## KILGOUR SHIVES ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

Killed by Bullet From His own Rifle Saturday Afternoon

LIVED FEW HOURS

Was the Lumber King of New Brunswick.—Campbellton in Mourning.

Campbellton, N. B., Nov. 7.—Deep gloom hangs over the town today with the full realization of the shocking death of one of our most prominent citizens, Kilgour Shives, yesterday afternoon. There was a note of sadness in all the church services today but especially in Christ Church, of which the deceased was a member.

Yesterday morning the news passed from lip to lip that Kilgour Shives, head of the Shives Lumber Co., had been killed. He was found in the woods, and so great was the shock to our citizens that for a time it was impossible to obtain particulars of the sad accident. The news was confirmed, however, and the hope was raised that the death of the well-known and respected citizen would be a shock to the town but not a disaster.

As far as can be learned, the correct details of the sad accident are as follows:

Mr. Shives, in company with Mr. McLean, the night watchman, went on a late afternoon trip to the woods for the purpose of clearing a small tract of land. Mr. Shives was accompanied by a couple of boys, who were supposed to be a sort of half watchmen on the property to the lumber camp of the company. They were on their way to the woods about a mile from the town. Upon reaching the woods, Mr. Shives, carrying a gun, and Mr. McLean, carrying a gun, went upon a small steep hill, and it was while they were climbing this hill that the accident occurred. The gun of Mr. Shives was caught by the brush, the trigger caught its contents. The bullet struck Mr. Shives in the right side, passing clean through the body and coming out below the heart.

Mr. McLean, who was about thirty yards ahead of the unfortunate companion, on hearing the report, ran to his assistance and on reaching his side, found him in an unconscious condition. Summoning the aid of some other men who were near by, they did what they could with the very limited means at their disposal, to relieve his intense suffering, and started to carry him out to the road on a blanket.

They had not gone far, however, before the returning consciousness of Mr. Shives made it necessary to call a halt, the awful agony he endured rendering this means of conveyance impossible.

Meanwhile a messenger had been sent to the end of the International railway line, about two or three miles away, and to find the engine was working at that end of the road. All possible speed was made with Driver Milton Deberry at the throttle on the run to town and back with Dr. Lumsden.

On his arrival he found the sufferer in a critical condition, but everything possible was done, hoping against hope.

Life ebbed slowly away, the end coming at 5.40 o'clock. The body was brought home about one o'clock this morning.

The grief-stricken widow and family have the sincerest and fullest sympathy of the whole community.

When the deceased first regained consciousness, after receiving the fatal wound his first words were "Boys I'm dying." He then gave directions concerning his business and a last word of farewell for his wife and family, and requested that he be buried beside his father at St. John.

### GOOD APPLE MARKET

That Canadian apple growers have it in their power to secure and retain a very lucrative market in England is the opinion of Joel Goodwin, senior partner in the firm of J. & H. Goodwin, fruit importers of Manchester, England, who is at present in Toronto, this being his first visit to Canada since 1894. Canadian apples, says Mr. Goodwin give through satisfaction if they are properly selected and packed. When the English crop fails and the demand for foreign apples is heavy there is a tendency on the part of Canadian growers to be careless as to the quality and packing, and the consequence is that consignments arrive in bad shape, and poor prices are obtained. Regular fruit growers seem to understand the need of the trade.

## AN IMPROPER PRACTICE

The Canadian Magazine Criticises Methods of Running By-Elections

There is political custom in this country which cannot be too strongly condemned. When a by-election comes on, or even in a provincial contest, the leaders of the Government at Ottawa take an undue interest in the campaign. This practice dates back to remote periods in our history and has been followed most tenaciously by each party when in power. Notwithstanding its antiquity it is unjustifiable.

Sir John McDonald believed most thoroughly in it, and was always tremendously careful while he was Premier, that by-elections should result favorably to his party. Sir Wilfred Laurier has followed in his footsteps and has even gone so far as to arrange the new provincial cabinets. No doubt these two statesmen, perhaps the ablest of Canada's parliamentarians, were quite conscientious in their adherence to this practice, and felt that they were but performing a political duty—a duty which they owed to their supporters and to the parties whose acknowledged leaders they were. Nevertheless one may venture to point out that such conduct is incompatible with the dignity of a Minister of the Crown.

Not only undignified but it frustrates the purpose of by-elections. These should be a test of the changing feelings of the country, a reading of the political barometer. The result is usually given that interpretation. Yet, the party in power is quite willing to build a few extra docks, a post office or two, an armory, or incur some other trifling expenditure in order to influence the result. "We must win" is the cry. Party workers from other districts are imported; all kinds of influence are brought to bear; cajolery, threats, inducements are used in a most indecent manner. For what?

That the public verdict should be truly representative of the feelings of the people? No, indeed. Rather, that the real opinion of the people should be stifled.

I do not go so far as to claim that a Cabinet Minister should not enter the constituency and deliver one or two addresses on the questions of the day. I do not object even to a political garden-party or picnic. It is the "machine" which brings disgrace upon political life—the machine which invades the bar rooms, the kitchens, the places where men resort and tamper with their judgement. When the Cabinet Minister becomes a wheel in that machine, or when he becomes part of its motive power, he travesties his high office. And since as far back as my memory extends Canada has had few Cabinet Ministers who have refused to stoop so low. They have trampled decency in the dust, even when their majority was over fifty, and quiet large enough for all practical purposes.

There is an insensate desire to win, to win always, to prove that your opponents are fools, even though they are among the best citizens in the land. It is ludicrous. It is elementary in its conception, it is entirely destructive of those high principles of political conduct which have made British public life the most admirable and valuable political product of a political age.

Canada has arrived at the stage when she should put away childish things. Both Government and Opposition at Ottawa should take a larger view of political actions than has been the custom in the past. The pettiness of parish politics should vanish before the rising sun of a great nation's self-respect and international reputation.

## DEATH OF MR.

### KILGOUR SHIVES.

News of the tragic death of Mr. Kilgour Shives, of Campbellton, will be received with keen regret throughout the province. A captain of industry, Mr. Shives was long one of the foremost lumber operators in New Brunswick, and his business brought him into contact with the people of many counties.

His death brings to mind again with renewed force the danger of a loaded gun. Of Mr. Shives it would be said by all who knew him that here, at least, was a man who would never be the victim of a gunning accident. He was an expert rifleman who, some twenty-five years ago, represented Canada at Wimbledon. It will be said in sorrow of him that he was about the last man of whom one might expect to read such dreadful news as that printed this morning.—Telegraph, Nov. 6th.

Regret is universal among residents of the Miramichi who knew the deceased gentleman, but among the lumber operators, where he was best known is to be found the deepest feeling and all speak in sadness of the death of so energetic a man. The whole community also sympathizes with the suddenly bereaved family.

## IMPERIAL NEGLECT.

Newfoundland is being taught by her experience in the present fishery trouble, as Canada long ago learned, that in a dispute with the United States she cannot count too much on the moral support of the Mother country. The good-will of the American Republic is apparently of first consideration. Probably that is expedient from the British point of view, but it is not conducive to Imperial unity of which we hear so much from the Old Country press. The London Standard criticizes the indisposition of the Home Government to support Newfoundland in the present dispute. "Though they are desirous of maintaining good relations with the United States," says the Standard, "it is not business for Home statesmen always to see through the spectacles of the other side when questions involving Greater Britain arise. Canada concluded to stand and set a noble example of Imperial patriotism when she accepted the settlement in the Alaska boundary dispute, obnoxious as it was, in silence, sooner than embarrass the wider interests of the Empire, but Great Britain may rely on the self-abnegation of the colonies once too often. Their trust in the power of the Mother Country to protect them necessarily carries with it the expectation that they will be protected."—Ex.

## PENSIONS.

The sharp avowal of his dislike to the pensioning of ex-cabinet ministers, and presumably of judges, made by the new Postmaster General, as reported on Friday, is somewhat of a surprise. Of course Mr. Alesworth is not responsible personally for what was done before he entered the administration, but he not only condemned a particular grant of money, but a policy which the administration has adopted quite recently, and against which as the public will understand him, he intends to carry on war. His promise suggests a rather interesting situation. Mr. Alesworth will find many members of Parliament ready to follow him in a warfare against the pensioning of cabinet ministers.—Globe.

Hon. Mr. Sweeney, the efficient and popular surveyor general of New Brunswick, took an excellent way to further the interests of his department when he called the North Shore lumber sealers in the employment of the government in consultation with himself and the officials of the Crown Land office. Mr. Sweeney entered into explanation of the laws governing the sealers' operations, their duties etc., and all present expressed themselves pleased with the aims and results of conference. Mr. Sweeney is winning the good opinion of the people by the energetic and efficient manner in which he is administering the affairs of his office.

## BIG GAME HUNTING.

Mr. A. H. Lindsay Tells of Successful Season on the North Shore.

Mr. A. Lindsay, of the I. C. R. advertising department is in the city gathering up his effects preparatory to beginning house keeping at Moncton. Mr. Lindsay has for the past three seasons travelled through the United States with the I. C. R. exhibit car, and has done a great deal to divert tourist and sporting travel to the lower provinces. Mr. Lindsay says few people have any idea of the extent of the business done by the railway in carrying big game hunters from western points to the hunting territories in New Brunswick and parts of Nova Scotia. There is every indication of this being a banner year in New Brunswick, especially in the Miramichi and North Shore districts, where the animals seem more than usually abundant. Sportsmen who have made such places as Newcastle and Bathurst their starting out points, have met with rare success, there hardly being a case of failure and the heads secured being exceptionally large and well proportioned. Big game hunting has increased wonderfully in New Brunswick, and many of the visitors are gentlemen of wealth, who generously pay their guides, and often lavishly reward them when the kill is a good one.

Mr. Lindsay thinks more should be known of the big game hunting in Nova Scotia. There is every indication that the moose are increasing in that province as well as in New Brunswick. The people in the towns nearest the best hunting centres had much to gain by making the attractions of their territory known outside the province, especially in the New England and Middle States, where most of the big game hunters come from.—E.C.

## ANOTHER INCREASE IN REVENUE.

Receipts for Last Four Months More Than \$1,000,000 Greater Than Same Period Last Year.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—The financial returns for the first four months of the fiscal year show the revenue to have been \$24,798,478, an increase of \$1,285,215 over the same period in the year before.

For the same period the current expenditure was \$15,840,728, an increase of \$2,378,383.

Customs furnished the largest revenue item. The returns for four months were \$15,160,198, an increase of \$787,813. The post office furnished \$1,635,000, an increase of \$115,000.

Excise collections amounted to \$4,364,667, an increase of \$233,927.

Expenditure on capital account amounted to \$3,331,606, an increase of \$388,552. For the month of October the revenue was \$6,606,005, an increase of \$251,818, and the expenditure was \$5,064,716, an increase of \$398,106.

## CANADA WILL NOT PAY.

Request of the British War Office will Not be Acceded to.

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—The British War office has asked Canada to pay the cost of maintaining the British garrison regiment of Halifax from July 1 until their removal on November 15. Canada has had a force organized ready to replace the British troops at Halifax and has only been prevented from doing so by the failure of the War office to remove their men and make room for the Canadians. As Canada has had to pay her own men the request of the War office will not be granted.

An unfortunate shooting casualty occurred at Chatham by which Martin Cripps, a lad of 16 years, son of John Cripps of the east end, received serious wounds which may prove fatal. Cripps and a young chap named Arseneau were out shooting partridge, when by some means Arseneau's gun was discharged, the whole charge taking effect in the head, shoulder and hand of Cripps. The poor chap was able to reach the doctor unaided, who removed more than twenty pellets of shot from his face and shoulder, as well as a few from his hand.
