Services of Grand Chaplain.

Grand Division opened in form.

Grand W. Patriarch read his Report as follows:

To the Officers and Representatives of the Sons of Temperance of the Province of Quebec, in Grand Division assembled.

DEAR BROTHERS.

Six months have now passed away since we last met for the transaction of business connected with our Order, during which time a kind Heavenly Father has preserved our lives and permitted us once more to meet in Annual Session to interchange the greetings of an exalted friendship, to encourage one another in the noble work in which we are engaged, and to deliberate on the means best adapted to promote and strengthen our Order. And may that spirit of harmony which has hitherto characterized our meetings continue to pervade this Assembly, which I trust may prove to be one of great happiness and lasting good to all present and our deliberations tend to promote the cause of Temperance generally.

I am happy to learn that in general our Divisions are working harmoniously and that the cause of Temperance, though slower in its movements than we would wish, is making steady progress which should lead us to be thankful to the great God of all good, and to work more unitedly than ever to accomplish the object of our meetings.

From reports which I have received from several of the Subordinate Divisions, I rejoice to say that their numbers are increasing and that they are striving to keep up the interest in their Divisions by readings, recitations and monthly lectures, and in the Division which I represent (Victoria Division No. 10, Lachute), we have a series of readings from temperance periodicals once a month, when our doors are opened to the public, by means of which I am happy to say some have already joined our Order.

I regret again to state (as in my report at our last session) that many of our Divisions have not sent me any reports thereby preventing me from making my report as complete as I should have desired.

In looking over the records of the Grand Division for some years past, I find the general cause of complaint to be the want of public Temperance Lectures, and I trust that at this session the Lecture Committee appointed at our last meeting are prepared to propose such plans as to enable us to keep a good and efficient lecturer in the field.

I am also happy to say that the Quebec Temperance League with which we amalgamated lately is prospering and that it is now out of debt or nearly so.

That in connection with our order in Montreal a new Division has been started called the new Era, No. 86, with good prospect of success, and some Divisions that had ceased working have been reorganized and are now in good working order, a full report of the general standing of the Divisions will be given by our Grand Scribe.

I would also state that since our semi-annual session application was made by Adamsville Division to be allowed to pass a By-law to enable members between 14 and 18 years of age to vote and take part in the proceedings of their Division and that permission to that effect was granted by me in accordance with the resolution passed at the said session. As regards the question of a National Division for the "British Provinces," the Grand Scribe has received communications from the Grand Scribe of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick which he will bring up before you for your consideration.

In conclusion Brothers I am pleased to state again that during my term of office I have not been called upon to decide on any disputed point and I hope and trust this state of good feeling and harmony may long exist, and while we read and hear of such accounts of crime, disease and death caused by the use of alcoholic drinks let us move steadily onward and fight as good soldiers of the temperance army until we succeed in banishing the evil from our land, and may the Great Patriarch above bless our cause, and guide us in all our deliberations.

I have much pleasure in stating that a new Division has been formed in Montreal, with every prospect of a successful career. It is named New Era, No. 86.

Cowansville Division, No. 58, which had ceased working for sometime has again resumed operations, with a fair prospect of success.

Since last meeting of Grand Division, I have had the pleasure of visiting several of the Divisions, in the Eastern Townships. I was much pleased with their condition and manner of conducting the work of the Division Room. The attendance at the several meetings was large, especially considering the season of the year, and being in most cases an extra meeting. I regret that I had no meeting with Slatehill Division. In consequence of the notice sent by me not having been received, owing to the absence of the R. S. no meeting had been called. I visited Granby, West Shefford, East Farnham, Adamsville, Cowansville, and Dominion Divisions. I know not whether the visits paid by me have been productive of good to the Divisions visited, but I do feel that I have been myself benefitted thereby, in as much as it has infused into me a more hopeful spirit as to the ultimate success of our Order in this jurisdiction. I have of late been rather despairing of success but from what I have seen and heard during my tour I feel as if it would be sinful, longer to be doubtful of success.

I brought before the several Divisions the necessity of employing an efficient labourer or agent, in order to enable us to compete with other organizations. We believe our Order to be the best adapted for accomplishing the objects we have in view, it is therefore our duty as much as lays in our power to diffuse its blessings over our country. The harvest is truly abundant but in order to reap the harvest we must have laborers, those laborers must be paid, and for that purpose money must be raised. How the necessary money is to be raised, must be left with each Division to do as may best suit. In one Division it was suggested that a considerable amount could be raised, by getting up Social meetings the net proceeds to go to the Grand Division Lecture fund. In another it was suggested that a subscription list should be made out, subscriptions to be solicited not only from members of the Order, but from friends outside the Order. Let every Division do something in this direction heartily and with a will, and the object will be attained. I trust the Grand Division will not separate without taking up this matter in earnest, and have measures matured in order to have an Agent in the field early in the fall, with an efficient agent in the field and an earnest missionary spirit in our membership the success of our Order is certain.

In regard to the question of a National Division, for the British Provinces, I have again, communications from the Grand Scribes of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. They seem anxious to have the matter considered in a convention of delegates from the several Grand Divisions, and in order to give the Grand Divisions of Ontario, and Quebec, an opportunity of naming dele-

dates, the meeting has been postponed until after the sessions of those Grand Divisions, in June and July, and 2nd Wednesday in August, has now been named for the meeting in the city of St. John, New Brunswick, I can see no objection to this conference. It will not in any way compromise this Grand Division or bind it to any definite action as to the formation of a National Division. All the arguments for and against the measure with the facts bearing thereon will be brought forward, considered and discussed, and a report or reports agreed to, which will be submitted to future meetings of the several Grand Divisions, and action taken thereon.

Financially the Grand Division has improved during the past quarter, and I have in consequence been enabled to reduce the debt of the Grand Division by the sum of \$35, leaving a small balance on hand.

We your Committee of Good and Welfare to whom was committed the Reports of the G. W. P. and G. Scribe, beg leave to state that we have given them our best consideration, and first of all we cordially unite in the recognition of that providential hand that brought us together once more and feel it incumbent on this Grand Division ever to acknowledge the kind hand of Him without whose aid all our efforts will be in vain.

GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH'S REPORT.

1st. It is gratifying to find that the Order generally is in a comparatively prosperous condition: and we unanimously concur in the means which several of the Divisions are adopting in increasing and keeping up the interest of the Division Room, and recommend their general adoption as detailed in the third paragraph of said report.

2nd. In regard to the neglect of Sub-Divisions in making regular and prompt returns which is so essential to the healthful working of the Division. That an earnest appeal by the G. W. P. be made to such as are remiss in this matter and if persisted in, that such Division be reported to the Grand Division.

3rd. Your committee regard the appointment and sustentation of a competent lecturer as of the utmost importance to the success of the Order, and

that the grand Division should at once resolve upon the appointment of such an individual; and it should be the duty of each Division to do their share of sustaining such Lecturer. And with the view of carrying out the above suggestion each representative now present should promise a certain amount to meet the expenses of such Lecturer, and those Division not represented should at once be communicated with, to ask their co-operation.

4th. Your committee rejoice to know that the Quebec Temperance League is successfully prosecuting its work and that peace and harmony has prevailed throughout the order during the past year.

G. S. REPORT.

With respect to the Report of the G. S. your Committee see with pleasure a steady increase in membership and extension in number of Divisions ascertained by personal visitation of the G. S.

The question of the establishment of a National Division for British North America is one that must have an important bearing on the prosperity of our Order, and we are, therefore, in favour of a conference of delegates from the several Grand Divisions that the subject may have the fullest consideration and with the view of obtaining the greatest number of delegates as well as the lessening of the expense would advise that the said conference be held in Boston, on occasion of the meeting of the National Division instead of St. John as proposed.

Your committee observe with satisfaction the material decrease of the debt of this Grand Division, which is no doubt due to the economical management of the G. S. and which entitles him to the gratitude of this G. D.

That your Committee are pleased to observe that the G. S. has been able to visit several subordinate Divisions since last meeting and would suggest that he be requested to furnish a list of expenses that the same may be refunded by this G. D.
