The Sphinx is a sidewheeler, and carries seven guns.

QUEBEC LEGISLATURE.

The Jesuit Question Discussed-Mr. Mercier's Statement.

QUEBEC, Jan. 10.—In amendment to a clause in the address that the House should agree in the opinion expressed by his Honor that we should all rejoice at the final and satisfactory settlement of the important question of the Jesuit Estates, Mr. Robertson, of Sherbrooke, proposed in amendment "that it would be premature to declare that this important question is definitely settled in a satisfactory manner, when the Government informs this House that there still exists certain difficulties in relation to the share allotted to the Protestants, which it proposes to settle." Mr. Mercier said in answer that the amendment could not be admitted by the Government, insomuch as the Protestant minority of the Province, through the Protestant Committee of the Council of Public Instruction, had expressed its complete satisfaction and concurrence in the measures proposed by the Government.

plete satisfaction and concurrence in the measures proposed by the Government. The Protestant Committee took exception to four points: 1. Catholics received the capital of \$400,000, while Protestants received only the interest of their share. 2. The superior education fund was abolished, thus abolishing one of the safeguards of the minority. 3. Interest was paid on the Catholic grant and not on the Protestants was not in proportion to their population in the Province. The Government having admitted the justice of these four objections and introduced a measure removing them, nobody The Government having admitted the justice of these four objections and introduced a measure removing them, nobody could say that satisfaction had not been given the minority. He added that the Government was not responsible for these causes of complaint, as it was M. Lynch himself who had asked that the interest only of the \$60,000 be handed over to the Protestant Committee.

These demands so startled the operators that they adjourned their conference at once. If the men persist in their demands there will probably be another strike. The 10,000 or 15,000 workmen in the Connellsville region are principally Hungarians, who live in shanties owned by their employers, and buy all their supplies at the company stores.

Electricity Disarmed of Its Terrors. ERIE, Pa., Jan. 10.—Electricians in this section of the State were invited by Supt. Jacob Pfetch, of the Erie Motor Car Com-Jacob Pietch, of the Erie Motor Car Company, to witness a test of personal insulation. Pfetch has been studying to arrest the danger lying in the overcharged wires. He fortified himself, and taking hold of the buzz rod of the dynamos in his bare hands, which he had dipped in water, he then stepped upon a pile of wet dirt and received the full charge, over 500 voits, the force used to operate about ten miles of road. To the surprise of everyone the electricity did not "ground," and the superintendent felt no effects whatever. The invention is a secret, upon which Pfetch will apply for a patent at once. Tha caisson is not wrecked, as at first supposed, but has settled down in the bed of the stream, completely filled with sand and water. There seems absolutely no hope for any of those caught within the caisson.

John Knox, the gang boss, took charge of the work on Monday. 




