> WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.-The Associated Press is informed that the President probably will make a statement to-morrow regarding the provisional government of the Republic of Panama, of the establishment of which the United States government was officially informed to-day. In view of the latest advices from Colon to the effect that the junta has succeeded in gaining control of the situation it is currently expected that this announcement will recognize the newly established government, but it was impossible to secure official information on this point.

The Associated Press is enabled to state that the United States government will conduct affairs with a firm hand in the execution of the treaty of 1846. Proposition to Bring Out Farm Laborers Received With Strong

government has decided to send H. E. Kyle of Oakville to England for a second time to induce farm laborers to come to this country has evoked pronounced expressions of disapproval from prominent labor leaders here.

"The governments both here and in Ottawa are acting in this matter in direct contravention of the wishes of organized labor, which represents a big percentage of Canada's population. This fact was clearly demonstrated in Brockville when in the form of a resolution the Dominion and Ontario governments were strongly condemned for this assisted emigration. What we want is immigrants who come to this country of their own free will and are not sent at the expense of the people of Canada. This is nothing more nor less than assisting pauper immigration, which is a hindrance rather than an assistance to the country. And apart from this fact, the government's agent receives instructions and undertakes to encourage only laborers who have a knowledge of farming and intend at some future date to take up that occupation for themselves. It sounds very well, but the experience of last summer teaches us that the theory has not worked out in practice. 




