HUNDREDS EXPOSED TO SMALLPOX GERMS

Raw Pork Sausage Fatal to Coasting Disastrous to Many; Fatal to One

WAKEFIELD, Mass., Jan. 9.—The discovery that hundreds of persons in this town have been exposed to possible contagion from smallpox has thrown this city into excitement today. A rigid probe has already resulted in the discovery of two cases and the revelation that at least fifty persons have been directly exposed to the dread disease. Most of these people are employed in the factories and mills here and have been engaged in their usual labor since their exposure to the germs, thus endangeringering scores of their fellow-workers.

Mulcahy, his fifteen-year-old pal is somewhat of a nomad, and was serving a four-years' term also for theft. He had served one year and a half. 

The entrancing announcements in the street cars and the shop windows and the newspapers of articles sold at one-half or one-third their regular prices are all combining against your sanity. But before you quite succumb will you let me make a few suggestions, offer a few "dos-and-don'ts" of the bargein counter?

Id is up out up ace, when you approach anything which is being heralded as a remarkable bargain—as being sold far below its actual cost and all that sort of thing—I think you ought to say to yourself:

"The shookeeper is not in this business for his health or his amusement If this article is being sold below cost there's a reason."

And then I think you could be a sold below cost. And then I think you ought to make a careful and deliberate attempt to find out that reason.

Never ouy an article at one-half or even three-quarters its usual price unless you do find the reason.

It isn't safe.

Because if you don't find it, then it may pop out at you in some very unpleasant fashion later.

You ought to be able to reckon with the reason in your buying. The goods you may be looking at may be marked down simply because the merchant knows they will probably go out of style next year. If you are not a person who cares particularly about being in the forefront of the styles, that will not matter, but if you are that kind of person of course it will. The goods may be marked down because it is an unbecoming color or because it won't wash, or merely because the shop is overstocked with that particular line of goods.

It makes a great deal of difference which of these is the reason.

It may be a reason that will not affect you at all, and on the other hand it may be one that will make the barg ain dear to you at any price.

So I think it behooves you to make a vigorous effort to find out why any great markdown is such a great mark down before you do any buying.

Then never be dazzled by price red uction unless the article is something you want or need.

Always remember that it is very p oor economy, or rather no economy at all, to buy something you do not need is simply for the sake of getting it cheap.

Never lose sight of the fact that it is not what you pay, but what you get for what you pay that counts—

That a useless article is dear at an y price—

And that true economy considers not only prices but results.

If you remember all these things not have to be followed by a day of reckoning as such excursions too often are.

NEEDS REORGANIZING

Plans to re-organize the lire saving service of th United States and increasy its efficiency are advocated in a pamphlet which New Englond coast guards have sent to senators and congressmen, representing states bordering on the sea and great lakes. The pamphlet states that in the life saving service there are no inducements offered for recruits, no rewards for the veterans and practically no relef provided for those disabled as the result of duty. The complaint is also made that no increase in pay for long and faithful service is given and that nothing in the shape of retirement or pension exists. These conditions, it is pointed out, force men out of the service and prevent new men from enlisting, so that the whole life saving system is seriously crippled.

The pamphlet also says:

"It seems that the laws providing for the detail of officers in the revenue cutter service to duty in the life-saving service do not today operate for the best interests of the latter service."
