DR. BELLOWS DEAD.

The Celebrated Unitarian Divine Breather Last Yesterday Morning. New York, Jan. 30 .- Rev. Dr. Henr Whitney Bellows was taken ill on Sunday, Jan. 22, and has been gradually sinking ever since. This morning he was very low indeed, and at 11.15 a.m. he breathed his last at his residence, No. 232 East Fifteent street. The deceased clergyman, possibl street: The deceased clergyman, possibly the most celebrated unitarian of the day, was for forty-two years pastor of All Saints church. He was born at Weston on June 11, 1814; graduated from Harvard in 1832; attended the divinity school at Cambridge from 1834-37; was ordained pastor of the First Congregational church of New York in 1838; originated the Christian Inquirer in 1846; wrote for it until 1850; was made a D.D. by Harvard in 1854; took a leading part in the sanitary commission and was

He has published a defence of the drams, lectured on the treatment of social diseases and has written two volumes of European travel. His death was brought about by intestinal troubles, caused by sedentary habits. Dr. Bellows was a ready speaker and popular lecturer, having many friends among artists and professional men. Rev.
