MEMBERS CANNOT GET BOOZED Standing or Sitting

MR. CRAIG MADE THE MOTION Which Entirely Stops the Sale of Liquor in the Commons Building.

The Premier and Sir Charles Tupper both spoke on the subject but offered no opposition. A Host of Questions on the Order Paper—Mr. Laurier Called Up—On That Chicago Record Interview—He is Open to Conviction on the Free Fishing for Fish Ides.

Ottawa, Sept. 14.—(Special)—This has been question day in the House, the large total of 34 queries appearing on the order paper. Few elicited information of any great moment, and several had to stand, owing to the absence of Ministers. There were slim benches also on both sides of the House, less than 100 members being in attendance.

MR. BERGERON'S GOOD WORK.
Mr. Bergeron has rendered good service to his compatriots and to the country generally by calling attention to the attempts being made to induce large numbers of French-Canadian emigrants to emigrate to Brazil. To-day he pointed out that Montreal newspapers state one thousand people have been induced by representatives of a Brazilian steamer to proceed in Montreal.

Mr. Laurier's answer evinced the fact that the Confederation had acted promptly on Mr. Bergeron's suggestion of the other day. He expressed satisfaction that Mr. Bergeron had called attention to this matter. The Government had done everything possible to prevent the Canadian emigrants from emigrating to Brazil. Instructions had been given to the emigration agent in Montreal to place himself in communication with intending emigrants and to warn them of the danger they ran in going to Brazil. Moreover, Mr. Laurier declared special efforts were being made to induce French-Canadian emigrants to go to Canada, instead of to Brazil. The Government communicated with the episcopal authorities, and requested the bishops and priests to warn the people of the danger they were likely to incur in going to Brazil.

London, Sept. 14.—A semi-official communication upon the subject of the recent arrests of alleged dynamite conspirators was issued this afternoon. It says that there has been within the full knowledge of the Scotland Yard officials, for some time past a gang of desperadoes busily engaged in America in preparing the requisitions for an extensive and ambitious plot to perpetrate a dynamite outrage in this country and establish a reign of terror. Chief Inspector McVittie, who has been so prominently named in the London Press, has been the head of the Scotland Yard arrangements for checking the progress of these conspirators.

THEIR PLANS.

MIVILLE DISCHARGED.
There Was No Evidence to Show That He Took Miss Mahoney's Money.

In the Sessions John Miville was found not guilty on the charge of theft from the person of Miss Mahoney. ONE DAY AT THE CITY HALL.

The Aldermen Have Again Got Down to Business.

RECEPTION TO GAUDAUR.

Some Members are Showing Pica-yune Ideas Regarding It.

Electrician Higman's Report on Our Street Lights—Mayor Fleming is Responsible for the Delay in the Work of Widening the Subway—That Case of Alleged Nepotism at the High Level Pumping Station to be Investigated—General City Notes.

The Board of Control got down to business at its meeting yesterday morning and did a great deal of work in half an hour. There was some discussion upon the question of the amount to be voted by the city towards the cost of giving a reception to Gaudaur upon his return to Toronto. The Mayor favored \$500, Ald. Lamb thought enough, but when Ald. J. Graham raised it to \$200, Ald. Lamb agreed. However, the Mayor, seeing how things were going, had the matter laid over.

GEORGE WILLIAMS' JOB.
A petition was received from ex-Barranville Constable George Williams, asking for reinstatement. The Mayor asked Commissioner Coatsworth whether he needed Mr. Williams' services, and the Commissioner stated that, as far as he was concerned, it was not necessary to reinstate him. The cost of looking after the morgue and recovering the bodies of drowned persons had not cost more than \$50 so far. In reply to further questions, Mr. Coatsworth said that the work will cost about one-half the laboring man's wages, and that he had engaged Mr. Williams' brother to work around the morgue and drag for bodies when required.

ENFORCED A WRONG PRINCIPLE.
There was some discussion upon the application of F. B. McLaughlin to the Board of Control for redreing at Ashridge's Bay. The committee, which in two times refused to pay it because the contractor had not leveled the soil down to the level required, and the fact that the contractor had not reached the depth that the contract called for and this soil complained of would probably sink to the proper level in the course of a year.

HEARINGS HIS CATCHING.
When the clause referring to the Island Pumping Station and the employment of the son of Engineer Heil was reached there was a lively discussion for an hour. Ald. Gowankock said the report was hardly what the committee expected. The City Engineer had been ordered to carry out the instructions of the council and dispense with the services of Mr. Heil's son. He had not only not done so, but had dismissed another man, who was competent and reliable. He demanded that the whole matter be investigated.

STREET LIGHTING CONTRACT.
Mr. Ormond Higman, chief electrician of the Inland Revenue Department, reported the result of his inspection of the arc lighting on the streets, made on the nights of the 27th and 28th of August. The report set forth that the average of the 27th night was an excess of 25 per cent on the power required, and on the night of the 28th the electrician made an extended tour of the streets, and was able to reduce the 700 lights. There were found to be extinguished altogether and one lamp burning dimly. Taking into consideration the large extent of territory covered and the number of lamps in operation the opinion is expressed that, not only is the company fulfilling its contract, but is generously doing so, and that the operation of the whole plant is decidedly creditable. It was some minutes before the members of the board recovered from the amazement which the report caused. The first question asked by Ald. H. B. Maize was whether the company had any previous notification of the inspection. He asserted that the company had not. The reason abandoned the use of the large size carbons and reverted to the use of smaller ones, the average of the night only, instead of two. It was still the opinion of the committee, however, that the company was not doing its duty, and that the department was referred back to obtain further information.

MEMBERS AWARDED.
Tenders for a number of pavements were received and awarded as follows: Lowther-avenue, brick on concrete, \$291; Toronto-street, College-avenue, brick on concrete, \$17,580; Spencer-avenue, brick on gravel, \$847; all to be done by the City. House-lane, brick on gravel, \$12,9 J. S. Shields.

A COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE.
Ald. Hubbard declared that there was more nepotism in connection with the city service than had ever been shown under the Government. He demanded that a committee be appointed to investigate affairs at the high level and island pumping stations. The City Engineer made an appeal to the members of the committee to bring such matters to his notice, instead of bringing them up in public.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE.
The Property Committee held a two hour's wrangle yesterday afternoon. The chief bone of contention was the plan for the new addition to the Bay-street Fire Hall. The members of the committee were very sore that they had been ignored in the purchase of the lot and also in the preparation of the plans for the extension, which were now submitted to the Board of Control. The City Engineer and Board of Control advised themselves of the architect as soon as Chairman Burns submitted the plan there had solid ground for kicking. When the pur-

chase of the lot was put through (Council's statement was made that the alterations to the building would not cost more than \$3000. The plan submitted incurred an expenditure of \$400, and contained no provision for heating. Moreover, there was nothing to show that they had been approved by the chief of the brigade or Fire and Light Committee.

Ultimately after the members had expressed their disapproval of the other committees in the matter, the committee decided to recommend the Board of Control to call for tenders for the plumbing and steam heating of the new Court House.

NOTES FROM DEPARTMENTS.
Ald. McMunnich yesterday presented the Mayor with a fine brass weighing 4-3-4 pounds, which he caught before the 18th of August at summer residence on Lake Simcoe. The appeals against the assessment for the public water in the area of the Court of Revision to-day.
