The Great Coal Strike Is Over

Lloyd George Brings About Settlement and All Will Rush Work to Make up Some of Lost Time

BEATEN ENEMY

London, July 21—The South Wales miners have accepted the terms agreed upon yesterday, and the strike is definitely at an end. Throughout the coal fields there was an overwhelming majority in favor of the settlement.

Work in the mines will be resumed at once. Both sides have promised the government to exert every effort to make up for the week of idleness.

David Lloyd George, minister of munitions, to whose efforts the ending of the strike is largely due, appeared in the conference hall in Cardiff after the decision had been received, and received an enthusiastic reception. President Winstone of the Miners' Federation declared that Mr. Lloyd George and his colleagues had performed a great service for the miners of the empire, who now were prepared to do everything possible to bring the war to a speedy terminawere prepared to do everything possible to bring the war to a speedy ter

Several days ago I had information that a very severe battle was being fought with steady progress in favor of the Italian arms. This battle reached its greatest intensity on July 18. The enemy was vigorously pursued, his forces badly cut up and his entire camp captured, together with important positions and large quantities of ammunition.
