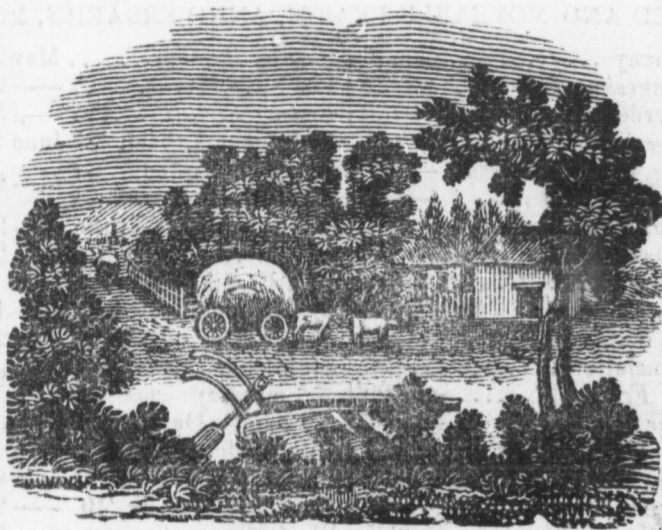

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 II. A total E
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ECLIPSES IN 1850.

There will be but two Eclipses this year, and both of the Sun.

I. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun beginning Feb. 11th. 11h. 11m. P.M., and ending Feb. 12th. 5h. 19m. A.M. Invisible in Europe and America, but will be seen by the inhabitants of China, Borneo, and New Guinea.

II. A total Eclipse of the Sun, beginning Augt. 7th. at 1h. 51m. P.M., and ending Augt. 7th. 7h. 1m. P.M. Invisible in Europe, Africa, and the North American Provinces, but will be seen at the Sandwich Islands, California, and Mexico; and in the North Pacific Ocean it will be total and central.

ORIENTAL AND OCCIDENTAL STARS.

VENUS will be the Morning Star to 13th Feb., after which it will be the Evening Star to Dec. 15; thence the Morning Star.

MARS Will be the Evening Star to Nov. 16; thence the Morning Star.

JUPITER will be the Morning Star to March 12; after which it will be the Evening Star to Sept. 24; thence the Morning Star to the close of the year.

SATURN will be the Evening Star to April 2, thence the Morning Star to Oct. 9; after which it will be the Evening Star to the end of the year.

EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

LEFT HAND PAGE.

COLUMN

- 1, & 2—Contain the days of the month and of the week.
- 3, & 4.—The rising and setting in mean time, of the highest point, or of the upper limb of the sun, corrected for refraction.
- 5.—Days length in hours and minutes.
- 6.—The Equation of Time (or quantity by which the Sun is slow or fast of the clock) at noon, apparent time (not mean) at Greenwich.
- 7.—The Sun's declination, for the same as the Equation, 6th column.
- 8. The rising or setting of the Moon. The setting being given from the New Moon to Full, and the rising from Full to New Moon.
- 9.—The place of the Moon in the Ecliptic.
- 10.—The time of the Moon's southing, or passing the meridian.
- 11.—Days increase or decrease in hours and minutes.

The top of the columns of each month shows the moon's phases, or the times of new and full moon, and of the first and last quarters, or two quadratures with the sun.

The FARMER'S CALENDAR is placed at the foot of the columns of each month.

RIGHT HAND PAGE.

- 1. Contains the days of the month.
- 2. Sundays, Phenomena, Anniversaries, &c.
- 3. Time of High Water at Halifax, Nova Scotia.
- 4. Annapolis, Nova Scotia.
- 5. Charlotte Town, P. E. Island.
- 6. Windsor, N. S. and St. John, N. B.

All the calculations in this Calendar are made to mean solar time, a mode of computation now in general use, and which will very soon supercede the old mode of reckoning. Mean time can be converted into apparent time, by subtracting the quantity in the sixth column of the left hand calendar pages, when the Sun is slow of clock, and adding it when fast.

defenders. No excuse or apology can be found for the want of order; it does not require talent,

or skill, neither does it consume time ; while its exercise causes every thing within its influence to be ready for action, agreeable to the eye, enduring in existence, and fitted to produce the required results without failure. There is one thing against which practical farmers should be cautioned, and that is, never to suffer their minds to run wild while they are bestowing such care on their farms. Science and agriculture must go hand-in-hand. Science will aid you much, and save you from much of that unremitting physical exertion sometimes complained of. Free yourselves from these prejudices against book-farming which many of you have read, and ponder well what you read, and it will not be long before your calling, which has been too much neglected from your own indifference, will rise to its true height. The time when a particular job is to be done, may not be of much importance to the manufacturer or mechanic, but to the farmer it is all important that he does almost every thing at the right time as he has to depend upon natural agents for success.

As economy in the accumulation and application of manures is a subject of almost paramount importance to the farmer, we offer a few remarks on the subject. In the first place, the dimensions of the barn-yard should be adapted to the amount of stock to be wintered. The barn being sufficiently capacious, all the products of the farm should be housed—the farmer can then consult his interest, either to thresh his grain in the fall or winter; but supposing a part at least to be threshed in the fall, the overplus of straw after littering the yard to the depth of a few feet, should be nicely stacked—this littering lays the foundation for the absorption of all liquids consequent upon the

yarding of the stock. As the winter advances recourse should be had, as occasion requires, to the straw stack, that a clean bedding may be provided for the stock; and then if suitable sheds are connected with the barn, sufficient protection is afforded during the inclemency of winter. The advantage arising from this mode is, all is saved, and this mixing up of straw with the manure of animals, makes an excellent compost for hoed crops the ensuing spring.—We very much doubt the propriety on the score of economy, of those who heap up the manure in the yard to rot, or of others who draw and stack it in the fields for the same purpose, and are subjected to the additional expense of shoveling and carting it twice—let it remain until just previous to ploughing, which may best be done about the time of planting, and then haul, and spread, and plough it under.

The Spring is a most important season to the farmer. In all cold climates where the warm and growing season is short, much depends upon getting the summer crops in, in good season, and in good order—the land should be well tilled, and the surface well pulverized, so as to give the roots of the young plants a healthful and vigorous growth in the early part of the season. This enables them to stand either too much wet, or too much dry weather, and the attacks of worms, much better than if got in late in the season, or in bad weather. The straw of grain sown early, is not as subject to rust or to lodge, as that sown late; and grain which is forward and ripens early, is usually

much better and heavier than that which is late—the farmer who gets his crops in well and in good season, is most sure of a good yield; besides, if he gets his spring's work done early, he will be most likely to do the whole work of the season in good time, and will have time to do it well; while, if he gets behind time in the spring, he will be most likely to get behind time through the whole season; and being drove with his work, will not be likely to do it well; and if he keeps an account of out-goes and in-comes, will be most likely to find his profits much less than they would have been, had his spring's work been done in season. There are many other important matters to be looked to during the spring. Do your old meadows need harrowing and manuring and additional grass seed? If so, now is the time to attend to it.

The Swedish turnip, (*ruta бага*), should be sown, if practicable, as early as the middle of this month, but the 20th or 25th will answer if they cannot be got in sooner. The yellow Aberdeen is a kind which requires nearly as long a season as the *ruta бага*. The common flat turnip grows much quicker than the kinds above mentioned, and will produce a good crop, on tolerably rich land, sown as late as 25th July, or 1st of August. Ground which has produced a crop of hay, rye, or wheat, may give a crop of flat turnips the same season. A soil inclining to sand is most suitable for turnips—compost of muck and barn-yard dung, with a dressing of leached ashes, furnishes a

good manure—the seed should be sown in drills—two feet spaces between the drills will admit the use of a small harrow or cultivator in cultivating the crop—the weeds must be killed as soon as they appear—the scuffle-hoe is the best hand tool for this purpose, it may be run rapidly along the ridges, close to the plants, and may take out almost every weed in the row without doing any damage, the spaces between the rows may be chiefly worked by a harrow or cultivator—the former is preferable on light lands—the plants should not be much thinned till they have got into the fourth leaf, and appear to be pretty well out of the way of the fly. The common turnip is less nutritive than the other kinds, but is, notwithstanding, very useful in feeding stock during the beginning of winter; and from the convenience of cultivating them as an after-crop, they are in many instances profitable—for late keeping the others are best.

The article of hay alone may be set down as one of great consequence to the farmer, being one of his principal products, and the most essential fodder for most kinds of live stock. Many different notions prevail respecting the time and manner of cutting and securing the hay-crop, some true system should be established with this as well as with the grain crop, which has been reduced to one general system. That mode which will preserve as much of the natural juices of the grass as possible, and in the cheapest practical manner, is the one to be obtained. To commence with the cutting and manner of curing, we will suppose the grass to be a good burden, and in full prime for the scythe,

but not ripe,—the workmen should be made to cut as low as possible, especially if there abounds a fine bottom, thereby increasing the crop, and all the grass mown in the forenoon should be spread before dinner. As soon as the external wet is off, and it becomes partially wilted, put it into winrows with a revolving horse-rake, and before the sun goes down into cocks of from 60 to 90 pounds; what grass is cut in the latter part of the day, remains in the swarth till next day. More hay is lost by cutting too late than by cutting too early. When grass is quite ripe it should be exposed to the sun as little as possible after it is mown, and be made into large cocks or removed immediately into the barn, that by a steaming process the dry stalks may become more valuable. Don't suffer your revolving hay rake, &c., to lie out in the fields exposed to the weather.

The Revolving Horse Rake, is a well known implement and should be owned by every farmer; it holds nearly the same relation to the common hand-rake, in saving labour, as the plough and cultivator bear to the hand-hoe. A large portion of our farmers have not yet availed themselves of its eminent advantages—the amount of work it will perform with a single horse and driver, may be easily estimated by any one, when it is stated that a strip of hay on the ground, ten feet wide, may be raked up into winrows as fast as the horse will walk; that is, if the horse travels three miles per hour, more than three acres

will be raked in that time, or twenty-four acres per day. The only labour is unloading each rakeful of hay, by a slight lifting of the handles, which causes the teeth to make a semi-revolution, and drop the load without stopping.

It may be laid down as a standing rule, and as a guide to direct our exertions, that all good farming, the whole of that process by which bad land is to be converted into good, or land naturally good and productive is to be continued in that state, is comprised in the three following operations of husbandry:—
 1. To carry off all stagnant and superfluous water by means of judicious draining. 2. To return through the medium of manure, the strength and fertility which has been extracted from the land by cropping. 3. To eradicate all noxious weeds, that the strength of the manure may be thrown into the crops and not into the weeds

Land intended for Corn should be broken up from 6 to 9 inches deep, varying with the quality of the soil, late in the fall, in order to that perfect pulverization of the soil which the frost of winter contributes so essentially to secure. The ploughing must be performed with great care and precision—no baulks—no crooked or imperfectly turned furrows are at all allowed, but the whole soil to the depth required, turned over. The heaps of compost manure should be made up on the land in August or after, ranged at convenient distances to load into the cart in the spring, and spread on the land with the best economy of travel, and to contain 30 to 40 loads each, which is the quantity usually applied to an acre—35 to 40 bushels is called a load. The manure

should be laid on the land in small heaps, about four paces apart; they can then be spread with more ease and expedition by making more heaps of a load, and placing them near together. Of all the crops that are raised none are of so much importance to the farmer as the corn plant, not only for its valuable grain, but its leaves, husks, and stalks for fodder and manure.

Indian Corn is undoubtedly an American plant, though we have no positive knowledge in regard to its original habitat. We are not aware that it has ever been found growing in a wild state; but as its spontaneous production could only take place in a region not subject to frost, it has been reasonably conjectured that it is a native of the tropics—what changes the plant has undergone by cultivation it is impossible to determine.

The advantage of oxen in farm labour, depends much on their discipline—if they are of the right form and spirit, they may be trained to walk as fast as horses, and will do as much at the plough, excepting perhaps in the very hottest weather—there are some oxen that will even stand the heat in the field as well as horses. An acre of land may be ploughed by a single pair of cattle and one man in four hours, and probably nearly two acres in a single day. When we take into view the expense of operating a team of this description, compared with those usually employed in this business, it will be quite well for our farmers

to consider whether most of their work cannot be done with one pair of cattle, and, if two pair are to be used would it not be better to cut the first furrow of less depth, and apply the power of the second pair to a subsoil plough to follow directly after. If we do not mistake the signs of the times, our modes of preparing land for culture will ere long be essentially modified by the use of the subsoil plough. Great improvement has already been made in this branch of farming, but still not one half of the land is well ploughed. While it is admitted that every man can learn to plough well, it is by no means clear that all do thus perform this branch of farm labour. Clayey soils, which have been well drained, may be greatly improved by fall ploughing, if it is done in the right way.

Every effort should therefore be made to render home happy and pleasant—books and periodicals, suited to the ages and capacities of both sexes should be provided, such as will not only convey instruction in relation to the business affairs of life, but of a character also that will tend to improve the morals and elevate the higher sentiments. The farmer should also apply himself to acquiring information as to the state and condition of agriculture, and he cannot effect the object better than by subscribing for a good Agricultural Paper. THE CULTIVATOR, published at Albany, "for the improvement of the mind and the soil," he will find to be the best; and from it he can note the practices of others, and carefully compare them with his own.

Operations on the farm are usually suspended by the first of this month; though as long as the ground continues open, something may be done—stones may be dug, walls built, drains made, ground ploughed, and materials for manure collected. In the distribution of the winter's supply of fodder, the coarser and poorer kinds should be reserved till the coldest weather, the appetites of the animals being then sharpest, it will be eaten with less waste. Those farmers who are not already provided with cutting machines, will do well to procure them, as their use is attended with considerable economy. Coarse hay, straw, or corn stalks, are, by being passed through a cutter, brought into

a more convenient form for mastication, and substances are eaten which would otherwise be rejected, or only partially consumed. The feeding of labouring animals on cut food allows them more time to rest, the cutting performing, in a great degree, the work of chewing and preparation for digestion. Attention should be given to keeping all animals, as much as possible, in a condition congenial to their habits and their comforts consulted in regard to both food and shelter. Close quarters are preferable for animals intended for fattening, in order to prevent the loss of their flesh by muscular exercise. When the ground has frozen, and a coating of snow has fallen, a good opportunity is afforded for moving wood, timber and other articles, taking produce to market, &c., business which may be done with greater facility than when the snow is deep.

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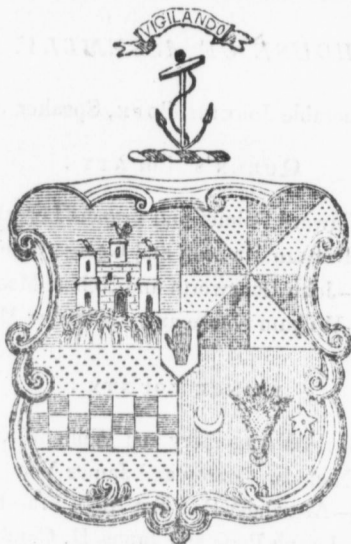


