

ETTINJE, April 2.—Great Tarabosch fort, which for months has held the affles off Scutari, is now practically in the hands of the Mentenegrins, thanks to the sacrifice of 200 bomb throwers, every one of whom lost his life in a last desperate effort to clear the way to the town, for the possession of which Montenegro is ready to give up everything.



Says the Japanese Government Will Maintain the Limitation and Control of Immigration of Laborers from Japanese Empire to Canada

TTAWA, April 2.—Premier Borden, in moving the second reading of "an act respecting a certain treaty of commerce and navigation between his majesty the emperor of Japan," entered into an explanation of the reasons why the government has decided to give adherence on the part of the Dominion to the treaty entered into between Great Britain and Japan, April 3, 1911. The matter, he said, was one of some urgency, because the treaty must be

Another provision is that no internal duties are to be collected by one country on goods imported from the other. There are several additional provisions in regard to the carrying on of commerce with the merchants of the country and allow them to do business with others. Mr. Borden concluded with a tribute to the Japanese people whom he said had, in a remarkably brief time, made a development greater than in any case in the history of the world. He said the treaty would continue for eight years. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that the opposition would have no objection to the ratification of treaties if concerned was along the line they expected it to be. But it no opposition was offered to the treaty it was not because of the benefits they looked for, but because of its general effect among the nations. He could not see that there were any commercial benefits in it. 

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

(Continued from page one) COST COMPARED WITH MANITOBA SYSTEM

Now let us consider the cost. I here-Now let us consider the cost. I herewith make a careful comparison of the telephone system of Alberta with that of Manitoba. Both are provincial systems, and started at the same time. I shall use some figures, but urge my readers to wade through them, because they are worth while. I quote from a blue book published by the Dominion government, "Telephone Statistics of the Dominion of Canada," and from the "Report of the Depart. nd from the "Report of the Depart. ment of Railways and Telepho

The comparison is hardly fair to (1) Alberta is a less thickly settled country than Manitoba, and has a nuch larger non-profitable area. More than 65 per cent of its lines are rural lines. In Manitoba only 34 per cent of its lineage is rural. (2) The telephone system in Alberta, with its rivers and mountains, is more difficult to construct and maintain. Besides, the cost of material is ten per cent higher in Alberta than in Mamitoba.

(3) In the third place, the service Alberta is more complete and satisfactory than the service in Winnipeg. That is a question of opinion, but one which I believe will be accepted by any person who has had experience with

GREAT DIFFERENCE IN COST OF CONSTRUCTION

With these facts in mind let us exmine the two systems. The total cost of the Alberta system up to date is \$5,598,848. It has 21,812 telephones. The cost of the Alberta system s a little less than \$257 per telephone. The telephone system of the province of Manitoba cost \$9,795,-723. It has 38,797 telephones. The Manitoba system cost \$278 per telephone. Under the circumstances that looks very favorable to Alberta. Despite greater difficulties in construction by the price for material and sparsely settled country the cost of onstruction is ten percent less.

ALBERTA SUBSCRIBERS PAY LESS FOR PHONES A comparison of the cost to the sub scriber shows that Alberta telephone isers pay much less in Alberta than



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

MINIATURE BATTLE SHIPS AID MILITIA TO DRILL IN WINTER.

Through an ingenious device invested by Commander Kingsley L. Martin, of the Second battalion, Naval Militia of New York, and put into operation a few weeks ago, the members of that command are enabled to receive a general working knowledge of navigation and maneeuvres of battle ships, as well as of battle ship equipment, within the armory. On the floor of the armory of the battalion, in Brooklyn, has been "lannched" a division of four ininiature dreadnoughts, twenty-four feet in length with a beam of five fast six inches. The models are outlwardly complete in every detail and are operated over the floor after the manner of vessels at sea.

The crew of each of these miniature war craft consists of three men, two "engineers" and a navigator. The sensations of operating a vessel at sea are experienced by these men. The orders of the navigator are conveyed to the



engineers by way of the engine room telegraph and, with the armory in complete darkness, the miniature division "oteams" over the floor and performs various evolutions, even as greater vessels affoat, by the light of their own searchlights and the regulation side lights.

To all appearances the four vessels on the floor of the armory are battle ships complete in every detail, with decks cleared for action and guns bristling from the fore and aft turrets and port and starboard gun ports. All that is necessary to lend spectacular completeness to the scene are the waves on the armory floor and smoke from the smokestacks.

smekestacks.

When at night every light is put out in the armory the place is pinged in darkness, except for the flickering lights from the ministure fighting craft. With the red lights at the masthead signifying that the "engines" are motionless, the yard signals begin to flicker and the red masthead light flickers out and is supplanted by a white light on the various vessels, showing that they are under way. Then follows a series of evolutions, in which the searchlights and finally a blaze of cannon startles the hitherto almost silent armory into even greater surprise.

When the firing begins the whole crew of each vessel is pressed into service, and through the gun tubes blank cartridges are fired with 38-calibre revolvers. As into tropical sunlight, which is suddenly reflected on the polished and placid floor of the armory, the models pass majestically when the lights are switched on.


