The Order granting aid to the Canada Southern Railway branch from St. Thomas to St. Clair River was ratified.

The Order granting further time to the Prince Edward County Ry was carried, together with an Order extending the time allowed to the Northern Extension Railways Company.

Hom. Mr. Crooks moved that this House doth ratify the Order in Council approved by his Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, on the 16th inst., granting aid to the Wellington, Grey, and Bruce Railway Company.

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Mr. Crooks explained the grounds upon which the Order was made. He showed that those who had contributed to the Souther extension of this line had not realised the effects they expected from it, and, unless some aid were given, it would fall into the hands of the contractors, whose claims the Company and not been able to meet. The expection of the municipalities in contributing to its construction were that, if necessary, help would be afforded by the Government, and if this were not done, they would have a good right to complain of injustice. He explained that the bonus of \$12,000 per mile for the 15½ miles which the city of Hamilton had voted was subject to the approval of the Great Western Railway Company, which had not yet been given. The intention of the Government was not to aid the Company nor to add to the value of their property. It was simply to give the municipalities which had contributed to its construction the benefits of railways, and thought that this one should at least receive the minimum amount granted to roads passing through settled portions of the Country—viz, \$2,000 per mile. This railway passed through his county, and he knew its circumstances very well.

The Party of Obstruction.

The Ontario Opposition deserve to be called the party of obstruction. It has been their policy all through the session to place every obstacle in the way of the Government, and retard the public busness as far as it lay in their power. A notable instance of this obstruction policy occurred in the House on Friday. While the estimates were being passed in committee of supply they opposed every item, contested every grant, and by their factious course seriously delayed the business of the House, and prolonged the session beyond the ordinary time. One would naturally have thought that after they had done their utmost to defeat the Government, and to fasten some charge on them of extravagance and waste of the public money, they would have been content to allow the estimates to pass unchallenged when they came up for concurrence. But no, the same factious course must be pursued to the end. Not satisfied with being beaten once, they must renew the fight, only to be beaten again. On Friday they opposed concurrence in every item that came up. They moved amendment after amendment, every one of which was lost by large majorities, and they only ceased to show fight when all the items were passed, and there were no more left to amend. Among other things they tried their hands once more in endeavoring to fasten a charge on the Government in connection with the Central Prison, but Mr. McKellar boldly met them, and administered a timely lecture, to Messrs, Boultbee, Lauder and Rykert, who had pursued him with a relentless hate during the session. He prophesied that these three worthies would be elected to stay at home in consequence of the foolish course they had pursued during the session, especially in reference to the Central Prison. We only hope the prophesy will come true.

Aid to the W. G. & B. Railway. It will be seen by our report of the proceedings in the Legislature, that the Order in Council granting \$2,000 per mile to that portion of the Wellington, Grey, & Bruce from Palmerston to Wingham received the sanction of the House. The Hon. Mr. Crooks explained the position in which the road was placed, and moved the adoption of the Order on the ground that without the aid proposed it could not be opened for traffic, and the Municipalities interested would suffer greatly thereby. In justice to them, therefore, the Government made the grant. Mr. Rykert opposed the grant, arguing that it was in violation of the statute, and moved an amendment to throw it out, but it was lost, only thirteen voting for it.

REDUCTION OF CRIME IN IRELAND.—
The London Times' Dublin correspondent shows that a continued improvement is taking place in the moral condition of Ireland. In some circuits there was no criminal business, whilst in others the judges congratulated the grand juries upon the lightness of the calendars, and the absence of any disturbances of the tranquillity and order which they observed with pleasure at recent assizes. In the counties of Meath and Clare there were only a few crimes of an agrarian character, such as firing into a house and sending threatening letters. This is a wonderful change for the better as compared with a few years back, when professional hardmen followed the judges around the circuits, and their Honors had to be guarded from one county town to another by troops of dragoons in order to protect themselves from being shot at.
