on his way to hospital. The loss will be heavy, but cannot now be estimated, although the insurance on the church was \$24,000. The new organ, which cost \$10,000, and was to be finished in order to hold the formal opening this month, was destroyed.

Talk in Sleep Not Evidence.

Denver, May 9.—Here's good news for husbands, wives and every body. You cannot be held responsible for what you say in your sleep. The supreme court has decided the matter and "there's an end out." Furthermore, Jose Benedito Martinez, of Conejos county, who was tried and convicted of the murder of a woman, Fortunata Campbell, in July 1910, gets a new trial.

At the trial, a clerk, a witness for the prosecution, testified that he heard Martinez exclaim in his sleep: "I shot her! I shot her!" The supreme court holds that the lower court erred in allowing this statement to go to a jury. It has reversed the judgment of the district court. The exclamation may have had no relevancy whatever to the case at issue. Martinez may have been dreaming that he was out after rabbits or ducks and bagged one.

In delivering the opinion of the court, Judge Garrigues said: "The jury was allowed to consider an unconscious statement of the defendant. It is only the voluntary statements of the accused that can be used against him. If the defendant was asleep when he spoke he was not conscious and the statement should have been excluded."

Armour-Plate Patriotism and the Real Thing

"A painful impression has been made in Germany," says the Times, "by the statements of Dr. Liebknecht in the Reichstag."

"Measured by the space given to the affair in the newspapers and the gravity with which the Parliament is discussing it, the Empire would seem to be on the threshold of a painful scandal," says the Daily Mail.

The Allegations.
Dr. Liebknecht declares that:—
1. Persons in the employ of Messrs. Krupp have bribed officials at the War Office in Berlin in order to obtain information regarding the German Army increases and the tenders of rival firms.
2. Messrs. Krupp and the Deutsche Waffen und Munitions Fabrik, of Berlin, another armaments firm, have resorted to illicit methods of inducing leading French newspapers to create an anti-German feeling in France and so facilitate the German Army increases.

The Berlin Morgenpost summarizes public opinion as follows: "The country's final verdict must be withheld pending the result of the official investigation, but the proceedings in the Reichstag already permit the following to be regarded as established facts:—

1. The war material industry uses the foreign Press to exercise pressure on Germany for increases in armaments.
2. The industry practices espionage at the expense of the military administration for the purpose of acquiring manufacturing secrets and secret armament plans.

"Putting all these things together, one secures a picture of corruption whose existence under the nickname of 'armour-plate patriotism' has long been in the public mind."

"The crowning irony in the conduct of these firms, which live by exploiting patriotism, is their own freedom from it," says the Chronicle.

Safes Full of Secrets.
Dr. Liebknecht named Herr von Dewitz, an ex-officer and a prominent official of Messrs. Krupp at Essen, as the custodian of "safes full of surreptitiously obtained secret reports." The incriminating documents on which the present charges were based, had, he said, been seized from Herr von Dewitz by the police. The deputy himself was in possession of copies of some of these reports and had given the War Office access to them.

"Dr. Liebknecht declared that Messrs. Krupp for years had operated by means of bribery and the treasonable disclosure of military secrets." The information so obtained included, he said, not only the figures of rival tenders but also construction secrets.

Worse than Panama
"When I was asked how much Germany owed to Krupp he would ask how much Krupp owed to the German people, and whether the hundreds of millions now possessed by this firm did not come out of the pockets of the poorest of the poor."
"The armament makers were the same people who absorbed the millions that were taken out of the pockets of the people, the same people who clamoured for oppression of the masses and exceptional laws against the Socialists, the same peo-

ple, who, as model patriots, charged Social Democracy with being anti-patriotic."
"Summing up his charges, Dr. Liebknecht said the affair could only be described as 'a Panama worse than Panama'—referring to the great corruption scandal in connection with the French Panama Canal Company ten years ago."

The resignation of General von Heeringen, the War Minister, is called for. General von Heeringen was told that the public would not be satisfied to have "small thieves hanged and the bigger escape." Finally he had to give a pledge that the Reichstag would be kept fully informed of the progress of the inquiry which is being conducted by two separate tribunals.

Our Own Rings.
"Let us not make the mistake of supposing that Germans are much worse than other men, and these evil influences are confined to Germany," says the Daily Chronicle. "The profits made by Messrs. Schneider in France and the astounding prosperity of the firms composing our own shipbuilding 'ring' are not beyond comparison with those of Krupp's. And some at least of the paradoxes are repeated in these cases. Here, for instance, are Messrs. Vickers and Maxim building Dreadnoughts in Italy for the Italian Government. Navy League arithmetic counts these as ships against which our Government has to build; and so a patriotic demand secures fresh Dreadnoughts, which means fresh orders for Messrs. Vickers and Maxim, or their competitors of the 'ring.'"

A Dilemma Problem.
"The special problem of the relation between armament firms and a Government is very difficult. By a natural process these firms always tend to become more or less a ring of a monopoly. On the other side they all have but one regular customer, and that a customer who in the nature of things cannot follow quite the free and elastic procedure of a private commercial purchaser."

However badly Krupp behaved, the German Government could probably not avoid making large purchases from them; and however successful Krupp were in selling to outsiders, they would be ruined if they got no orders from the German Government. The inter-connection of the British Admiralty and the great warship firms is not less intimate. Let us hope that it may not have the same bad features; but let us recognize that it is almost bound to, unless an unceasing watch is kept against them."

Dust

Dust is an elemental variety of pulverized mud which grows in great profusion on pilanos, hard wood floors and quartered oak sideboards. It is considered so much of an ornament by some people that it is never interfered with except when it comes time to celebrate the golden wedding anniversary.

Dust is usually removed with the bare hand, encased in a piece of cheesecloth, and can be chased from one room to another all day long without being captured. On a windy day more dust will walk into the house through the cracks of a new cement residence than a neat housewife and two debilitated hired girls can subdue in a week. When the dust becomes so bad that a casual visitor can be tracked from the reception hall to the woodshed by his feet alone, it is a sure sign that house cleaning time is here.

Some parts of the country produce a very tenacious quality of dust, which adheres to people who sit down—in a chair without first brushing it off with a pocket handkerchief. It is very embarrassing to a hostess to see one of her guests sit down in a blue silk dress and rise up in disgust, having performed the function of a carpet sweeper.

Dusting is a painful and awkward pursuit which takes the place of Swedish gymnastics in the home. After a woman has crawled over and under all of the down-stairs furniture and skated down a winding staircase, with a dusting cloth in both hands and a pea-green dusting cap tilted rakishly over her left eye, she will not feel like paying \$4 an hour for a set of Delsarte exercises.

The greatest enemy to dust is the street sprinkler, which drops around three times a day and assaults it with pure, scold water. Whenever anybody refuses to contribute, the street sprinkler will refuse to give down in front of his house, thus allowing about half a block of thoroughly screened dust to drift into the neighbour's homes and give a sour aspect to the front lawn.

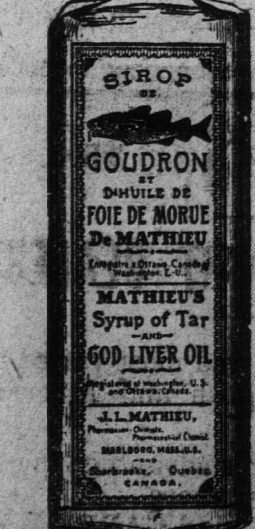

A Kindly Word to 'T.N.M.'

All men, and women, too, are more or less misunderstood, both in what they say, as well as in what they do; and this has happened in my notes as published in last Saturday's Daily News.

A kindly and impartial correspondent in yesterday's Telegram, over the initials T.N.M., takes me to task for my favorable impressions of the concert given on Thursday last at the College Hall for the benefit of the C. of E. Orphanage. I desire to thank the writer for this further notice of the concert and for the opinions it contains of my contribution. Opinions differ, and tastes differ; but perfection is not yet.

T.N.M. evidently was impressed with the weaker portions of the programme, and allowed them to create prejudice against its worthy and more estimable features. The programme had weak points, and what programme has not? But there was certainly sufficient of literary ability, of musical skill, of artistic display, and of refining influence, to far outshine these weaker points. The good and the edifying, was what I looked at, and what I wrote about.

My interpretation of all character is from the standpoint of the best; and if any man or woman, or any institution or organization, can be helped by any good word that I can say or write, then that word shall be written and that word shall be said. And so with the concert in question. As the object was a most praiseworthy one, and its rendition was greatly to the credit of the gentle performers, both were worthy of more encouraging reports than they received; and as no one else undertook to say a good word beyond the regular reports, I published my impressions.

There is ample room in every walk of life for more good words and kindly acts than we have; and even though these may be sometimes a little misplaced, they are none the less in order. There is enough of severe criticism, and keen competition, and small doings in the business side of life to crush out of it the best and worthiest that we possess.

We live in the age when we have allowed modern business to drive us almost as dumb beasts before it, and when the higher ideals and aspirations of life are almost paralyzed by the mad race towards the altar of dollars and cents. The life that many business and public men live is not worth the price they are paying. They have lost their better selves, and are so absorbed in their pursuits that they see not the smallness of their horizon. They are slaves and victims of a system that is contrary to nature and to reason; and the result is that before their time they age; and when life should be at its best, they are unknown beyond their tombstone.

There is room for a higher standard than that which we now follow, and if we are ever to attain unto it, we must be prepared to see the best in life, and to do and say, all the good that lies within our power. This is what I claim to do; and this is what I tried to do in my report of the concert. I did not assume a critical analysis. I should certainly like to see it done better, because it is worthy of better. In closing, I again thank T.N.M. for the interpretation put upon my writings in general. Such an interpretation is indeed a high compliment, and implies a worthy motive; and of which I desire to be more worthy.—J.C.M.

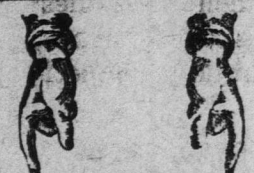
