Canadian Apples. The old way of cutting a potato length-wise into two pieces, and planting both in one hill, with care to put the cut sides one hill, with care to put the cut sides down, costs too much and gives too many stalks to a hill. It is a question whether cutting to one eye or two eyes on a piece is best. It depends somewhat on the variety. I cut mostly to one-eye pieces, where the vines are very rank growers, but in case of rather shy growers two eyes are better. If the potatoes are quite small the pieces should not be cut so small as one or two eyes would make them. The liability to dry up before making a start is too great.

To cut the tuber to the best advantage be-gin at the stem and cut the pieces off, turn-ing the potato 'round in your hand each time you cut. This will dispose of the whole tuber with little or no waste. A very

within a few hours. Even then it is well to plow only as many furrows as can be planted in an hour. The loss of moisture in the furrow will delay the crop just in proportion to the amount lost. I once damaged a crop by letting the furrows lie open in the sun a day or two before plant-ing, so that I did not get half so many bushels from these rows as from others that
