

Art Exhibition Open.

NEWFOUNDLAND PAINTINGS AND DRAWINGS.

The exhibition of drawings by Mr. Wilfred Wood of England opened at the Empire Hall this morning at 11 o'clock. Already quite a few have viewed the works and they are unstinted in their praise of the artist. Although Mr. Wood Works mostly in water color, he does not confine himself to that medium, and he exhibits some splendid pastels, pen and ink sketches and lithograph work. Landscape seems to be his forte, and in this he has made some excellent selections from Logy Bay and Waterford Valley. Amongst his paintings are a field of grain in sheaf (Pastel), Waterford Valley looking towards the city and showing Waterford Hall (water color) Pond Petty Harbor (water color); Logy Bay showing Sugar Loaf Head (Pastel); Logy Bay showing fishing stages (water color); Syme's Bridge looking towards the city (water color); Southside Hill Autumn trees (water color): Logy Bay in pen and ink and water color wash; Headland Logy Bay evening scope, showing fish in faggots (water color); view from Waterford Bridge station (water color.) In all there are some 25 pieces of local scenery hesides quite a number of striking scenes from England and Spain. An exquisite atmospheric quality pervades Mr. Wood's landscapes, and he seems to be particularly happy in the management of his colors. In his trees and sky effects he shows himself to great advantage. The exhibition is well worth a visit by anyone interested in art, and all who can should avail of the opportualty which Mr. Wood has kindly placed at their disposal. It may not be generally known that the exhibition is tree to the pub lic, but any who care to, may help along the cause of the S.P.C.A. 

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
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
