La MARQUISE de FONTENY

Titled English Woman Joins The Gaiety Chorus—Her Home the Scene of Little Lord Fauntleroy's Life—A Great Estate

Lady Sydney Ogilvie Grant, who has just gone on the stage, joining George Edwards' musical comedy company at the Gaiety Theatre, London as a member of the chorus, is one of the three sisters of the present Earl of Seafield and his home is a native of New Zealand. She has been living for a considerable time with her extremely evasive mother, the widowed Countess of Seafield at the quiet Brompton Rectory at Shipbourne-on-the-Hill, Warrickshire, and has found life so utterly dreary and conventional there, after the freedom of her previous residence in New Zealand, that she according to her own account, has gone on the stage with no other object than to have good time. There are few more romantic stories than that of the Earl of Seafield, even in its most modern episodes, and in its earlier phases it may be said to extend from one end of the world to the other. It is generally understood that the Earl's inspiration for the novel and play entitled "Little Lord Fauntleroy."
The fifth Earl of Seafield became insane. The sixth Earl, his brother, therefore succeeded to vast accumulations of rent, and as long he lived provided a home for his numerous sons. When he died, however, John Charles, his eldest surviving son, who succeeded as seventh earl, was asked to share the accumulations with his brothers. He refused, and thereupon they were forced to sue him. The litigation, after the washing of a great deal of family linen in court, the contest was settled in favor of the seventh earl, but he is so furious against his younger brothers that, with the co-operation of his son, he managed to secure the disinvestment of the property. In due course his son, Charles succeeded as eighth earl, and after spending a few years in the regiment of Life Guards, died prematurely, leaving the entire property, namely, the whole of the Ogilvie estate, carrying with it a seat in the House of Lords, passed, without a vestige of property to the young peer, James, who succeeded as ninth earl. This ninth earl married three times and after enjoying his barren honors for forty years died in 1887, whereupon his eldest son Francis William succeeded for a time in the royal navy, but had exceeded his allowance and had been exceedingly wild and reckless, and in consequence of some unpleasant scrape started out to New Zealand. There he met with all kinds of hard knocks, but nevertheless earning a precarious livelihood at odd jobs, and in the way of fencing, ditching, and as a farm laborer. He died at the age of thirty, leaving a few months after succeeding to the honors, leaving a large family. His wife, a Scotch woman of the humbler class, as has been alleged in a number of English newspapers the late Countess of Seafield, who was the daughter of an officer named Evans, a son of that Irish family of which Lord Carbery is the chief.

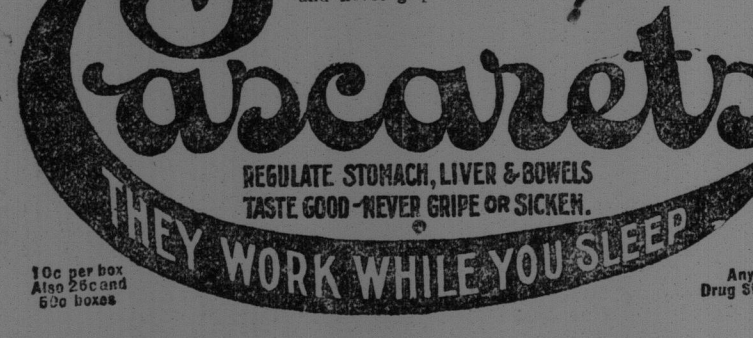

"SOMEONE has said 'thinking is just what nobody wishes to do. These words hold the explanation of the inefficiency and mediocrity of human existence, for truly no one wishes to reflect, for many an intelligent men and women live without ever performing this function."
—Dora Melegari.

How often do you think? "What a ridiculous question," you say. "Why, all the time, of course." But do you? I know I don't.

And before you are so cocksure that you do, please let me define what I mean by thinking.
Or better still, let someone else define it for me. "It is an entirely convinced," says Arnold Bennett, "that what is more than anything else lacking in the life of the average, well-intentioned man of the world is the reflective mood. We do not reflect. I mean, we do not reflect upon genuinely important things; upon the direction in which we are going; upon what life is giving us; upon the share which reason has in determining our actions; and upon the relation between our principles and our conduct."
Now that's the kind of thinking I mean.
You sit in a trolley car—"you" I mean you and your next door neighbor—and I, all rolled into one, in a word, the average person—and you look out the window and dream. You see a white gown getting splattered with mud and you think you must have some big public question, and you get up rather late than usual to play cards, and you wonder what time sea-and-go got home.
So your mind drifts.
You concentrate on some important letter you have to write and think out just what you are going to say.
You try to recall some of the poetry you once learned.
You think over some big public question, and you get up rather late than usual to play cards, and you wonder what time sea-and-go got home.
Or, best of all, reflect upon some genuinely important thing—upon the direction in which you are going—upon what life is giving you.
Of course, as Mr. Bennett warns us "you will not have gone ten yards before your mind has slipped away under your very eye and is lurking around the corner with another subject."
But if it does, to quote once more, "bring it back by the scruff of the neck. Bring it back forty times, if necessary."
If you do perhaps by and by you may get the habit of really thinking.

LONDON'S POOR

Statement Just Issued Shows More Than 100,000 Paupers

London, Oct. 12.—A statement of persons in receipt of relief in London just published shows that there are 102,853 paupers of whom 73,251 are in the workhouses and 29,602 (including 688 children boarded out beyond the unions and 11,177 other children under sixteen years of age) are on the outdoor lists.

The total is lower by 13,648 than that for the corresponding period of 1910, and this is chiefly due to the removal of the pauper disqualification under the old pensions act. The number of paupers represents a rate of 22.7 per 1,000 of the population.

Perhaps the most of us would be differ-ent if our neighbors were what they should be.

NEW COINAGE FOR RUSSIA

St. Petersburg, Oct. 13.—It is reported that Russia is about to abolish her present silver coinage and replace it with nickel for the lower values and for rubles and half-rubles with a coin of less size containing the same relative quantity of pure silver as the silver coinage of other leading countries, instead of, as now, about twice that amount. The reform will probably take some years to effect.

FOUR MILLIONS IN GREAT WATERWORKS

Highest Spillway Dam in the World to be Built—A Quarter of a Mile of Huge Turbines

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 13.—Construction work soon will begin on what is declared to be the highest spillway dam in the world, at Long Lake, thirty miles north of Spokane, where the Washington Water Power Company will develop 60,000 electrical horse power with four turbines, each of 22,500 h. p., the largest yet constructed anywhere.

The dam will be 320 feet in length, 191 feet at the highest point and 145 feet in width at the base, built up of Cyclopean masonry. The spillway is to be surrounded with three roller dams, each nineteen feet in diameter and sixty-five feet in length. In addition, there will be two gates, each twenty-five feet in length and nineteen feet in diameter.

The tunnel, through which the flow of the Spokane river will be diverted, is 225 feet in length and opens into a cut 250 feet. It is thirty feet in width and twenty feet in height, and carries 8,000 cubic second feet of water. The entrance of the tunnel is of concrete and steel girders. It is expected to complete the plant in 1912. The total cost of work and equipment is placed at \$4,000,000.

FIND THAT IRELAND IS CHANGED

What Members of the Eighty Club Have Found on Their Visit

CONFIDENCE IN FUTURE

London Chronicle Man's Letters to His Paper From Dublin and Belfast—A Sunday in the Capital—The Outlook for Home Rule

(Times Special Correspondence)

Dublin, Oct. 3.—A correspondent of the London Daily Chronicle, who accompanied the Eighty Club on their visit to Ireland, writes: "Ireland is changed. That is the first impression left by the experiences of members of the Eighty Club in the course of days that they have spent in the Irish capital. You cannot judge Ireland from Dublin, but you have had a most interesting political opinion, who know Ireland well, and they all agree that the condition of the country has been transformed."

"John Redmond, himself, in his cordial speech of welcome to the Eighty Club pilgrims, spoke of Ireland as a transformation. The same testimony reaches us from all sides, Unionist as well as Nationalist. We have ocular evidence that Dublin itself is revived, it is a city with all the air and graces of a capital, and with a highly individual character, especially in its architecture, so full of dignity and repose.

Confidence in Future

"The Dublin of these days has a thrilling aspect. It may not be rich, but there are not wanting signs of a growing prosperity. Still more marked is the intellectual renaissance. There cannot be in Dublin even for a few days without being conscious of a strange stir in men's minds. Pride in Irish nationality is again in evidence in the future of Ireland is all but universal; you feel in the very atmosphere a buoyancy of spirit that heralds a new epoch. Dublin is awaiting with calm confidence the fruition of long-cherished hopes, often bantered almost to the very realization, but now at last destined to an early fulfilment.

"The ravages of religious and political animosities in Ireland has been greatly mitigated in the last dozen years. There is a growing recognition among men of all creeds and all parties that they have interests in common as Irishmen, and that Ireland needs the services of all her sons. It is true that political opinions still mainly follow the lines of religious belief; a Protestant is usually a Unionist, and a Roman Catholic is usually a Home Ruler. But these old walls of sectarian partition are breaking down.

"Local legends are heard in England about the alienation of the working classes in the towns from the Christian churches. There is no ground for such complaint in Ireland. Here, in Dublin, the Irish democracy is intensely religious, and on Sunday I visited the Roman Catholic cathedral, a building of rather shabby exterior, situated in a mean quarter of the city. Vast crowds had foregathered in the vicinity of the church—the great majority men and boys, all of them in their workaday clothes, most of them obviously unskilled laborers, not half of the great numbers of men and boys who were seen on the Sunday morning. Every service is crowded, and the congregation was dispersing before our eyes as another was assembling ready to enter the church. Men and women congregated at different doors and occupied separate areas within. The eagerness to get admission into the sacred building was so intense that the speaker presented by an English crowd gathered for a political meeting or a football match. Men and boys crowded on each other's heels, every one reverently crossing himself before entering and every one, however poor, dropping his penny into the bowl at the doors.

"From the pro-cathedral, passing on our way through dismal streets with the marks of poverty and neglect upon houses and people, we reached the district of Gardiner street. In this gloomy and solemnly beautiful temple the worshipper has all the aids that equiptude lends to the devotional spirit. The chapel was densely thronged by a congregation representing all classes of the community, including many poverty-stricken women, whose thin, worn faces, seamed with lines of care, bore an expression of rapt devotion. At other Catholic churches in the city could be witnessed the same scene.

Relaxation Sunday Afternoon

"Sunday afternoon is given over to relaxation. All the shops remain closed, but the streets are thronged with people, and it is a favorite time for demonstrations and processions. On this particular Sunday the 'Irish Language Society' had a popular festival. A long and variegated procession struggled in picturesque disorder through the main streets to the music of many bands, bearing aloft highly-colored banners, some inscribed with cabalistic signs in the Esse characters, which, it is safe to say, not one person in a thousand of the outsiders could decipher. There is a genuine revival of interest in the old native language. It is a part of that national renaissance, the workings of whose mighty spirit can be seen in many directions. If the effort to reconstitute the Irish language represents the idealistic side of the national renaissance, the discipline of the Irish agriculture represents its practical side. Men of all creeds are co-operating in this truly blessed work."

In Belfast

"Writing from Belfast, the same correspondent says: 'The new unifying influences at work in Ireland are producing a powerful effect, even in Belfast. This is a case of the new converts. Home Rule, but it has made up its mind that Home Rule is inevitable. Many Belfast Unionists are beginning to feel the spell of the national spirit of national unity, which is effecting a wonderful transformation in Ireland.

"The mass of the Protestant population remains hostile to Home Rule, but it is now a very vague and indeterminate hostility, due more to habit of mind than reason or conviction. will be the usual flamboyant rhetoric, and much leaning on the drama. After this Belfast will go about its business in its usual eager, methodical way, little perturbed by the fears conjured up.

"The fact is the old bitterness that envenomed the Home Rule controversy in Belfast is gone, never to return. At the Nationalist reception given to us by Joseph Devlin, M. P., who has done so much for our cause, and for nationalism in Belfast, a man was pointed out to me who was a leader on the Orange side in the riots of 1881. Converted to Home Rule several years ago, he is now an enthusiastic worker in the cause.

"This, of course, is an exceptional case, but I am told by men of every party that the whole tone of political opinion in Belfast has changed for the better in the last decade.

"The old fanatical intolerance has almost wholly disappeared. As for the threats of forcible resistance to Home Rule, they are universally derided. We have talked to several Unionists among them several influential Presbyterian ministers, and without one single exception they have all expressed their surprise by force as a grotesque piece of imaginative folly. Some of these Unionists were good enough to answer questions by members of our party. They made no disguise of their dislike for a national party in Dublin, but rooted in reason, a vague apprehension begotten of old conflicts. And this is the attitude of many Protestants in Ulster today."

class of the feeble-minded that will never have the sense of responsibility, there remains practically a barrier to establishing a proper system for caring for the mentally defective in the city schools.

"Until the provincial laws compel the segregation of mentally defective children, parents will continue to refuse permission to place that class of children in institutions, and the evil of reproduction of that class will not abate.

"Experience in the care of mentally defective children is proving that in cases where sense of responsibility is lacking, tuition in public school classes will not repress those children to normal mentality. It becomes, therefore, a necessity to segregate those children in institutions.

"Nearly all the cases of mental defectiveness in pupils of the city schools are those where sense of responsibility of citizenship will ever be lacking. To attempt to deal with these cases without the necessary provincial laws, would be futile.

"All positive tests for grades of mental defectiveness in school children are, at the earliest, in the period between six and eight years of age, and more particularly at seven years of age, the time when segregation would be least distressful to the child."

FOOD PROMISES TO BE DEARER IN LONDON
Higher Cost of Living This Winter in World's Metropolis is Feared
London, Oct. 11.—"Taking the average family to consist of five persons, I shall be well within the mark when I say that its expenditure for groceries and dairy produce during the coming winter will be increased from 30c to 75c a week."
This was the statement made by the buyer for one of the largest firms of provision merchants in London. It shows that there is every reason for the housewife to look forward to the coming winter with dismay—especially if the amount available for this expenditure is strictly limited.
The ominous feature about the situation is that the scarcity is not confined to this country, Siberia, for instance, has become an important source of supply of butter and cheese during late years. Now, the supplies coming from that country are very meager, and as being poor in quality. Australia, too, is falling out in the supplies which she is accustomed to send. As for Denmark, Sweden, Finland, Brittany, which are large senders in ordinary times, they seem now to be as badly off as we are.
On the first day of next month, we may be prepared for a rise of two cents a quart in the price of milk. This is inevitable, in view of the price at which the contractors for the coming six months have been fixed. Butter and cheese will also be advanced in price. The supply of English cheese this year is merely nominal, for dairy farmers have had all their work cut out to find the supply of milk for which they had made contracts.
When the housewife leaves the grocer and goes to the green-grocer, she will be in for a similar experience. Cabbages are now fetching four cents each wholesale at Covent Garden. What they fetch at the green-grocer depends on the taste and fancy of the seller, as Mr. Sam Weller would say. Of cauliflower there are none to be had of any kind.
Fortunately the supply of potatoes has turned out to be better than was at one time anticipated.
But altogether it is a dreary outlook. And the only consolation is that other countries are as badly off as we are, with the added difficulty that prices are made dearer by tariffs.

HON. J. K. FLEMMING IS THE NEW PREMIER.
He Asks Until Monday to Name Members of His Government

The resignation of Hon. J. D. Hazen's cabinet was placed in the hands of Lieutenant-Governor Tweedie at 8:30 o'clock last evening, as scheduled, and, following the advice of the late premier, Hon. J. K. Fleming was called upon to form a new government. The new premier was in conference with the Lieutenant-Governor at the Royal Hotel and asked until Monday to submit the names of his ministers. This then a non-authoritative announcement can be made as to the make-up of the executive.

The programme was carried out yesterday exactly as mapped out beforehand. In the afternoon the government led by Mr. Hazen met in the Church street rooms and it was said that Hon. Mr. Fleming was the choice as the next provincial leader. Lieutenant-Governor Tweedie arrived on the 6:30 train and went to the Royal waiting the call of the retiring premier. Hon. Mr. Hazen called at 8:30 o'clock and in the presence of the Lieutenant-Governor, acting on this suggestion, summoned Hon. Mr. Fleming to meet him at 9 o'clock. Hon. Mr. Fleming accepted the task of forming the new ministry, and arranged to meet the government at Fredericton on Monday to present the names of the new heads of the provincial departments.

A Happy Night at Balmoral Castle—Eighty Cooks and Assistants to Prepare the Dinner

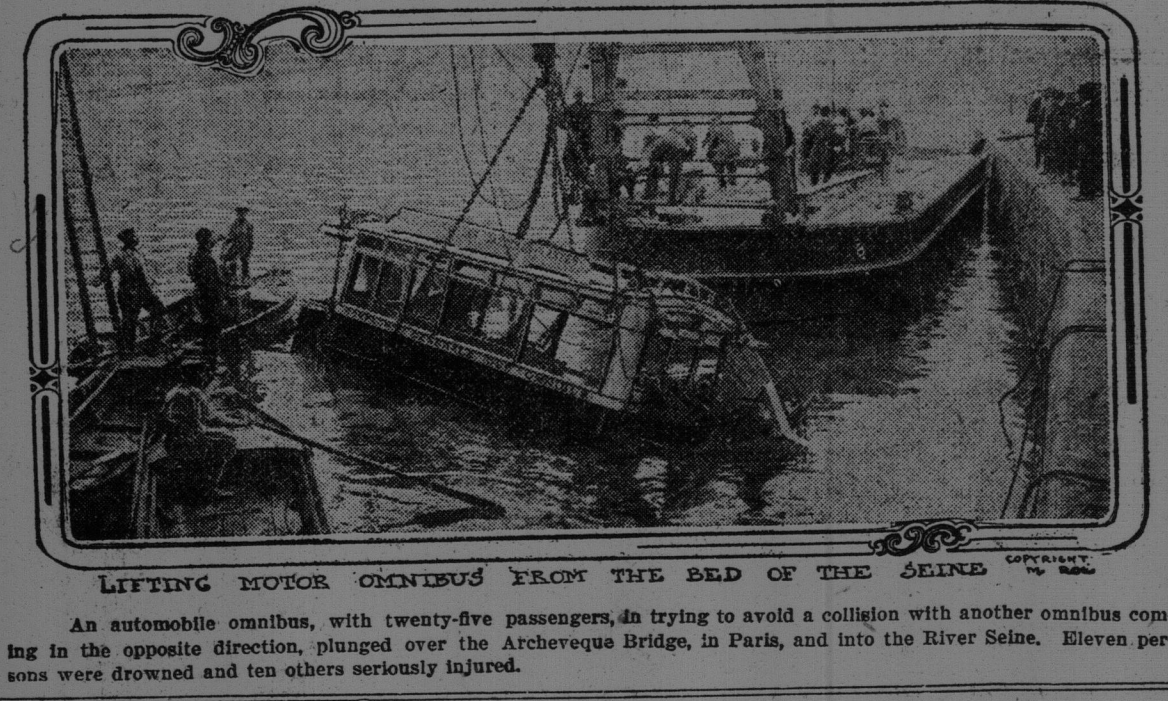

Their Imperial Majesties will be received on the platform by Their Excellencies the Governor-General and Lady Hardinge, the governors and heads of provinces, the commander-in-chief, military and civil, of government. After the arrival of the Governor-General and high officers have been presented by His Excellency the Governor-General, their Imperial Majesties will proceed to a pavilion within the fort where the ruling chiefs will have the honor of being presented. Their Imperial Majesties will, after this, move in a procession from the fort through the principal streets of the city to the Ridge, where they will be greeted before proceeding to their camp, by the representatives of British India in a special pavilion.

Rangoon, Oct. 12.—A report which reaches here from Hmawbi, nineteen miles away, tells of the miraculous escape of Leo Lyons, a European lad, who was being hunted by a tiger. He, with two friends, was out after deer at a village several miles from Hmawbi Railway Station when they met a party of twenty Burmese and Shans, armed with spears and dhalis. They asked Lyons to shoot a tiger that had been entrapped in the jungle close by. He went and found the animal had escaped.

CANE HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF YEARS OLD

MADE FROM WOOD OF PRE-GLACIAL PERIOD, FOUND IN ALBERTA—Presented to President Taft

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 13.—President Taft has among the souvenirs of his western trip a cane cut from a stump, which scientists declare was a tree before the glacial period. ALL DISCHARGED

Middletown, Conn., Oct. 13.—The four Italians, Antonio Di Stefano and Giacomo Lisca, who were arrested on the accusation of having conspired to wreck the express train over the Valley Line of the New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company on the evening of Sunday August 27 at Marasmus, were discharged by Judge Peaine.

The further accusation against the men had been that they removed the spikes from the rails which produced a wreck in which one man was killed and about forty passengers injured.

Judge Peaine in a review of the evidence said he found nothing to support the story of a conspiracy among the men as related by Almino Alessio, an Italian detective from Boston, who had himself confined in a cell next to the men in Haldan jail. Nor did the court find in the evidence any consistency confirming the railroad's contention that spikes had been withdrawn from the rails.

Judge Peaine ordered the four men discharged. All had been employed in section gangs on the railroad, and one contention was that they had grudges against the foreman for their discharge. Each defendant set up an alibi which many witnesses supported.

After the evidence closed, Prosecutor Coughlin said he would not make any claim against the men.

James H. Webb, for the New Haven road, wanted to make claims as a citizen in the interest of justice, but counsel for the men objected, as contrary to practice in the state. The court denied the request. In a suit filed against the New Haven road Monday by a victim of the wreck, the claim was made that the train was too heavy for the rails.

TAFT INVITES DUKE OF CONNAUGHT TO PAY VISIT TO THE STATES

London, Oct. 13.—During his tenure of the governorship of Canada it is expected that the Duke of Connaught, accompanied by the Duchess and Princess Patricia, will pay a visit to the United States. A cordial invitation has been sent by President Taft to the duke.

CHINESE ARE TO LET SUN DETERMINE TIME Will Drop Moon From Calendar and Get Into Western Way

London, Oct. 13.—From Peking it is announced that the Chinese government is about to drop the troublesome moon from its calendar and follow the practice of western nations in using only the sun. The present Chinese year began on January 30, and is the fourty-sixth of the 76th year of the reign of the present emperor. Ordinarily there are twelve lunations or months, but once in thirty lunations a thirteenth lunation is added to the year, as a result of which the year can be as long as 354 days, or as long as 384 days. The months are more regular than our own, alternating between twenty-nine and thirty days. The Chinese year completely fails to keep the seasons within regular bounds.

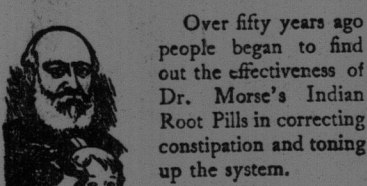

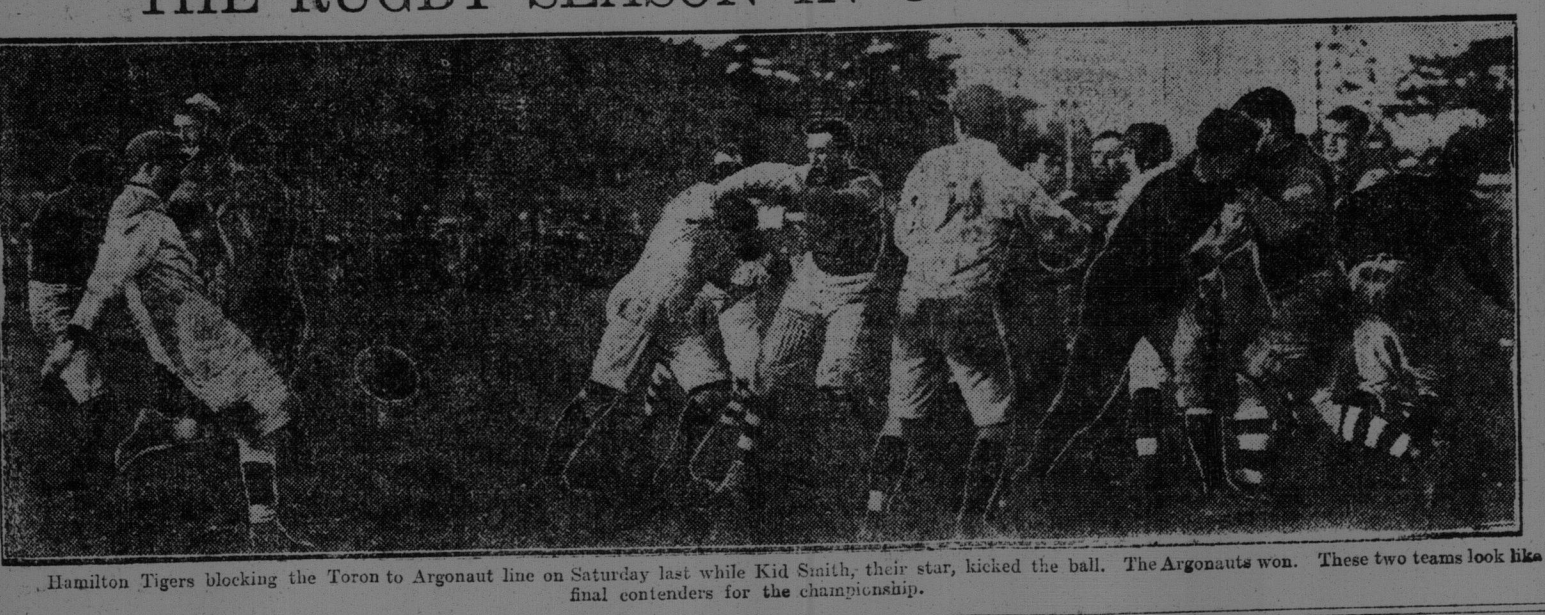

OPPOSITION PREPARED FOR ACTION

Meeting of M. P. P.'s Here To Discuss Political Situation and Arrange Course to be Followed

The rumor that there is a possibility of a provincial general election being held in a short time evidently stirred up the members of the opposition party for a considerable number of them arrived in the city yesterday and this morning they were joined by their leader Hon. C. W. Robinson.

The selection of a new leader and premier by the government party and the fact that he has asked until next week, before he will be able to announce the personnel of his cabinet, would naturally make it difficult for the opposition to determine distinctly their plan of action, but in so far as was possible they made ready for any decision reached by the new government.

If Premier Fleming decides to go to the people at once the opposition is ready. If he decides to hold the by-elections in St. John, Charlottetown and Miramichi, the opposition made their plans to meet that contingency.

They had reason to be greatly satisfied with the results of the last election from a provincial point of view. In only five counties out of fifteen did the Tories have a majority—York, Sunbury, Kings, Kent and Charlotte. Albert and St. John both gave the Liberal candidates majorities and one of the leaders to-day declared that the opposition members naturally feel that without the insidious and fake canvasses that were used against the federal government, without the influence of Mr. Hazen, who had for many years been the chief of the provincial government party in power and out of power; and with the extravagant and reckless methods of the administration and the great dissatisfaction felt with their administration of the roads and bridges; with the favoritism and graft that were used in every one of the 19 parishes in the province; with the vacillating and unsatisfactory position of Valley Railroad affairs, the electors of New Brunswick are quite prepared to follow the example of the people of the dominion and elect the power so strongly entrenched.
