LONDON, Dec. 8. The Salonika correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Company sends the following despatch under date of Tuesday: Weather conditions having improved the Bulgarians on Monday bombarded the entire British line at Strumitza for the whole day. Then they launched an infantry attack





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
