

F. B. Carvell Scores Conservatives - The St. John Dry Dock


Ottawa, Nov. 30-The close of the debate on the address was not achieved to day, though the whips had planned it for Monday.

The leader of the opposition had denied that there was an alliance between the Conservative party and the Nationalist party, but Mr. Carvell believed that Mr. Borden was working in co-operation with the Conservative party.

LOBSTER SEASON OPENS

The lobster season opened today, just three weeks earlier than last year. The change has been brought about through the efforts of W. F. Todd, M.P., for Charlottetown. The conditions now governing the catch are uniform whereas in the past in the former they were allowed to catch down to nine inches, while in this country the regulations prohibited catching lobsters less than 10 1/2 inches. The latter is the size obtaining now in both countries. While the catch last year, in fact, some few years, has been but in fact, the high price has compensated much for this. Last year as high as twenty and twenty-five cents each were paid by dealers to the fishermen, while in former years fifteen cents was a good price. The principal grounds are Ten Mile Creek, Black River, Beaver Harbor, Chance Harbor, Dipper Harbor and along Lovellville.

THE RACE ISSUE Sir Wilfrid Laurier has expressed the view that the Nationalist agitation in Quebec will be short-lived. It would be most unfortunate if it were otherwise.

The Ottawa Citizen says: "The revolutions and destruction of property in Mexico and Brazil are causing a large number of Canadian investors much anxiety. Good, any Canadian who allows himself to be fooled into buying stock in Mexican and Brazilian enterprises, when there are far better opportunities for investment at home, deserves to lose his money."

TUBERCULOSIS The legislature of Massachusetts appointed a commission to report on a system of caring for persons suffering from tuberculosis. It finds there are 35,000 cases of this disease in the state, and only 2,773 beds available in hospitals and sanitariums.

UNCLE SAM PLANS NAVY EXPENDITURE OF \$126,146,659 Washington, Dec. 1.—The total estimates for the United States navy for the year 1911-12 to be submitted to congress as a basis for the appropriation for the year amount to \$126,146,659.34, which is \$15,000,000 less than the amount appropriated in the current naval bill.

Daily Hints for the Cook

SOUR CREAM NUT CAKE.
Break two eggs in a large cup, and fill the cup with sour cream. Put in a mixing bowl and add a level teaspoon of soda and one cupful of sugar. Beat all well, then add flour enough to mix a little stiff. Flavor with vanilla. Take one large nut of English walnut meats, chop fine, stir in to the batter. Bake in a moderate oven. Ice and cover top of cake with half walnut meats.

PRUNE PIE.
Cook 1-2 lb. of prunes in a double boiler until very tender. Remove the stones, sugar to taste, add just a pinch of cream of tartar and beat thoroughly. Beat the whites of 2 eggs and very gradually beat or rather fold in the mashed prunes. Make a rich pie paste, line a plate and bake. When nearly done take out, fill with the prunes and bake about 15 minutes. This should be eaten very cold with whipped cream piled lightly over.

RAINBOW CAKE.
Yellow part—One cupful of sugar, one cupful of sour cream, yolks of four eggs, one teaspoon of soda, lemon extract, according to taste, two cups of flour. Beat sugar and eggs together, add cream, soda and vanilla. Bake in layers.

White part—Two cupfuls of sugar, two cupfuls of sour cream, two teaspoonsful of soda, whites of six eggs beaten to a stiff froth. Stir cream and sugar together, add soda, and three cups of sifted flour, four cups of white of eggs. Divide this batter and flavor the white part with almond. Color the other half pink with fruit coloring and flavor with strawberries. Bake in layers and put together in alternate colors with icing made as follows: White of one egg beaten stiff, one half of a cupful of very thick sweet cream beaten into the egg, thicken with powdered sugar and flavor with lemon. Decorate the top with candied violets.

RECALLS CAREER OF MRS. CASSIE CHADWICK

Former Cashier of Bank She Looted of \$300,000 Dies Suddenly

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 1.—A. B. Spear, former cashier of the Oberlin National Bank, looted by Cassie Chadwick of \$300,000 or more is dead here.

Less than a year ago Mr. Spear was discharged from the penitentiary at Columbus, after serving a seven-year term for his share in the Chadwick swindle. Almost immediately he came to this city and began working for the Michigan State Telephone Company. At the time of his death he was traveling auditor. His death followed an operation for appendicitis.

Revenge may be sweet at first, but it is sure to acquire a flavor that is anything but agreeable.


THE DOMINION COAL CO. TAKES OVER SPRINGHILL

PILOT BOAT, IN STORM, NOT HEARD FROM

No word from Defender and inquiries by wire along Coast Bring no Response—Six Men Aboard

One week out today some anxiety is felt for pilot boat No. 5, the Defender, which left here on Thursday last for a cruise down the coast, and from which there has since been no word.

Three pilots were aboard the Defender, James H. Miller, 47 Broad street; John L. C. Stierard, 21 St. James street; and William Spenser, 21 Queen street with Captain Joseph Smith in command and two of a crew.

Since the boat left port there have been two days of wild storm, William Murray, the owner of the Defender, has wired all along the coast but with no results, as nowhere has there been anything seen or heard in connection with the missing pilot boat. There is a suggestion that she may have been blown off and has not yet had time to return. Another view is that she may be some place where she has not had opportunity to communicate with the shore. The pilot boat No. 1, H. D. Troop, arrived this morning but brought no word of the Defender.

ANOTHER BUSINESS HOUSE HERE

M. W. Doherty to Manage A. R. Williams Machinery Co. in St. John—A Healthy Sign

A. R. Williams Machinery Co., of St. John, N. B., Ltd., is the name of a company which is soon to open a warehouse and office in this city. Negotiations are now under way for the purchase or lease of a building to be the headquarters of the new company and a decision will be reached probably by the first of the week and the company will start business January 1.

The capital stock is \$60,000 and the names of those applying for letters patent are: Alfred R. Williams, of Toronto, machinery broker; Manning W. Doherty, St. John, machinery broker; Frederick W. Kichel, of Toronto, machinery broker; and Robert Kerr, of Brantford, machinery broker.

The objects are stated to be to manufacture, buy, trade, sell and deal in machinery and electrical appliances of all kinds, also grain elevators, locomotives, steam or other ships, etc.

Mr. Doherty, one of the incorporators of the company is now at the Royal Hotel. To a Times reporter he said the new company would be a separately incorporated company and would work in with the A. R. Williams Machinery Co. of Montreal, the A. R. Williams Co., of Winnipeg and the A. R. Williams Co., of St. John. While these are separate companies they are closely allied and together form the largest machinery company in Canada if not in America. They have a turnover of more than \$2,000,000 per year.

The stockholders of the local company include members of the A. R. Williams Machinery Co., of Toronto; the Canadian Machinery Corporation, of Galt, Goldie & McCulloch Co., Galt; M. W. Doherty and some large manufacturers in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

The company will have the exclusive agency for the maritime provinces and Newfoundland for the Canada Machinery Corporation, Goldie & McCulloch, Beardmore Belling Co., and others and will handle a full line of wood-working, iron working, saw mill, cement and pulp and paper machinery, saws, vault doors, gas and marine engines, boilers and machine shop supplies.

Mr. Doherty, who will manage the local company, was lately with the Canada Machinery Corporation and before that with the Sussex Machinery Co. He organized the Canada Machinery Corporation and it is a result of this merger that they are able to open up these additional branch warehouses.

Mr. Doherty has great faith in the future of St. John when the corporation decided to open branches in this city and in Calgary. He was given the option of taking the management of the Calgary branch or coming here, and he chose to come to St. John. He expressed the opinion that the development of the next ten years in this city would exceed that of the last fifty years. An evidence of the better conditions here is shown from the fact that a building which Mr. Doherty wanted to purchase is held for more than three months. He thinks this is a healthy sign.

Several other large Canadian firms have had representatives here within the last few days looking over the situation with a view of purchasing or leasing buildings for the establishment of branch houses. All this points to bigger and busier St. John.

FIRE IN CHATHAM

Blaze in Chinese Laundry Causes Some \$2,000 Loss—The Pulp Mill

Chatham, N. B. Dec. 1—(Special)—Fire about noon today broke out in a Chinese laundry adjoining W. T. L. Weldon's tailor store. A line of clothes hanging over the stove collapsed and the clothes caught fire. The blaze was soon got under control, though the lower floor was gutted. The property belongs to Mr. Weldon, who carries some insurance. The damage is estimated at about \$2,000.

When the Miramichi Pulp Company's mill closed down on Tuesday, there were twenty-five cars laden with pulp on the track waiting orders and these have had to be unloaded at the request of the mill's company. The company has sold its paper mill at Nashua and has to depend on the general market for the sale of the products of this mill.

HE HAD \$300 AND JAG

When arrested yesterday afternoon in the Union depot by I. C. R. Policeman Smith, Jacob Diehl had about \$300 on his person, and he was made aware by Judge Ritchie this morning in the police court of the risk he had run in becoming drunk with such an amount on him. He was kept in the police station until the Boston train will leave this evening when, after paying an \$8 fine, he will be allowed to go to his home in United States.

Six men were arrested last night by policeman McNamee and McCollum in Water street, all charged with drunkenness. Each of them, Arthur Doal, Segal Oasman, John McNeil, Andrew O'Brien, Wm. Lockhart and Daniel Donahue, was fined \$8 this morning in the police court.
