
SOME REDUCTIONS IN EXPORT RATES

St. John and Halifax on Same Basis as American Ports.

Montreal, May 15.—As a result of conferences with millers and the Board of Railway Commissioners, certain re-ductions in export rates on flour and grain products from milling points in Ontario to Montreal, Quebec and other

grain products from mining points in Ontario to Montreal, Quebec and other Atlantic seaboard ports will be made by the Canadian railways. These rates, which are quoted below, become effective on May 26. From lake ports to Montreal the rate will be 17½c. per 100 pounds, and to Quebec, St. John, Halifax, Portland, Boston and New London, 18½c. To New York, Philadeiphia and Bal-timore, from Port Colborne, the rate will 18½c. on flour and 19½c. on other grain products; from Goderich, 21c. and 22c.; from Collingwood, Midland and Tiffin, 22c. and 23c.; from Depot Harbor, 24½c. and 25½c. These rates represent a reduction of M½cc and 2c. per 100 pounds. The **new** rates will permit milling at Interior mills in Ontario under the usual transit arrangements.

They began to suspect the father of inducing Emily to steal during his periodic visits and as Charlson was expected last night, Christiansen, the Children's Society agent, was requested to question him. When this was done, however, and the stolen money was still unexplained, Emily, her father, her foster parents and Christiansen went to the Hamilton Avenue Police Station to settle the difficulty in an official manner. official manner.

It was here that Detective Vincent Glordano took Emily to one side and learned how the girl's father, destitute and out of work, had urged her to take the money, \$115 in all.

Emily became hysterical after the shooting and Giordano hurried her from the scene for an automobile ride, hoping to make her forget the tragedy, in which she had just figured.

Mr. Fergie believes that the Mon-treal market is still an excellent one, and bound to increase, and that with the conditions which will favor his company an excellent coal trade can be built up in eastern Canada gener-ally. For example, said Mr. Fergie, there are in the area owned by his company four workable seams, with an aggregate thickness of between 34 and 35 feet, and the tests have proven both quality and thickness of veins. One of these seams is 8 feet thick, another 15 feet, one of 7 feet and an-other of 5 feet, and the estimate as to the total quantity is 400,000,000 tons. The ad-dresses and the musical selections constituting the programme were re-layed over the Bell telephone and telegraph wires to Montreal and were simultaneously broadcasted from Station CHYC of the Northern Electric Company. Sir George explained that the league was inaugurated five years ago with 14 members; today 54 na-tions of the world are enrolled under its flag. Since its creation the coun-cil had held 28 sessions and had con-sidered and decided no fewer than 1,200 measures. During its five years of activity the league had been the means of preventing five incipient wars, he declared. Tom Moore said that whereas the World War added an annual charge of about \$150,000,000 to the country's debt, the five years' membership of the league fras cost only about \$800,000. The Labor side is represented upon the League of Nations by the labor conference at which all member na-tions send Government delegates, workers' representatives and em-ployers' representatives.
