

A Worthy Follower of Nelson.

Rear-Admiral Sir Christopher Craddock, who lost his life in the Coronel seafight, was born on July 2nd, 1862. He entered the Navy in 1875 at the age of 13, took part in the Egyptian war of 1882, and was present at the battle of Tokar in 1891. In 1892 he was first Lieutenant of H.M.S. "Dolphin," and helped to rescue the officers and crew of the Brazilian corvette "Almirante Barroza." In 1894 he jumped overboard and rescued a midshipman from drowning off the coast of Sardinia. In 1900 he commanded the British Naval Brigade at the capture of the Taku forts, and afterwards directed the allied forces in the operations for the relief of Tientsin. In 1911, when the P. & O. liner "Delhi," stranded on the coast of Morocco, he rendered valuable assistance. Three months after the outbreak of the great war he was in command of a small squadron which was cruising off the coast of Chile, his flagship being the "Good Hope." The others were the cruiser "Monmouth," the light cruiser "Otranto." On Nov. 1, 1914, Admiral Craddock met a German squadron under Admiral Count Von Spee, near Coronel, Chile. The German ships were the "Scarnhorst," "Gneisenau," "Leipzig," "Dresden," and "Nurnberg." They were superior in size and armament to the British ships, but Admiral Craddock warned off the "Canopus," which was coming up from the straits of Magellan, as her speed was insufficient to cope with the Germanss, and he ordered the 'Otranto" to keep out of danger. He then, with his three ships engaged the German five for all he was worth. Unfortunately, the British ships were in a position where the setting sun interfered with their aim, while the Germans had heavier guns and of greater range. The result was that the "Good Hope" and the "Monmouth" were sunk, and the "Glasgok" escaped. Admiral Craddock went down

On Friday, July 1, 1785, James Edward Oglethorpe died at Cranham Hall, in Essex, the residence purchased for him by his wife, the surviving wealthy heiress of Sir Nathan Wright, barrister, then Lord Keeper of the Great Seal, and thus chairning of the House of Lords, though not a peer. Ogiethorpe was buried in the Church, which contains his monu-ment with an extraordinary long inscription. Born in London on December 22, 1696. -- 7 baptised next day in his parish church of St. Martin's-inthe-Fields, he entered Corpus Christi College, Oxford, as undergraduate on July 8, 1714. He had, in 1710, entered the British army as an officer, and in 1743 he became a general, and assisted the famous Eugene, Prince of Savoy, when defeating the Turks in Eastern Europe. But Oglethorpe wa most famous for his philanthropy in founding in 1733 the State of Georgia now one of the most south-eastern of the present United States of America. He so named it after George the Sccond, from whom he had obtained a charter giving royal authority. Oglethrophe founded Georgia to provide a refuge for British paupers and debtors, and similar distressed persons. But his military profession helped him to serve his country there also, partly at his own expense, against the Spaniards, who were the first European colonists of America, but have now not one scrap of it. To resist their attacks he allied with the natives. whose tribes in Georgia were the Cherokees and Miscogees. But his humaneness was shown in other ways. Since 1562 negroes had been seized, in Africa by British and other Europe ans, to work as slaves in the Wes Indies and America—England employing in 1786 130 ships, which carried off for this purpose 42,000 of those natives. The British Parliament did not forbid this practice till 1807; and S. Lewis, Golf Avenue, wish to thank Mrs. Rose and family, Mr. C. 





In 1921 Conference will be held in Gower St. Church. The signing of the minutes and the pronouncing of the Benediction concluded the Conference of 1920.



An Appalling Railway Disaster.

One of the most appalling railway

disasters in England took place at

Salisbury Station, at two o'clock on the morning of July 1, 1906, when a special express train, carrying fortynine passengers, who had disembarked from the liner "New York," at Plymouth, was derailed while rounding a curve at high speed. The train left the Ocean Quay at 11.13 p.m., and in accordance with the usual schedule would have made the run of 231 miles from Plymouth to Waterloo in about four hours and twenty minutes, with one stop at Templecombe Junction to change engines. It was one of the fastest long distance runs on the south Western system. When the train approached Salsbury shortly before two o'clock, the majority of the passen gers were trying to sleep; others had just finished dinner. The train seem ed to gather fresh speed as it enter ed the long stretch of perfectly straight track which leads to Salis bury Station from the west. It clear ed the station exactly at 1.57 a.m., but just past the platforms the engine wheels failed to take a point at the curve, and in the twinkling of an eye ce against a milk train standing or thound line, the carriages be hind being dragged almost at righ angles across the rails, burying the upants-living and dead-under



pile of twisted iron and splintered woodwork in a manner that almost baffled description. The crash of the accident was heard at least a mile wait on Rev. Dr. Pedley and present away, and quickly a force of police were helping the porters in the work of rescue. Within a quarter of an hour several doctors were on the spot. The loss of life was found to be very serious, twenty-four passengers and four of the company's servants being killed, and eleven passengers and two of the company's servants injured.


