The fall of prices in the security markets in New York on Tuesday made a curious contrast with evidences of prosperity as displayed in announcements of extra dividends by industrial corporations. The E. W. Bliss Company voted the third extra of 100 per cent. for the year on the common stock, making the total to be ordered paid in cash since Jan. 1 316½ per cent. on the \$1,500,000 stock. The latest special distribution, as well as the usual quarterly payment of 1½ per cent. on the common and 2 per cent. on the preferred, will be made on Dec. 28.



It was only a brief and passing allusion to the German peace proposal, but the ringing announcement that it was still the policy and determination of the government struck the keynote of the new government's attitude, and roused a prolonged demonstration of ap-

Referring to the vast daily expenditure of £5,700,000 as "colossal beyond imagination," he frankly declared that such figures could not be continued insitely. All that could be hoped for was to continue them long enough to
