The copies of letters and telegrams published by McMullen were obtained by criminal means by either his or Alian's clerks being bribed, aircer breaking off negotiations with the Americans. McMullen demanded \$40,003, \$25,000 for monies advanced, and the remainder as hush money. Allan thought the Cemand preposterous, but consented to pay \$40,000, the papers to be impounded until after the Session of Parliament. After two weeks' negotiation McMullen agreed, and Abbott paid him over \$20,000 for Sir Hugh, retaining \$20,000 as a guarantee against the premature publication. The
