# STADACONA CLUB.

#### CONSTITUTION.

ART. 1.—This Association shall be known as the STADACONA CLUB of Quebec.

ART. 2.—Politics and religious questions of every Politics and description shall be absolutely excluded from the objects of the Club.

ART. 3.—Each candidate for admission shall be <sup>Candidates.</sup> proposed by one member and seconded by another, by a proposal in writing, to be inserted in the book of Candidates, and signed by both mover and seconder, and shall be baliotted for at any ballot which may take place after the lapse of one week from the time of such proposal—provided the name of the Candidate and his proposer and seconder have been posted in the Coffee Room under the hand of the Secretary, at least fifteen days immediately before the day of ballot. No ballot shall be valid unless twenty-one members actually ballot ; and one black ball in seven shall exclude.

Rule of ballot.

ART. 4.-The ballot shall take place between the hours of Ten A.M., and Six P.M., on the expiration of the fifteen days mentioned in the preceding article, such ballot to be continued daily until twenty-one members shall have voted. But no such ballot shall be closed before six o'clock on the day on which the twenty-first ball shall have been thrown.

New Member.

ART. 5.—On the admission of each new member, the Secretary shall notify the same to him, and furnish him with a printed copy of the Constitution and Regulations, and request him to remit the amount of his subscription to the Treasurer.

Entrance and subscription.

ART. 6.-The entrance fee shall be Twenty pounds and the annual subscription Five pounds. The latter to be payable in advance on the First of April in each year. But the subscriptions of new members ballotted for on or after the 1st day of January in any year shall extend to the 1st day of April in the following year.

Members pay before voting.

ART. 7.-No member shall be admitted to vote on any occasion whatever or enjoy any of the privileges of the Club, until he shall have paid whatever entrance fee or subscription shall be due by him.

Members failing topay

ART. 8.—Any member failing to pay his entrance on entrance, fee or subscription within six weeks after his admission, if he reside in Canada, or not farther south on the Continent of America than the 40th degree of north latitude, or within three months, if he reside the piraling until no the peen

nce nison of ide elsewhere on the Continent of America, or on the Continent of Europe, or within six months if he reside in any other quarter of the world, the Secre-Secretary must report. tary shall report accordingly to the Committee, who shall causo his name to be erased from the list of members, unless the delay can be justified to the satisfaction of the Committee.

ART. 9.—The name of every member failing to Members pay his annual subscription on the 1st of April, pay annual shall be exhibited in the Coffee Room on the 1st of May, if not then paid, and if the subscription be not paid on or before the 1st day of June, the Secretary shall report accordingly to the Committee, who shall cause his name to be erased from the list of members, but he may be re-admitted by the Committee, upon assigning to them reasons which they shall consider satisfactory for his failure of payment.

ART. 10.—All entrance fees and annual subscrip-Paid to Treations shall be paid to the Treasurer.

ART. 11.—Any ordinary or privileged member who shall remove his residence to a greater distance than 60 miles from Quebec, (all his subscriptions then due being paid) may give notice to the Secretary of such removal and of his intention not to make use of the Club thenceforward; and such member shall cease to be liable to pay the yearly subscription of \$20 so long as he shall continue to reside at such distance from Quebec, and such member shall at any time have the right of again using the Club by notifying his intention so to do, and paying the subscription for the then current year. But if any member so removing his residence from Quebec, and taking advantage of this rule, shall again return to reside in Quebec, or nearer than sixty miles therefrom, he shall within one month from such return, notify the Secretary thereof, and pay the subscription for the then current year, and failing so to do, his name shall be struck from the roll of members, unless some good excuse be offered to the Committee to account for his neglect.

ART. 12.—Persons holding civil appointments under the Provincial Government, temporarily resident in Qubec, shall be eligible for election without payment of the entrance fee, but subject to the payment of an annual subscription of £10 or a semiannual subscription of £5. Members of the Legislature non-residents of Quebec, shall be eligible for election on payment of an annual Fee of £7. 10s.

ART. 13.—Consuls or representatives of any foreign power, and their attachés, not being permanent residents in Canada, shall be eligible for election without payment of an entrance fee, but subject to the payment of an annual subscription of £7.10s or a semi-annual subscription of £5.

ART. 15.—The members mentioned in the three preceding rules shall be styled privileged members, and, as such, shall enjoy all the rights of ordinary members but that of voting and being elected members of committee.

ART. 16.—Every candidate proposed as a privileged member, shall be stated to be so on the list of candidates for election, which is posted in the Coffee Room; no candidate to be a privileged member shall be placed on the said list unless notice be first given to the Committee one week previous to the day on which he is proposed, and until the cause of the privilege has been sanctioned at a subsequent meeting of the Committee.

ART. 17.—Any member shall have the privilege Strangers of introducing a friend to breakfast, lunch, or dine, admitted. in the Strangers' Room at his sole expense, and no stranger shall be admitted at any time, except into the Strangers' Room, Smoking Room, and Drawing Special Room, unless to view the house, and then accompa-Rooms. nied by a member; Provided, always, that any stranger dining with a member may be introduced by him to the billiard-room and be permitted to play at the tables on the day he shall have dined with such member.

Members may withdraw.

ART. 18.—Any member whose dues are all paid shall be at liberty to withdraw from the Club, on his written application to that effect, sent in to the Committee, before the first stated annual meeting of the Club, to be held on the first Wednesday in April.

Expulsion of members.

of ART. 19.—Any member wilfully infringing the constitution, or any of the Regulations of the Club, shall be liable to expulsion, by a vote of two-thirds of the Committee present at any meeting specially held for that purpose, reasonable notice of such meeting being previously given to such member.

Leaving, forfeit all claims.

ART. 20.—Any member who shall withdraw, resign, or be expelled, shall cease to be a member of the Club, and shall forfeit, *ipso facto*, all right or claim thereon, or in or to its property or funds; any member who shall be expelled shall forever there. after be ineligible to be re-admitted a member of the Club.

Committee of management. ART. 21.—All the concerns of the Club shall be managed by a Committee to consist of twelve members, four of whom shall be elected annually by ballot, at the General Meeting of the Club, which shall be held on the first Wednesday in April in each year. ART. 22.—Of the eight old members who shall Term to continue in office, Four shall go out in the next year, and the remaining Four in the year after, so that no member shall remain more than three years on the Committee, without re-election ; the members so to retire yearly, to be selected by the Committee, at some meeting previous to the date of election.

ART. 23.—If any member elected to serve on the Committee should resign or should a death vacancy occur, the Committee shall have power to choose a qualified Member to act in his stead, until the annual meeting next ensuing, when the member so chosen shall retire, but shall be eligible for re-election.

ART. 24.—The Committee, Three of whom shall weekly form a quorum, shall meet weekly, on a stated day, to transact current business, and to audit the accounts of the preceding week.

ART. 25.—It shall be the duty of the Committee Infraction of to take immediate cognizance of any infraction of the constitution or regulations of the Club.

ART. 26.—There shall be two stated meetings of Annual Meetings the Club, one of which shall be held on the first Wednesday in April, for the purpose of electing new members of the Committee for the succeeding year; at which meeting it shall be the duty of the ComAccounts submitted ed.

mittee to present a report and abstract of the state and confirm. of accounts and general concerns of the Club for the past year, together with an estimate of the receipts and disbursements of the current year, which report and estimate shall immediately thereafter be printed and distributed amongst all the members. The other meeting shall be held on the Wednesday fortnight, for the purpose of deciding on such propositions as may have been submitted at the former meeting ; and the Chair shall be taken at all meetings at one o'clock.

Extraordinary Meetings.

ART. 27.-The Committee shall have power at all times to convene an extraordinary meeting of the Club on giving fourteen days' notice, to be posted up during that period in the Coffee Room of the Club, specifying the object of such meeting, in the form of a resolution; at which meeting no subject shall be discussed beyond that specified in the notice. But twenty qualified members will be requisite in order to constitute any such extraordinary meeting.

House hours

ART. 28.—The Club-House shall be open every day for the reception of members, at seven o'clock in the forenoon, in the summer, and at eight o'clock in the forenoon, in the winter, and shall be closed and the lights extinguished at one A.M., except on Saturdays, when the hour of closing shall be midnight; and no member shall be admitted into the Club after these hours on any pretence whatever, unless specially authorized by the Committee.

ART. 29 .- No member shall, on any pretence or No profits or in any manner whatsoever, receive any profit, salary gratuities. or emolument from the funds of the Club; nor shall any member give any money or gratuity to any of the servants of the establishment, upon any pretence whatever. It being understood that this rule is not intended to preclude any member of the Club from selling property, or goods, or stocks, or other money securities to the Club, or buying any of the same from the Club.

ART. 30 .--- No member shall take away from the Take away Club upon any pretence whatsoever, any newspaper, pamphlet, book, map, or other article, the property of the Institution.

ART. 31 .--- No servant of the Club (the messenger Servants on errands. excepted) shall be sent out of the house upon any errands, on any pretence whatever.

ART. 32 .- No provisions cooked in the Club-Provisions House, or wines or other liquors, to be sent out of out. the House on any pretence whatever.

ART. 33.-Any cause of complaint that may complaints. arise, is to be written and signed by the member so complaining, on his bill; which complaint must be specially noticed by the Committee, on settling the weekly accounts; and any inattention or improper conduct of a servant is to be stated by letter, under the signature of such member, which being put in the Secretary's box, must be laid before the Committee, at their next weekly meeting.

Pay Club Bills. ART. 34.—All members are to pay their bills, for every expense they incur in the Club, before they leave the house.

No gambling. ART. 35.—No game shall on any account be played for money, except Whist, Ecarté, Piquet, and Pool; nor Dice used in the Club-House, except at Backgammon. No higher stake than quarter dollar pointe shall be played for at Whist, nor shall any bet exceed one dollar; the games of Ecarté, Piquet, and Pool to be played for limited stakes, the limits to be fixed by the Committee.

Smoking.

ART. 36.—No smoking shall be permitted in the Club-House, except in the rooms set apart for that purpose.

No dogs.

ART. 37.—No member is on any account to bring a dog into the Club-House.

Constitution may be altered.

ART. 38.—Any article of this constitution may be altered, amended, or suspended for any length of time by consent of two-thirds of the members present at any meeting specially convened for that purpose; provided such alteration, amendment or suspension, shall have been specified in the notice summoning such meeting, and that at such meeting twenty members at least be present.

ART. 39.—The payment of the subscription fee or the entrance fee and subscription, shall be held to be an acceptance of the rules and agreement to comply therewith.



ART. 41—The Committee of Management are authorized to invite His Excellency the Governor General, or the Administrator of the Province for the time being, to become an Honorary Member of the Club.

ART. 42.—That any Privileged Member paying £10 per annum may become an ordinary member, in which case the entrance fee of £20 will be reduced by the excess they have paid over ordinary members —say £5 per annum, and provided they give notice within two years of their election as Privileged Members, and upon payment at the time of giving such nottce of the sum of ten dollars.

#### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

#### OF THE

# STADACONA CLUB.

#### Committee.

The ordinary weekly meetings will be held every Wednesday, at five P. M., at which, three shall form a quorum. In the absence of the duly appointed Chairman, a Chairman for the day will be first elected, and the minutes of the last meeting having been read, the question will be put by the Chairman, "that they be confirmed."

If the minutes be objected to by a majority of the Members present, the particular subject objected to, will be reserved for further consideration, either at an extraordinary meeting, as may be decided upon, and if not objected to then, the Chairman will affix his signature thereto.

After the disposal of the minutes of the previous meeting, all such matters as require the consideration of the Committee will be brought before them, discussed and decided upon. For the despatch of business the Committee will, at each weekly meeting, appoint two of their number to be called the "Active Committee" to superintend the ordinary business of the Club and submit a weekly report of their proceedings.

#### SECRETARY AND MANAGER.

As Manager, he will have the general control and superintendence of the Establishment, under the Committee.

As Secretary, he will attend all meetings of the Committee and Active Committee—note their resolutions, and minute them in the books of their proceedings.

In all his written official communications he will state expressly, that they are made by direction of the Committee.

Besides his attendance upon the Committee, he will conduct the official correspondence of the Club, draw up Reports, keep regular accounts of all the financial concerns of the Club, an account of the wine and other stores in the Stock Cellars of the Club, an account with the House Steward for wines and stores delivered, for the consumption of Members, and for the use of the Establishment ; examine the accounts of the Tradesmen previously to their being submitted for final adjustment, and will pay the same when passed by the Committee.

He will ascertain that all goods, and provisions delivered, are in strict accordance with the orders given, and correctly charged in the Tradesmen's Books, and will sign such books. I tion Clu Me I sta Sta Sta Triz with Tr one

delivn, and ill sign He will attend to all communications, receive information upon all subjects connected with the business of the Club, and particularly all matters relating to the Members thereof.

He will submit to the Active Committee a weekly statement of the receipts and disbursements of the Club.

He will place before the said Committee for the time being, the Receipts for payments, which have been authorized by the General Committee at its previous meeting, with the exception of such as are paid directly by the Treasurer; and will pay over to the Treasurer, at least once a fortnight, all moneys received by him.

#### HOUSE STEWARD.

The House Steward will constantly reside in the Clubhouse, and will have the custody of the Supply Cellar, Plate, Cutlery, China, Glass, &c. He will have the general control and superintendence of the Men Servants in his department, and be responsible for their conduct and cleanly appearance, and in case of misconduct will report the same to the Secretary.

He will be charged with all deficiencies which may occur in the Stock of Wine, Liquors, &c., placed under his custody.

He will account daily with the Secretary for all moneys received from the Members for supplies.

He will make the established charges for all Provisions, Wines, etc., and cast up and receive from the Members the amount of their Bills.

#### CHIEF COOK.

The Chief Cook will have the immediate direction of the Kitchen department, and of the Assistants therein, as far as concerns the performance of their duties ;—and will prepare the daily Bill of Fare, with the concurrence of the Steward, keeping all orders for the issue of the Kitchen supplies for daily comparison, with the Dinner Bills, it being understood that no such supplies shall be issued without an order.

#### HALL PORTER.

He will enter in his book once a-day the name of every Member coming into the Club-house.

Strangers calling to see Members will be shewn by him into the Reception Rom, and intimation of their arrival immediately sent by him to the Member enquired for, if in the house.

If a letter for an absent Member be applied for by another Member, who may wish to forward it, the latter will be required to pay the postage (if any) and to sign an acknowledgment in the Porter's book of his having received the letter, in case of any future question.

He will make out orders for the issue of supplies from the Kitchen, and make himself generally useful in the Establishment in such ways as the Manager or Steward may require.

#### WAITERS.

ment will be subject to the order of the Manager, and under him to the Heads of the different departments, and will perform such duties as he or they may prescribe.

#### YARDMAN.

The Yardman will light the Fires, saw and cleave Firewood, convey Fuel at proper times to the various apartments, clean knives, keep the Footway in front, and Yard in rear of the House constantly clean, and perform all such other duties as the Manager or Steward may from time to time direct.

#### **GENERAL SERVANTS' REGULATIONS.**

No Officer or Servant will receive, under penalty of immediate dismissal, any present whatever from the Members, or tradesmen of the Club; and any Tradesman detected in giving such will be forthwith discontinued, and never dealt with again.

No Male or Female Servant will absent himself or herself from the Club-House, without leave from the Manager or Steward.

No Stranger will be admitted into the Club-House except on business, and the Servants are strictly prohibited from receiving visitors or followers.

Dipner will not be served to the Servants after two o'clock P.M., except when they are prevented by duty from attending at the regular hours.

No Linen, &c., will be washed by, or for any servant within the Club-House.

Eatables left on the dishes will be taken direct to the Kitchen, and in no way appropriated by the Servants.

Servants while on duty will not talk to each other, except on matters connected with their business; and no Servant is permitted to address an individual member in the house on matters either personal, or relative to the concerns of the Club, all communications of the latter kind to be made through the Steward to the Secretary for the information of the Committee.

If any money or articles supposed to be the property of Members shall be found by the Servants in the Club-House they will be delivered to the Manager through the Steward.

The Servants' entrance in rear will be under lock, and the key thereof be in the custody of the House-Steward.

No application for re-instatement of a Servant, who may have been dismissed, on the representation of a Member, will be read or taken into consideration, unless it come through, and be recommended by, the Member, on whose representation he or she was dismissed.

#### ENTRANCE HALL.

#### COFFEE ROOM.

Breakfasts may be served from eight until eleven o'clock A. M.; Lunches and Dinners from noon until eight o'clock P. M.; Hot Suppers from nine to ten o'clock P.M.; cold Suppers up to twelve o'clock P. M. and Liquors, Tea and Coffee up to one o'clock A. M., after which no orders of any kind can be received unless specially authorized by the Active Committee of the week on timely application in writing to the Secretary. Members ordering dinner or luncheon will fill up their dinner bill *themselves* and not employ the waiters to do so.

Articles of glass, earthenware, &c., which may be broken by the Members, either in the Coffee Room or elsewhere in the House will be paid for by them.

## DRAWING ROOM AND UP STAIRS ROOMS.

No pamphlet, advertisement, or notice of any kind will be laid on the tables, or put up in the Club by a Member, but any pamphlet, &c., which it may be wished to make known to the Club, shall be sent to the Secretary to be laid before the Committee for approval.

Writing materials will be provided in the Reception Room, and Secretary's Room.

The charges for cards will be 2s. 6d. per pack, if new, and 1s. 3d. if second-hand; for Billiards, 6d. for the English game of 32 or for the American game of 50; and 1s. for the English game of 63, or for the American game of 100. Cards will be permitted in the Smoking Room, and Smoking in the Billiard Room. Any Member may introduce a friend to Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner or Supper, on the terms stated in the 17th Article of the Constitution, on the same day that the name of such friend is inscribed on the Books; provided the number of names previously inscribed will admit of its being done.

No eatables beyond a Sandwich, Toast or Biscuit will be allowed in any room besides the Coffee Room and Strangers' Rooms.

No Servant will be allowed to enter the room where a general meeting is assembled.

#### DRESSING ROOM.

Any portmanteau, bag or baggage of any kind must be taken away immediately after use, and not allowed to remain in the Club-House for future use.

No Servant of the Club will be employed by any Member to clean clothes, boots or shoes, or to assist him in dressing.

No Member, except on special duty, nor servant of a Member, will be allowed to go down into the basement story of the house; nor will any such servant be allowed to go into any other room than the Dressing Room, and then only, to assist his master in dressing.
