The Profits of the Middle-man.

"The consumer in Ontario complains that he is paying too much for his produce, and the farmer complains that he is not getting enough for it, and both are largely right. The trouble is that it costs too much to sell farm produce. How long would the manufacturer of staples last who was paying sixty per cent. of the selling price to sell his goods? Yet the farmer seems somehow to struggle along under this handicap. He seems the only producer who has nothing to say as to the price of his wares."—Peter White, K.C., of Pembroke, in The Globe's Annual Financial Survey. Wm.
