King Alfonso Wins and Gambling Place is Closed —The Duke of Fife's Affairs—Canadians Hon-

King Alfonso and his mother, Queen Marie Christine, have at length succeeded in having their way and, in deference to their pensistent pressure, the Spanish government has issued a decree for the immediate closing of the great public gambling establishment at San Sebastin. Known as the Casino, it was instituted about the year 1908, by the objectionable Marquet, after he had been compelled by the Belgian government and legislature to close his gambling place at Ostend, in spite of his possessing the silent support of the late King Leopold II.

By wholesale bribery he was able to secure a footing at San Sebastian from the venal municipality and naturally attracted to this watering-place, which for twenty years or more had been the favorite summer resort of the king and his mother, all the scum and riff-raff of Europe, for whom even Monte Carlo was too decent and respectable. Their presence naturally spoiled San Sebastian for the court, and the royal family to such an extent that the king declared that if that sort of thing continued, he would cease going there.

When the gambling establishment was first instituted, the government of the day turned a deaf ear to he royal protests, insisting that political party considerations rendered it impossible for it to offend the city authorities of San Sebastian, by a rigorous enforcement of the anti-gambling laws. Fortunately, the present premier, Canalejas, feels himself strong enough to deal with the situation in accordance with the law of the land, and the wishes of its sovereign.

As for Marquet, he is reaping so great a harvest from the tables which he was permitted to set up in the new Heliopolis, suburb of Cairo, that he can afford to regard with indifference the closing of his casino at San Sebastian. His one dread now is that Lord Kitchener may drive him out, and that he may be obliged to fall back upor his only remaining gambling hells, namely, those in Portugal, which date from the beginning of the republican regime.

Since no mention is made of him or his sons in any standard "Peerage," or other work of reference, it should be explained that the founder of the Duff family, of which the late duke was the chief, was William Duff, born in 1697, who was member of parliament for Banffshire during the reign of George II. It was this monarch who cerated him, first, Lord Braco of Kilbride in County Cavan, and then Viscount MacDuff and Earl Fife (not Earl of Fife, since he had nothing to do with the County of Fife.)

These honors were bestowed chiefly in recognition of his services to the Hanoverian cause against that of the Stuarts. The first Lord Fife had six sons. The eldest predeceased him; the second, James, succeeded as second earl, and, dying without issue, left his honors to the third brother, Alexander, from whom the late Duke of Fife was descended.

The fourth brother was the Hon. George Duff, who married Frances Dalzell, daughter of Gibson Dalzell, and granddaughter of General Robert Dalzell. The "Peerages" say that there was a son born to this union, named George, but do not mention what became of him. This son entered the ministry, and received the degree of doctor of divinity from the University of Edinburgh. He married Miss Ogilvy, and their son was Colonel Daniel Duff of the East India Company's service. Daniel married Miss Huyter, and the only issue of this union was the present heir, Jekyll Duff, late of the Indian Police, and now of Melbourne.

As the birth of his grandfather, George, is on the register of the House of Lords, all he needs to do in order to obtain the family honors is to prove the legitimacy of his own birth, and that of his father, Daniel But according to English law the establishment of these proofs would have to be made before the committee of privileges of the House of Lords, by the agency of the highest-priced members of the English bar. # AMESSAGE TO THE ELECTORS



To the Electors of the City of St. John,

In appealing for your support in the election of June




