
120-TON GYROSCOPE TESTED FOR LINER

Biggest of Stabilizers will be Installed on Shipping Board Vessel-Will Prevent Roll-

Philadelphia, April 18 - Seasick ess and 'sea legs" will be eliminated by the installation on ocean liners of a huge gyro-stabilizer, a test of which was witnessed at the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company's plant last week by naval officers, engineers and representatives of shipping concerns. The test was declared to have been a "pronounced success."

Designed to prevent the rolling of the largest ocean-going ships, those who witnessed the test said that by the use of the devise passengers would be able to stroll on the decks, regradless of rough weather. The device would not eliminate pitching or riding of great waves in a storm, however, the experts said. Aside from the greater comfort to passengers as a result of the steadiness of the ship, it was stated that the stabilizer, which would be effective in freeing ships grounded on shoals.

The stabilizer, which weighs 120 tons, is to be installed in the Shipping Board steamer Hawkeye State, plying between Baltimore and Honolulu. It is said to be the first one to be placed in a large
