Burbank, R.C.A.F., Mr. G.G. Riddell of the Department of External Affairs, and Mr. E.W.T. Gill of the Privy Council Office.
5. Opened May 26 - Palestine and Geneva - Special Committee on Palestine of the General Assembly of the United Nations. The Canadian delegate is Mr. Justice I.C. Rand, of the Supreme Court, and the alternate is Mr. L. Mayrand, of the Department of External Affairs.
