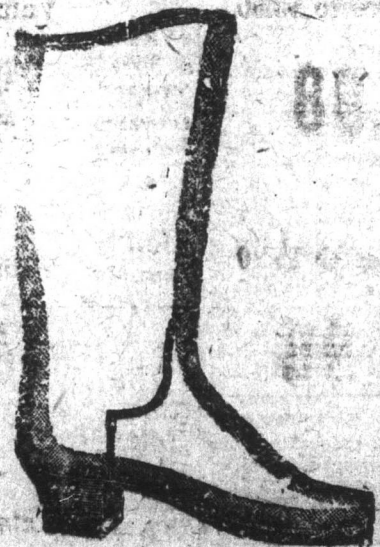

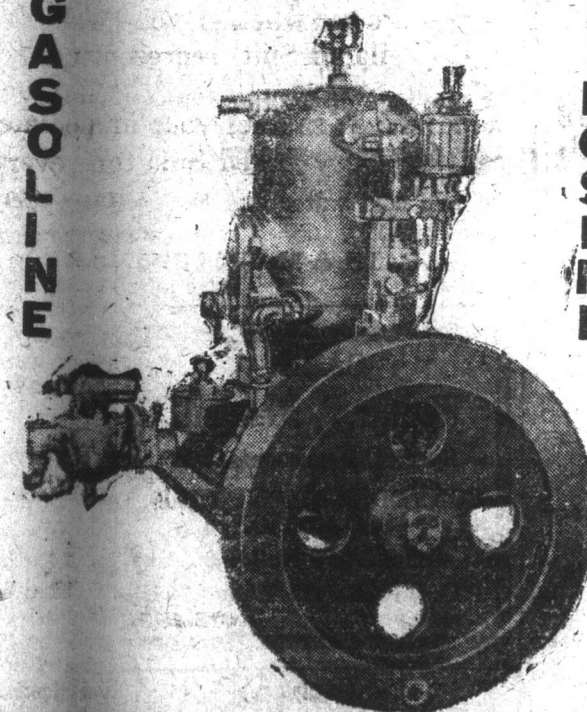

Where Jade Comes From

History of jade—one of the popular ornaments of the day—of interest to the innermost end of the East of China the wonder of that strides westward, 2000 miles, from Shan Tai to the Pacific Coast, to the 1,500 miles away. Here, and beside it is a gate to the wall, one of the most trade routes in the world, leads into the heart of the Roof of the World—the Yu Men, the Jade Gate.

Each that gate for 3,000 years has passed the caravans carrying jade from the quarries of Khotan, to be wrought by the laborers of China and Japan. There is no material for the mere caravans to handle. Very nearly as hard as diamond, it must be ground with a drill and paste of a yet harder than itself; first then emery, and last of all flint. It is a stubborn and resistant material, and the glorious caravans occur not in masses but in thin shavings, a duller matrix. Years ago the Chinese recognized the colors—from a clear white, like rock crystal, to the brilliant green that nowadays comes only from the Himalayas—the modern name of mandarin jade. 

Honouring the Sailor Dead

Brilliant Scene at Buckingham Palace—Famous Airman Killed—Explosion on Board Schoolship—Emigration Conference Approves Medical Examination Vaccination—British Flier Arrives at Atiyab.

BRILLIANT SCENE AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.
LONDON, May 21.—London's social season of 1924, which is expected to be the busiest and most brilliant since the glorified days before the war, began last night with the royal splendour of a royal court by the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace. As is the custom with the first court of the season, the guests, numbering about 1,000, were drawn mainly from diplomatic and official circles, but there were also a small number from general circles of society, among them many Canadian debutantes. From all over the world, women of wealth and social standing came to London for last night's court, making many a trip of thousands of miles for the special purpose of being presented at the Court of St. James, which is an essential requirement for all who would be really in British society.

FAMOUS AIRMAN KILLED.
MELBOURNE, Australia, May 21.—Captain Andrew Lang, former holder of the world's airplane altitude record, was killed to-day when he drove an auto into a fence, during a dense fog, while he was making a 24 hour drive test.

THE EMIGRATION CONFERENCE.
ROME, May 21.—The first committee of the International Emigration Conference has approved a motion by Italian delegates calling for medical examination and vaccination of emigrants before leaving.

EXPLOSION AT TOULON.
PARIS, May 21.—An explosion aboard the armoured schoolship Patrie, at Toulon, wounded 18, four most seriously, says a navy communiqué. The accident occurred during practice in loading the 16 centimeter gun.

THE DEADLY FUNGUS.
TILLSONBURG, Ont., May 21.—Raymond Wilfred Simas, 16 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Simas, who live four miles south of Tillsonburg, lies dead. His parents are at the point of death, and two sisters, 18 and 14, respectively, are slightly ill, as the result of eating mushrooms.

HONOURING THE SAILOR DEAD.
MONTREAL, May 21.—Forty steam craft will participate in a ceremony in Montreal Harbor, on Saturday next, when a small, silver buoy, bearing up a flower-covered anchor, will be dropped into the river to float down St. Mary's current to the sea, in honor of the sailor dead. The tribute will be paid under the auspices of the last post fund.

DIARIES STOLEN AND ALLEGED "FRAMING."
WASHINGTON, May 21.—The Senate Daugherty Committee was told to-day that representatives of the Department of Justice had not only sought to "frame" Senator Wheeler, its prosecutor, but had spied on its members and its witnesses and had spirited away the famous diaries of Gaston B. Means, who was working with it as an investigator.

MACLAREN AT BURMAH.
SHANGHAI, May 21.—Stuart MacLaren, British aviator, flying round the world arrived at Akrah, Burma, to-day, from Calcutta, said a despatch from the former point received here to-night.

These are but a few of the items which cost millions of dollars which the people will have to pay for. During the past four years millions have been secured on loans to be wasted yet the public debt has been increased and the burden is ours for many


years to come. Twenty-one million dollars increased debt is the Coaker record for four years.

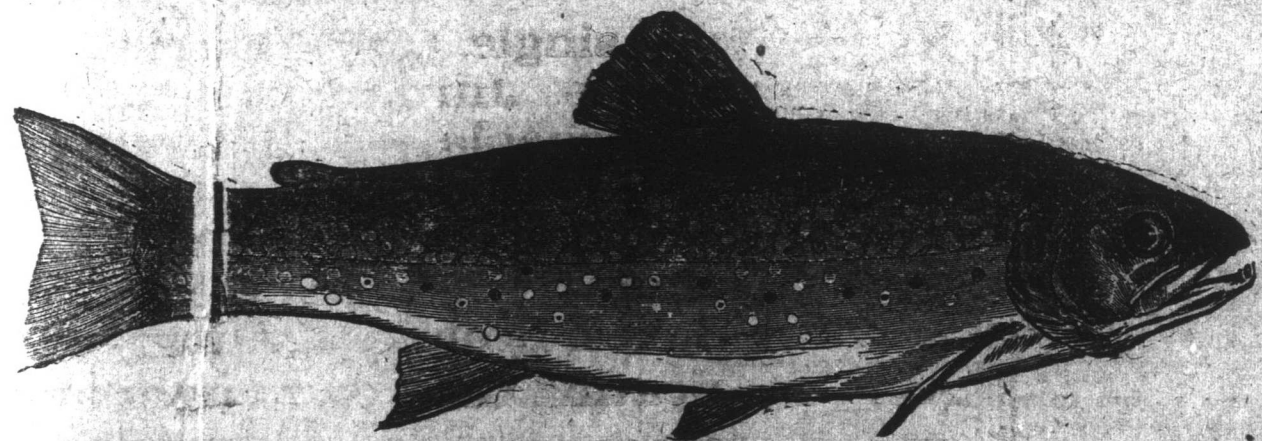

EXTINCT VOLCANO BECOMES ACTIVE.
 WALENBURG, Colorado, May 22.—Flames and smoke are belching from the crater of a volcano supposed to have been extinct for centuries near the Colorado line in New Mexico; according to automobile travellers reaching here.

DR. JAGGER PREDICTS VIOLENT ERUPTION OF KILAUEA.
 SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—Nature's danger signals are flying over the smoky crest of Kilauea volcano in the Hawaiian Islands, and a great loss of life may be averted if the signals are heeded; according to Dr. T. A. Jagger, noted volcanologist here, he called from here to-day for Hawaii. Dr. Jagger is a director of the Hawaiian observatory and for years has been predicting that Kilauea would erupt in 1924; and since the present disturbances began he has been recalled to the Islands. He expects a violent eruption similar to that of 1790 when hundreds were killed.

THE ROYAL COURT.
 LONDON, May 22.—King George and Queen Mary held their second court of the season; generally it followed the lines of Thursday night's court. The function was favored by beautiful weather and crowds witnessed the arrival of the chosen at Buckingham to-night. The presentations were selected mainly from the general circle and included a number of Canadians and Americans. King George wore the uniform of the Scots Guards while Queen Mary was attired in a shimmering gown of wedgewood blue and silver brocade, which in the brilliant lights gave the illusion of moonlight on moving water. The Queen wore a pearl and diamond coronet and diamond ornaments, including the Koh-i-noor and Order of the Garter.

POLITICAL SHUFFLE IN GERMANY.

BERLIN, May 22.—No progress in the direction of effecting a consolidation of the five middle parties into a straight bourgeois coalition group was made at the later party conference to-day at which were represented the German Nationalists and Bavarian People's Party, moderates and Bavarian Peoples Party. Further negotiations will take on Thursday.

BELGIAN AND ITALIAN PREMIERS IN COMPLETE ACCORD.

ROME, May 21.—A meeting at Milan between the Italian Premier resulted in the establishment of a complete unity of action and policy in the matter of reparations. Premier Mussolini announced to-day.

HAS HIS TROUBLES.

PARIS, May 21.—Edouard Herriot, the leader of the Radical Socialists, who is slated for the post of premier to succeed Poincare had his first taste of troubles when he went to-day to Elysee Palace to confer with President Millerand and Poincare and the Minister of Finance Painleve, on the financial situation and ways and means to prevent the franc from taking another downward dive. The members of present Government are said to have reached the end of their patience over the vicious attacks of the radical press accusing them of making use of the hundred million francs the Morgan syndicate advanced, by boosting franc for election purposes.

GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS TO RESTORE PEACE IN RUSSIA.

CHATHAM, Ont., May 22.—That Grand Duke Nicholas, the former Commander of the Russian forces is the only man who can bring Russia out of her present chaos was the emphatic statement of W. O. Rodmar a Russian of noble birth who is visiting here, in an address delivered before the Rotary Club yesterday. The Bolsheviks will never be able to deal with any country in a

LABOUR GOVERNMENT FACING ORDEAL.

LONDON, May 21.—The Labor Government is facing another ordeal in the House of Commons to-day and not withstanding the failure of their recent predictions on similar occasions, political opponents again are prophesying the defeat of the Government's policy towards unemployment and Conservatives and many Liberals complain the Government has done nothing to justify the claim of its spokesman that labor alone has the remedy for unemployment and some extremists among the Laborites themselves agreed, all saying the Government has merely conducted the policy of its predecessors. Conservatives, according are moving to-day to reduce the salary of the Labor Minister, Tom Shaw, by £100 so as to enable the House to express its opinions. Hope of voting down the Government is based partly on the fact that a large number of Liberals are attending meeting at Brighton, thus preventing them from coming to the Government's aid.

"Silver Threads Among the Gold"

The prophecy of "Silver Threads Among the Gold" was never fulfilled for the woman who inspired it. That woman, Mrs. Herbert Danks, was buried in New York recently. For her, at least, the long trail of unhappiness that so strangely followed the writing of the great love song is over. All that now remains of the family are a son and daughter who have been at odds with each other, over the royalties from their father's ballad.

Mrs. Danks were eighty-two. She died recently in reduced circumstances in a Brooklyn rooming house. She was buried in New Union Field, after a simple service at the Lefferts Place Chapel.

In 1874 when she and Hart Pease Danks, a young musician and singer, were living happily together in New York, he wrote to her one of the tenderest love songs of the ages. Every body knows it:

"Darling, I am growing old,
Silver threads among the gold
Shine upon my brow to-day—
Life is fading fast away.
But, my darling, you will be
Always young and fair to me.
Yes, my darling, you will be
Always young and fair to me."

Who has not sung or tried to sing or heard sung that immortal refrain? The words were written by Eben E. Rexford. Danks composed the melody. Perhaps the course of his life would have been different if he had never composed it.

The song sold, prosperity came, and with it domestic happiness. Danks and his wife parted.

In 1903 an old man was found dead in his rooming house, in Philadelphia. His landlady found him, kneeling at the side of his bed, where death had overtaken him. He had a copy of "Silver Threads Among the Gold" in his hand, and on it was pencilled:

"It's hard to grow old alone."
That was how Danks died, and his widow died in circumstances nearly parallel.

Surviving him were Mrs. Danks, two daughters, Miss Gertrude Danks and Mrs. Alberta Builder, and a son, Albert. Mrs. Builder is since dead.

The royalties from "Silver Threads" piled in. It was estimated that the song brought \$25,000 in royalties previous to 1912. In due course of time the heirs differed over the estate. Each became estranged from the other. The surviving daughter, who had been a singer, objected to an accounting her brother, an administrator, made in 1921. She demanded her share, alleging she was in want. There was also litigation between the family and the estate of H. A. Gordon, publisher of the song.

Meanwhile, for years, while the song which had been written for love of her, was being sung by lovers throughout the world, the widow of Danks grew to feel the pinch of want and the loneliness of old age.

The prophecy of her lover of the old days was never fulfilled.

India in England

In the Indian Palace at the British Empire Exhibition there is a perfect reproduction of the famous Ajanta wall paintings. Ajanta is a ravine in Hyderabad where, over two hundred years before Christ, the Buddhists made temples in the caves, safe from the attack of wild animals and marauding tribes of men who did not hold the Buddhist faith, and painted on the walls of these caves some of the most marvellous pictures ever done in the history of the world.

Visitors to the Indian Palace at Wembley can see exactly what these caves are like, and study the frescoes without having to undergo the hardships necessary to the traveller who journeys to the caves themselves. It is upon the traditions left in these caves by early Buddhists that the famous school of modern Indian art founded by Sir Rabindranath Tagore in Calcutta, has based its work, and much of which will be seen in the Bombay Court, and in the Indian room at the Palace of Arts. It is the first time in history that Europeans have been enabled to see what Indian art is really like. Mukel Day, himself a student of Sir Rabindranath Tagore, and one who has taken the pilgrimage in person to the actual caves, has carried out the mural decoration.

India has made up its mind that here at least the visitor to Wembley will see the real thing. He will find himself looking upon designs that the western eye has never seen before.

At the Shrine of St. David

How many Welshmen, who celebrate the feast of their patron saint every year, have made the pilgrimage to his shrine at the lonely cathedral in the Vale of the Roses, in the wilds of Pembrokeshire?

Time was when two pilgrimages to St. David's were equivalent to a visit to Rome; and among the pilgrims were William the Conqueror, Henry II, and Edward I, with his Queen. Nearly fourteen centuries have passed since St. David, the warrior prelate, the founder of ten monasteries, besides those of Bath and Glastonbury died at the reputed age of 147 years among his missionary monks on the site of the present cathedral. A man of great stature, a born leader of men, whether monks or soldiers, to David is largely due the firmness of the roots of the ancient British Church in the soil of Wales to-day.

Thanks to the perseverance of Dean Williams and a number of enthusiastic Welsh Churchmen, there is now in an iron-bound oak chest in a recess of the beautiful chapel of the Holy Trinity, behind St. David's high altar, the bones of St. David and his assistant, St. Justinian.

Discovered recently, buried beneath the sanctuary, the bones have been inspected by prominent Harley-street London, men and professors learned in the human frame. The bones are those of a large man and of a man of much smaller build. St. David, we know, was about 6ft. 4in. high, and St. Justinian a short man. Moreover, the portions of the skulls show those extraordinary convolutions of the brain which mark great intellect.

Opposite the oaken chest is the altar, with its British crosses, at which St. David officiated, and near by the portable altar which he received when consecrated bishop in Jerusalem.

G.W.V.A. Hold First Dominion Conference

ADDRESSES DELIVERED BY HIS EXCELLENCY SIR W. L. ALLARDYCE, GOVERNOR OF NEWFOUNDLAND, PRESIDENT NANGLE.

At 8 o'clock last night His Excellency the Governor formally opened the first Dominion Conference of the G.W.V.A. in the Orange Hall, Gower Street, besides the Dominion Executive there were present the following delegates from the various branches:—

The meeting opened by the singing of "The Ode to Newfoundland," after which the Governor spoke as follows:

ADDRESS BY HIS EXCELLENCY SIR W. L. ALLARDYCE, GOVERNOR OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

Comrades:—Both as Patron of the Great War Veterans Association and as your Comrade, I am glad to be with you this evening, and I warmly welcome the various representatives who have come from all parts of Newfoundland to take part in our first Dominion Conference. As many of you are aware the distinguished Field Marshal, who I understand, prefers when with ex-service men to be addressed as a Comrade, will be with us in about five weeks' time and I am confident that not only all ex-service men, but every Newfoundland-er, appreciate the honour that is conferred on the people of British North America by his coming to St. John's to unveil our National War Memorial.

I am sure that no one here to-night will dispute the statement that Earl Haig has done more for the ex-service men than any other person. He knows, better probably than any other individual, what the ex-service man did when our National existence was at stake, when Civilization trampled in the balance, when the whole world held its breath as to whether the forces of right or the forces of the Devil were to win. The man in his Majesty's uniform, by his undaunted courage, by his unflinching devotion, by his heroic conduct, saved humanity from becoming the slaves of Germany. In 1921 Lord Haig proceeded to South Africa at the request of ex-Service men there after first successfully maintaining the various organizations formed in Great Britain by demobilized fighting men, and at a conference at Cape Town, which was opened by General Smuts, the British Empire Service League was founded, and with that League we are affiliated. It seems hardly necessary to add that that League is outside of politics.

Now the principal objects of the League are three, and they may be briefly summed up as follows: "Unity, Comradeship, Peace." I have no doubt that a good many of you who are here to-night remember to have read some of Aesop's Fables when a boy, and if so you will recollect the story of the Frog and the Ox, and how easy it was to break one fagot, and how extremely difficult to break a dozen or more when bound together. It is the old, old saying, "Unity is Strength." Ex-Service men by combining and joining the G.W.V.A. give added strength to the cause, they expand the influence of the Association, and they thereby multiply the power to help their Comrades and their dependents, and the families of their Comrades who fell. Now Unity as you know is the twin-brother of Comradeship, but Comradeship in name alone is not sufficient. What is required is both enthusiasm and effort. This applies not to Newfoundland only but to all ex-service men throughout our Empire, and along with enthusiasm and effort there must also be the spirit of self-sacrifice. In the Great War the men in the service stood shoulder to shoulder to resist military and its accompanying evils, and in doing so they proved to the world that there are more important things in this life than wealth and social status. Why should we descend to a lower plane to-day? The demand for that high standard, for that abnegation of self, has been just as insistent since the war terminating as during the great struggle itself. The will to help is not dead. The Comradeship which during the war shone with a white flame burns wherever there are ex-service men, and during this most difficult reconstruction period, which

has overtaken the world, the same unquenchable spirit of devotion to country, which every true ex-service man has at heart, is an invaluable asset and a hopeful augury for the future.

Finally a word as to the third object, Peace. Ex-service men as a body know, better probably than any other section of the community, what the horrors of war really mean. No rational being would wish to see it again. At times, however, war is unavoidable, and it is doubtful whether or not our unpreparedness is the best way to avoid it. But this is a highly controversial subject. On one point, however, we can all agree, i.e. that the blessings of real peace and contentment cannot be overestimated. Before sitting down I commend to you the following words taken from the message which His Majesty addressed to the Overseas Delegates at the first Conference of the British Empire League:—

"Let us not forget that, in one sense of the word, we can never really be ex-Service men; in peace or in war every one of us still owes service to his fellow man as long as he has strength to give it."

The President addressed the Conference as follows:—

ADDRESS BY LT.-COL. NANGLE, C.F. DOMINION PRESIDENT.

Your Excellency, Comrades. To-night is an epoch-making event in the history of Newfoundland. You have never assembled in this room to-night representatives from all parts of our Island home.

Here you are assembled in an Orange Hall being addressed by a sign of what our Association stands for, and I hope the spirit of our meeting to-night will spread throughout the whole of Newfoundland and bear good fruit. (Cheers). This meeting here to-night is remarkable for several reasons; here we are an Association without a creed that I think is unique in Newfoundland. We are also an Association without politics that is unique. We represent the men who went out and fought and who are prepared, if necessary, to do so again. We stand for the good of our country and in doing so we are sure to hurt the susceptibilities of some people, but we do not care. There is a straight course for us to follow and we are going to follow that course to the bitter end. (Applause).

Confederates, as a rule, are instituted by officers and officials of Societies who look upon themselves as a social reunion than as a business proposition, but this conference is first and foremost strictly business. At this time of the year we would not call you men in from all parts of Newfoundland, from your work of making ready for the fishery, if we had not good reasons. We called you in here for good reason and hope you will give this conference your full and undivided attention.

To you, Sir, as Patron and friend of this Association we tender our thanks for all you have done for us in the past and we wish to couple with that thanks the name of your good lady. There is no one who has done more for the disabled and ex-service men than Lady Allardyce. (Applause). I hope you and your good lady will be left with us for many years to see the end of the terrible period through which we are passing and when the time comes for you to go to other fields of labour there will accompany you the best wishes of every ex-service man in this island of ours. (Applause).

To you, Sir, as Chief administrator we pledge ourselves and in doing so we pledge eight thousand ex-service men of Newfoundland, we pledge you our help and support in the strenuous times through which you are passing. We are ready at your call to support you in every way from the formation of a Dominion Government to the forming of a mopping up party.

The political events of the past month are not responsible for the summoning of this conference. Long before the political pot boiled over this conference was determined upon. We all feel that Newfoundland is in need of an organization such as ours. Every one of us realize Newfoundland is slipping and have felt the necessity of a conference such as this. We need a greater and wider constitution for this organization, as the one drawn up when the organization was formed is out of date and the fundamental organization and that is the reason why we are here to-day. We want to reform it and make it one that will win back for Newfoundland the honoured name which it has held for centuries. If you men explain the aims and objects of this organization to your fellow ex-service men all over the country and get them to come together then you will be doing your duty to Newfoundland. As the Executive head of this organization I am merely the man at the tiller. I can only guide the boat but it you men will put your backs to the cars we will forge ahead; if you will all pull together and put your backs into it we will gain our object but until then we are all sixes and sevens and just drifting by in the stream.

There are other reasons also for bringing you to town. In the near future we have coming to visit us the foremost figure in the British Empire, Field Marshal Earl Haig. He has been singularly honoured in

Inter-Island ex-service men in Newfoundland depend largely on effective reciprocal arrangements between Governments to which end we appreciate your co-operation. (Applause).

Rev. W. E. R. Cracknell, (C.P.) on behalf of the delegates replied thanking His Excellency for performing the opening ceremony of the Conference which suggested well for success. It was a matter of satisfaction to all ex-service men to know that in his Excellency they had a good friend and comrade. He also congratulated the Dominion President on his address which contained material which if applied could do a lot to make a better Newfoundland.

After the departure of his Excellency, the Conference then took up its agenda, the first item of which was the election of Field-Marshal Earl Haig as Grand President of the Association. The following messages were then despatched:—

His Majesty King George the Fifth,
Buckingham Palace,

"The Great War Veterans' Association of Newfoundland, assembled in Dominion Conference, humbly beg to express to your Majesty their loyalty and devotion to your Crown and Person. They further desire respectfully to affirm that the aims and ideals of their Association stand for good Government and good citizenship. For these aims and ideals this Association will fight to the last."

This conference unanimously elected you our first Grand President. In asking you to accept this office our Association is only in a small way repaying your many kindnesses to us. A Royal Newfoundland welcome is awaiting yourself and Lady Haig from the Great War Veterans' Association."

Messages were also sent to the British Empire Service League, the British Legion and the Great War Veterans' Association of Canada. Committees were then appointed to deal with the following subjects:—

- 1.—Constitution.
 - 2.—Pensions.
 - 3.—Tubercular ex-service men.
 - 4.—Hospital Services.
- The advisability of sending a circular letter to the various candidates in the forthcoming election was then discussed. A motion to this effect was subsequently moved and carried and the Conference was moved into committee of the whole.

The following motion was then moved, seconded and carried unanimously:—

"The G.W.V.A. of Newfoundland in Dominion Conference assembled, hereby reaffirms that the Association is non-party political and that every individual ex-service man in Newfoundland should be free to join the Association to such purpose is voting its constitution and will be dealt with severely by the Dominion Command."

It was further resolved that this resolution be referred to the Members of the Association, the candidates and the general public.

The conference re-assembled for the dispatch of business at 8 o'clock this evening.
