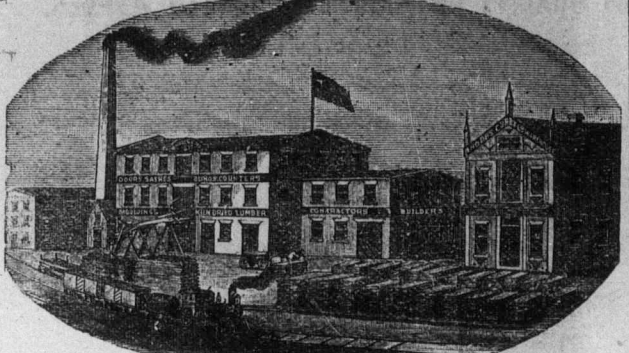

Registration Fees.

Mr. Powell's Speech.

During the session of the local house Mr. Powell, M. P. P., for Westmorland introduced a bill to lessen the expenses of registering deeds, mortgages, etc. The income of the different registrars in New Brunswick he shows in the course of his able speech which follows, to be far in excess of the salary of any like official in Canada or the adjoining republic. Mr. Powell's speech on the subject of the registration fees, the bill which he moved to be read section by section sought to accomplish three objects. First, the lessening of the registrars fees on deeds and other documents; secondly the fixing of a stated salary to the registrars throughout the Province, thirdly the payment of the surplus of the fees into the County Treasury.

In speaking to his motion Mr. Powell said: The first object would effect a great saving in the costs of transfer of property, and the third would place a considerable amount of money in the treasuries of the different Counties, which would lessen the amount of taxation now borne. Every one who had looked into this matter felt that the present system of registration was nothing short of an outrage. Were the fees in the nature of a tax, the case would be different, but as the matter stands the registrars throughout the Province collect these enormous fees, and put them in their own pockets. Our recording fees are about four times what they are in the State of Maine, and about double what they are in the adjoining Province of Nova Scotia. We pay to the registrar in this Province twenty cents per folio of one hundred words. In Nova Scotia they pay ten cents per folio of ninety words. Even in Nova Scotia the fees are too high. In our Province an attorney who draws a declaration or plea or a solicitor who drafts a bill or answer in equity, over which he may spend days in looking up authorities, and mastering his case, only gets twenty cents per folio, the same as the registrar while for every copy of his bill or answer he only gets ten cents per folio. In the County Court for drafting, declarations, pleas and notices a lawyer only gets ten cents per folio, and for every copy he only gets five cents per folio. In other words the registrar gets twice what is allowed a lawyer in the Equity or Supreme Court, and four times what is allowed him in the County Court for work of the same class. The result is that in the Province of New Brunswick the emoluments of the registry office are somewhat enormous and shockingly disproportionate to the work actually performed. He, Mr. Powell had made a careful estimate from McKillops' Commercial Record of the average annual income of the registry offices in the Province for the last five years. The County of Victoria is an exception to this statement as he was only able to procure in the case of that County the return for three years, and the statement as regards Victoria is the average of three years. He gave this statement of the Counties in the Province, their population, and the amounts they paid to the registrar as thus estimated by him, which estimate he claimed was below the actual receipts of the office.

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our registrars would be appreciated when he stated that the actual work of the offices at Dorchester and at Hampton is performed by clerks for a few hundred dollars per annum. In the County of Kings the duties of the office are performed by a lady for some three or four hundred dollars per year, while the registrar Mr. Pugsley attends to his law practice in the City of St. John, reaping nearly two thousand dollars profits from farming out the office. The professors in our colleges throughout our Province who have spent years abroad to fit them for their positions only receive from twelve to fourteen hundred dollars. Post Masters throughout the Province do more work, a higher class of work, and fill more responsible positions than registrars, yet they are not over three or four of them who get even as much as a thousand dollars. The registrar at Dorchester receives a larger salary than the Judge in Equity. The registrar at St. John fifty per cent more salary than the Chief Superintendent of Education. These evils should be remedied at once. Hundreds, yes thousands, of young men throughout the Province, young men of honor and integrity, and as well fitted to fill the office of registrar as the present occupants who receive such enormous fees would only be too glad to perform the duties of the most onerous of these offices for a thousand dollars per annum. This bill proposed to fix the salary in each County at some figure between two limits, the higher of which would be equivalent to five cents per head, and the lower to two and half cents per head of the population of the County.

Mr. Blair—This would not give sufficient salaries in small Counties. Such a plan might work in Nova Scotia, which is rich and populous, but would not work in this Province, which is much poorer, and where the population is more sparse.

Mr. Powell—said he sympathized with the attorney general in his struggle for an argument. Because Nova Scotia was richer than New Brunswick, the attorney general thought it only right that this Province should pay more. Under my scheme the smallest possible salary that could be fixed would be in the case of Sunbury where the registrar would receive \$144.05, and the next would be Restigouche where the smallest possible salary would be \$207.70. Now look to the rich Province of Nova Scotia. The registrar of deeds at St. Mary's Guysboro County only received \$122.82, while in Chester in the County of Lunenburg the registrar only received \$106.24; in Barrington \$100.25; in Shelburne \$141.25. In the County of Richmond, the registrar receives \$208.30. There would not be the slightest difficulty in getting the office filled by competent officials. The Post Offices through the County never go a begging and the salaries are small. If difficultly should arise on this score let the government allot two or more offices to one individual. The officials exist for the country, and the Country does not exist for these officials.

The Government have no objection to raise to the bill that they dare state. Their opposition is to the fact that it would strike at two of their friends, Mr. Pugsley in Kings, and Mr. David McLeish in St. John. Mr. Powell said he knew that the Government did not intend to let the bill pass. They intended to side track it, but the present system was an outrage on the County, and he did not intend to let it drop. It was not going to be lowered out of the House. If the bill was to be killed, it was to be killed openly, and the men who perpetrated the act were to have their names placed on record.

One objection the government raised to the bill was that it left in the hands of The Municipal Councils of the County the fixing of the salaries of the registrar between these limits that he had named, and that as the Province was a whole was interested in the matter it was unfair to leave the fixing of the salary to men who the attorney general thought were incapacitated through ignorance or otherwise from fixing the salary at a proper amount. While he thought the Councils could be trusted, he proposed in view of this objection to amend the bill so that the governor in Council, instead of the Municipal Council, should fix the salary of the registrars.

It might be that in some cases a larger amount should be given to the registrar than two and a half cents per head of the population on account of the registry offices being obliged to be kept open, and the government could take this into consideration. At the suggestion of a member of the House he was going to propose that the salary the registrar received should not in any case exceed the income of the office. As an instance of the working of the bill he would take Westmorland. The income from the office under the proposed rates would be \$2,200.00. All this was to be paid into the County Treasury. The Governor in Council would fix the salary of the present registrar at some point between one thousand and fifty dollars and two thousand one hundred dollars. The surplus over and above the salary, which would at least be some seven or eight hundred dollars would go to reduce the County taxation. The poor man who is obliged to mortgage his property and pay three or four dollars to the registrar for recording the mortgage would under this Bill only have to pay \$1.50 or \$2.00. The young man who purchases a piece of land for recording his deed and \$1.00 to the registrar for searching the title would pay seventy-five cents for recording fees, and twenty-five cents for the search. For reasons which are known to the Government, and which those who are familiar with political methods can imagine this bill is doomed, but he intended to push it, and on the Government and the members would rest the responsibility of continuing this imposition on the country. The bill would be a frequent visitor in the House until the wrong is remedied.

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In speaking to his motion Mr. Powell said: The first object would effect a great saving in the costs of transfer of property, and the third would place a considerable amount of money in the treasuries of the different Counties, which would lessen the amount of taxation now borne. Every one who had looked into this matter felt that the present system of registration was nothing short of an outrage. Were the fees in the nature of a tax, the case would be different, but as the matter stands the registrars throughout the Province collect these enormous fees, and put them in their own pockets. Our recording fees are about four times what they are in the State of Maine, and about double what they are in the adjoining Province of Nova Scotia. We pay to the registrar in this Province twenty cents per folio of one hundred words. In Nova Scotia they pay ten cents per folio of ninety words. Even in Nova Scotia the fees are too high. In our Province an attorney who draws a declaration or plea or a solicitor who drafts a bill or answer in equity, over which he may spend days in looking up authorities, and mastering his case, only gets twenty cents per folio, the same as the registrar while for every copy of his bill or answer he only gets ten cents per folio. In the County Court for drafting, declarations, pleas and notices a lawyer only gets ten cents per folio, and for every copy he only gets five cents per folio. In other words the registrar gets twice what is allowed a lawyer in the Equity or Supreme Court, and four times what is allowed him in the County Court for work of the same class. The result is that in the Province of New Brunswick the emoluments of the registry office are somewhat enormous and shockingly disproportionate to the work actually performed. He, Mr. Powell had made a careful estimate from McKillops' Commercial Record of the average annual income of the registry offices in the Province for the last five years. The County of Victoria is an exception to this statement as he was only able to procure in the case of that County the return for three years, and the statement as regards Victoria is the average of three years. He gave this statement of the Counties in the Province, their population, and the amounts they paid to the registrar as thus estimated by him, which estimate he claimed was below the actual receipts of the office.

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
