The Pastor conducts a Bible Class in connection with the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor every Monday Evening at eight, except the first Monday evening of each month, which is set apart for social intercourse and entertainment.

"The Life of Christ" is the subject of study in the class.

The Prayer Meetings in connection with the Christian Endeavor Society are held at the close of the regular Sabbath evening service.

Regular Meetings of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society are held the First Friday of Each Month at 3 p. m.

Regular Meetings of the McLAREN MISSION BAND are held on the First and Third Friday of Each Month.

ORDINARY MEETINGS OF THE KIRK SESSION are held on the Second Tuesday of Each Month at 7 p. m.

THE REGULAR OFFERING FOR MISSIONS by means of Special Envelope is made on the First Sunday of Each Month.

All Church Funds are obtained by voluntary contributions.

Packages of Envelopes for Weekly Offerings, and Special Envelopes for Monthly Contributions to Missions, may be obtained in the Vestibule before or after any regular Church service.

The Pastor will be glad to meet with any who wish to speak to him, at the close of either service on Sabbath, and will usually be found at Home every Friday after 4 P. M.

MISSIONARY, EDUCATIONAL AND BENEVOLENT FUNDS.

The General Assembly appoints collections to be made throughout the Church annually, for the following objects:—

- 1. Home Missions.—The Home Mission Field of our Church extends from ocean to ocean, but for purposes of administration is divided into the Eastern and Western Sections. The Western Section includes Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West Territories and British Columbia. In this Section there are 306 Mission Fields and 880 preaching stations. Of these stations 263 are in Manitoba, 153 in the N. W. Territories, and 44 in British Columbia. During last year 250 missionaries, students, and catechists were under appointment by the Committee, while a number more were appointed by the different Students' Missionary Societies. The amount asked for the current year for the Western Section is \$50,000. This congregation is responsible for \$400 toward the support of an Ordained Missionary in Surrey, B. C.
- 2. Augmentation.—To assist weak congregations who are unable to give a salary of \$750, to enjoy the ministrations of a settled pastor. Congregations receiving aid from this Fund are required to contribute at the rate of at least \$4.50 per communicant for the support of their ministers. As a matter of fact, the average in these congregations was last year \$6.84. The number of congregations at present receiving aid is 145. Each year some of these augmented congregations become self-sustaining; while as long as the church continues to grow new ones will constantly be added to the list. Since the Fund was instituted in 1883, 186 augmented charges have become self-sustaining. The amount needed this year is \$32,287.
- 3. French Evangelization.—Missionaries, Colporteurs and Teachers are employed under the direction of the General Assembly's Committee in circulating the Scriptures and preaching the simple Gospel of Jesus Christ among the French Canadians. A number of schools have been opened in different parts of the Province of Quebec. The Central Schools of Point aux Trembles have been enlarged and are filled with pupils, a good proportion of whom are of Roman Catholic parentage. The amount asked for the current year, including school and buildings at Point Aux Trembles, is \$70,000.
- 4. Foreign Missions.—For the support of missionaries in six fields: (1) Among the Indians in the North-West, we have ordained missionaries, lay teachers, male and female, and industrial schools partly supported by Government and partly from our Mission Funds. (2) In Trinidad, ordained missionaries and lady teachers; there are a large number of schools partly supported by the Government of the island and partly from the Foreign Mission Funds of our Church. The Planters and English speaking residents contribute liberally to our work in the Island. (3) In Formosa, Dr. McKay and a host of native pastors and teachers. (4) In Honan, six ordained missionaries, two doctors and a trained nurse. (5) In Central India, ordained missionaries, lady doctors and teachers, with a number of native teachers in schools and college. (6) In New Hebrides, the oldest Mission of the Church, now

largely provided for by the Australian Churches, three ordained missionaries.

A missionary will be appointed this year to work among the Chinamen in British Columbia. To maintain the entire work over \$100,000 will be required from the Church East and West this year.

- 5. Colleges.—(1) Ordinary. Since the Common Fund, from which Knox, Queen's and Montreal received according to their respective needs, was abolished, the contributions of this congregation have been given chiefly to the Theological Department of Queen's University. (2) Manitoba College:—This centre of the great Home Mission Field of the West still looks to the East for a large share of its support.
- 6. MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.—To provide small annuites for the widows and orphans of ministers who die in the service of the Church. Each minister connected with this Fund must contribute a stated amount annually.
- 7. AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.—An effort is being made to secure an endowment for this Fund. In the meantime \$15,000 is required for this year to enable the Committee to pay the small annuity of \$200.

For the above objects contributions are made on the first Sunday of each month in special envelopes provided for the purpose. If contributors wish they may indicate how their gifts are to be applied. The amount not specially designated will be apportioned by the Session according to the needs and claims of the various schemes.

It was moved by Mr. R. McClure, seconded by Mr. Wm. Whitehead, that the minutes of last annual meeting be held as read and adopted.

The Financial Statement of the Managers was presented by Dr. French, Secretary, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. R. McClure. Carried.

Moved by Mr. D. McClure, seconded by Mr. J. H. Robertson, that Mr. W. Kirkwood be Treasurer, and that the Congregation express their high appreciation of his long services in that capacity, and their sympathy with him in his present illness. Carried.

Moved by Mr. John Smith, seconded by Mr. A. G. Buckham, that Mr. John McClure be Assistant Treasurer. Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. B. McCulloch, seconded by Mr. D. McClure, that Dr. French be appointed Secretary. Carried.

Moved by Mr. R. Lees, seconded by Mr. Fleming, that the Board of Managers consist of twelve members in addition to the Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be ex-officio members of the Board; that the congregation proceed to elect Managers in three groups of four each, the first group elected to hold office for three years, the second for two years, and the third for one year, and that seven be a quorum for the transaction of business. Carried.

The Regular Offerings for Missions have amounted to \$1,002.16. This, with interest, has given us at the end of the year \$1,012.26 an increase of \$388.26 over the amount contributed the previous year.

This increase has been due, very largely, to the appeal made to the congregation early in the year, to give the supplement necessary for the support of an Ordained Missionary in British Columbia, in addition to what we were already giving to the various Mission Funds of the Church.

We have sent \$400 for the support of the Rev. B. K. McElmon in Surrey, B. C. But as nearly half of this amount was contributed by the ladies of the W. F. M. S., the Extra-Cent-a-Day Band and Sunday Schools, we required to take only a little over \$200 from the General Mission Fund, and were thus able to increase all our gifts to the other schemes of the Church. The Session are much gratified to learn that the gift of \$400 for the support of a Home Missionary has not prevented us from doing better than ever before for all the other departments

of the Church's work. The more we do for Home Missions, the more we can and will do for Foreign Missions. The Session are glad that they have been able to respond liberally to the Pastoral Letter of the Moderator of the General Assembly, anent the Augmentation Fund. No Fund is accomplishing more for our Church, and yet many congregations have almost entirely ignored it in their contributions.

The Total Contributions for Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Purposes are \$1,574.41. This is most creditable to the congregation and marks rapid advance in liberality. But the stern fact remains that a number in our congregation still give little or nothing for any of these purposes, and thus have neither part nor lot with Christ in his great world-wide work of redeeming and elevating mankind.

We rejoice again this year that a number of young people from the families of our congregation, and others who have come to sojourn with us, have publicly confessed Christ as their Saviour and entered into full communion with the Church.

The short series of special services held in December, when Hon. R. Moreton and Rev. Jas. Murray, of Hamilton, opened to us the Scriptures, will be looked back to by a number as the time of their decision for Christ, and by all as a season of refreshing from the presence of the Lord.

The attendance at the Prayer-meeting and the Bible Classes has not been quite so satisfactory as during the previous year. There may be sufficient reasons for this; still the slightest indication that any of the people are losing their interest in the hour of social prayer and Bible study, is a source of no small alarm to those who have the highest good of the congregation at heart.

During the year one member of Session, Mr. Hugh Craig, has been compelled to withdraw from fellowship with us, owing to his removal from the town to the bounds of the congregation with which he was formerly connected. While we are conscious of loss in the removal of Mr. Craig, we know that it will be gain to the congregation to which he has returned.

In looking back over the year that is past, we cannot help saying, "Oh, the patience and tenderness of our God. His goodness leadeth us to repentance. We consecrate ourselves anew to His service. We take as our motto for the year, 'Lord, what wilt thou have me do?'"

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

In reviewing the work of the Sabbath School for the past year, we are gratified and thankful to God for any measure of success that has accompanied our efforts as teachers. We are also thankful for the honour and privilege of being permitted to be co-labourers with God, and with the thousands who make up the great army of Sabbath School workers. May our watchword ever be "Onward, looking unto Jesus." During the first six months of the year our studies were in the old Testament, commencing with the division of the kingdom under Rehoboam and the appointment of Jeroboam as first king of Israel, who introduced the worship of idols, and who is known for all time to come as "Jeroboam, the Son of Nebat, who made Israel to sin." From this history of Israel we learn the disastrous consequences to which small beginnings in sin may lead. Notwithstanding the warnings and entreaties of God, given through His prophets, Israel as a nation went from bad to worse, until judgment fell, and the people were carried into captivity. On the other hand, we learned the loving care of God for his faithful servants, such as Elijah and Elisha. During the last half year our studies have been in the Gospel according to St. John, who wrote that we might believe that Jesus is the Christ the Son of God, and that believing we might have life through His name.

During the last year eighteen of the Sabbath School scholars have entered into full communion with the Church.

The Sabbath School is supplied with papers such as the Sunday School Times, of which there is a copy in nearly every family, The Westminster Teacher, Lesson Leaves, Cottager and Artisan, Band of Hope, Child's Own Magazine and Children's Record.

Until September last the Society existed under the name of the "Young People's Literary Association." The Association met every Monday evening, the first Monday of each month being set apart for a social gathering, and the intervening Mondays devoted to Bible Study.

Of the Association Funds, one-half was devoted to the Missionary Library in connection with the Bible Class, and the other half to the Organ Fund.

At our Annual Meeting in September it was decided that, instead of remaining a Literary Association, we form ourselves into a "Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor."

The Society has, at present, an active membership of thirty-two; also a large number of Associate members. On Sabbath evenings, at the close of service, the prayer meetings are held—the Monday evening meetings being held as formerly. All the meetings are well attended, and it is hoped that before long many who are now merely Associate Members, and others who are not yet connected with the Society in any way, may join actively in the work.

It has been decided that at least \$20 of the Society's Funds be given for purchasing more books for the Missionary Library.
